ESCAPE OF MILITANTS It was all part of a big plan

Say investigators

Ansar Al Islam's military wing members snatched their fellows from police custody so that they could execute a plan to launch a major attack, Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime officials told The Daily Star yesterday.

Their initial plan was to snatch at least four members as the four are experts in military training and firearms, and attacks with sharp weapons.

Although the outfit tried to snatch four militants this time, its broader plan involved snatching seven of eight condemned militants.

The four were supposed to join newly trained members of the outfit to execute a major attack, investigators

The CTTC officials probing Sunday's snatching of two convicts claimed to have found these out after grilling two militants -- Abdus Sabur and Arafat Rahman -- who failed to escape police custody that day.

The militants had planned to snatch these four in February. "As part of the plan, they rented several houses early this year," said a high official of CTTC unit,

requesting anonymity. The snatched militants were supposed to take cover in the houses and leave the capital for safer places later,"

Investigators said the four were told about the plan beforehand over mobile phone in jail.

The condemned convicts, who were in high security prison, was recently move to a regular cell, claimed a CTTC official.

"We are now looking into how these militants were moved to regular cells and how they got access to phones," the official said.

Govt to go tough on project revisions

Ecnec approves 8 projects including 3 revised ones

The government is chalking out punitive actions for repeated revisions of development projects and weak feasibility studies as it looks to inject professionalism and seriousness into the process of project implementation.

The development comes after Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina vesterday expressed her disapproval once again at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecnec).

Of the eight projects approved involving Tk 4,826.21 crore -- at the meeting, three were revised ones.

"The prime minister in today's [yesterday's] meeting directed timely completion of the ongoing projects and also forbade repeat revisions of projects. She has made it clear that she doesn't like this practice," said Planning Minister MA Mannan at a press briefing following the meeting.

The minister admitted that they still have limitations in implementing projects but there have been some improvements in the last few years.

The ministry will take steps against government organisations for conducting a weak feasibility study, Rashid added.

Among the projects that got approval is the revised proposal for the third submarine cable, which got the green light in December 2020 for completion by June 2024.

The project's original cost was Tk 693.16 crore. It will now cost Tk 1,055 crore and its deadline extended by another year.

measure the impacts of the flight on the body. Howard Hu, the Orion programme manager, said the launch was a "historic day for human space flight".

He told the BBC's Sunday with Laura Kuenssberg: "It's the first step we're taking to long-term deep space exploration, for not just the United States but for the world.

"I think this is an historic day for Nasa, but it's also an historic day for all the people who love human space flight and deep space exploration.

'Dhaka should focus more on Indo-Pacific'

The Indo-Pacific region has become a focus for the world powers. Dealing with them has become challenging for many countries. How should Bangladesh handle such a situation?

TDS: Why is the Indo-Pacific so

important for the world powers? Ali Riaz: Bangladesh, and South Asia as a whole, always looked at West Asia and Central Asia, which were the gateways to the world. It is no longer the case now. The whole economy has shifted towards the Indo-Pacific. Also, the geopolitical importance of the region has



increased manyfold because of the rise of China. **TDS:** The US and its allies are speaking of a free, open and rules-based system in the Indo-Pacific. What are the challenges of adopting such a system?

Ali Riaz: Controlling the sea lane is important for energy security and economic prosperity. You need to make sure that everybody has the ability to participate. So, a growing hegemony of an aggressive China is a concern for the US. It not only involves economic aspects but also

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
