Both teams have only two full days to rest, a factor Argentine manager Lionel Scaloni called "madness". "We've almost got no time to let it all sink in, enjoy it ... it's recovery, recovery, recovery," concurred Australia's assistant coach Rene Meulensteen.

'Madness' to play again in two days, says Scaloni

Argentina coach Lionel Scaloni said it was "madness" for his team to play their World Cup last 16 game against Australia with just two rest days after their last group match.

The South Americans beat Poland 2-0 on Wednesday night to top their group and set up Saturday's knockout clash.

"I think it's absolute madness to play in nearly two days and a bit when we are top of the group. I can't understand it," Scaloni said, talking to the media after the game at Doha's 974 Stadium ended just before midnight.

"What time is it? Nearly one o'clock in the morning ... Thursday, the next day is for preparation and then we play. Those aren't good conditions but it's the same for everyone. We're first in the group. We could have had more rest."

Australia will only benefit from a few hours' more time to recuperate and prepare than Argentina, given their last group match was completed earlier on Wednesday.

But Scaloni's comments touch on the wider controversy over holding the World Cup in Qatar due to the hot conditions and more compressed timetable.

Argentina have found their rhythm again in beating both Mexico and Poland comfortably in Group C after their shocking opening loss to Saudi Arabia. But Scaloni said they must be wary of Australia who fought their way to the last 16 with gritty wins over Denmark and Tunisia.

"Our fans should enjoy this. We are happy today but we don't want to be euphoric," he said.

"All the games are hard. Anyone who thinks the match against Australia will be easy is wrong. We're not favourites. If you think that just because we won today, we are going to become World Cup winners, you're wrong."

Scaloni said he took striker Angel Di Maria off in the second half to protect him. "Di Maria had some discomfort in his quadriceps and we decided to substitute him. If there's a chance that he gets injured then it's not worth it," he praised his team for

"We didn't really allow them to counter-attack. It was to our credit. I think that we read the match very well. My players did a great job. They played very well and I am very happy.

Asked whether they get into the common Argentina vs Brazil argument, Masura said "Arguments, not really. We do banter with each other sometimes. There is no reason to fight over these things."On the other hand, Sanjida, responding to another question, said, "But I remember, I could not get out of the dressing room when Brazil conceded seven goals against Germany! I was heavily teased by all my teammates. No one can ever forget the '7up', can thev?"

England break an age-old record at Rawalpindi

Four England batsmen scored hundreds Thursday as the visitors piled up a record 506-4 on the opening day of the first Test against Pakistan in Rawalpindi. Openers Zak Crawley (122) and Ben

Duckett (107) set the tone with quick-fire tons against a hapless Pakistan bowling attack before Ollie Pope (108) and Harry Brook (101 not out) compounded the hosts' misery. Ben Stokes was also not out, on 34,

when bad light stopped play, having helped England break a 112-year-old record for the most runs on the first day of a Test -- beating Australia's 494-6 against South Africa at Sydney.

It was also the first time four batters scored hundreds on day one of a Test.

After winning the toss England went straight into "Bazball" mode, the brand of freewheeling, aggressive play taken from the nickname of head coach Brendon McCullum.

England's fiery batting -- with 73 boundaries and three sixes -- lifted the gloom over the start, which hung in the balance Wednesday after several of the tourists came down with a mystery virus.

As if the punishment from the top three wasn't enough, Brook -- playing only his second Test -- cracked six consecutive

boundaries off one over from debutant spinner Saud Shakeel.

He is only the fourth batsman to score six consecutive boundaries in a Test, following West Indians Chris Gayle and Ramnaresh Sarwan, and Sri Lanka's Sanath Jayasuriya.

Brook reached his maiden century off just 80 balls, capping a highly entertaining day for a crowd of 6,000 that included around 150 "Barmy Army" fans.

He added 176 for the fourth wicket with Pope, who fell to pacer Mohammad Ali.

Pakistan fought back briefly in the second session when they dismissed Duckett, Crawley and Joe Root (23) in the space of 53 runs, but that was shortlived.

England have set their sights on even "It was obviously a very good wicket to

bat on," said Crawley. "Hopefully, we can go on tomorrow and

get more runs. Debutant leg-spinner Zahid Mahmood was the most successful Pakistan bowler

with 2-160 on an unresponsive wicket. The pitch was similar to the one we had against Australia, but it should have been a bit more supportive," said Pakistan head coach Saglain Mushtag, referring to the Test played earlier this year that yielded 1,187 runs for the loss of just 14 wickets

over five days.

Tigers brace for India challenge sans Tamim

Bangladesh faced a major blow ahead of their ODI series against India as skipper Tamim Iqbal was ruled out of the series, starting Sunday, owing to a groin injury. According to a source close to the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB), it may take the ODI captain two weeks to recover, which would also see him ruled out of the first of the two-match Test series as well.

However, the BCB's medical team is yet to make an official announcement certain that the Tigers skipper is set to miss the ODI series.

"We still haven't received anything officially from the medical department. I've heard that they have some issues but we have to know how many days he will be out," BCB president Nazmul Hassan told the media yesterday.

Tamim suffered the while playing a warm-up match on Wednesday.

The hosts will also miss Taskin after nearly six months. Ahmed for the first ODI as the pacer is suffering from a back injury sustained during the Bangladesh Cricket League match on November 20.

Left-arm seamer Shoriful Islam has been included as Taskin's replacement.

Meanwhile, India landed in Bangladesh yesterday seven years since their last tour back, when the hosts won the three-match ODI series 2-1 after the revelation of pacer Mustafizur Rahman.

A full-strength India, led by Rohit Sharma, will begin their tour with the first ODI on December 4. The second game is scheduled for December 7 at Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in

The teams will then move to about Tamim's condition, but it is all but Chattogram for the third and final ODI of the series on December 10 before the first of the two-match Test series begins at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium from December 16.

The action will return to Dhaka for the second and final Test between Bangladesh and India from December 22 in Mirpur.

Despite the Fifa World Cup football being in full swing, Tigers supporters will be eager to watch a home series

Tickets for the ODI series will be available from December 3, with spectators needing to spend between Tk 200-1,500 for a ticket.
