Father, son victims of reckless driving 3 others killed by covered van in same accident in Jashore

Seven-year-old Arabur Rahman Taosin requested his father to take him to a restaurant for breakfast.

As Habibur Rahman and his son Taosin reached the footpath near Jashore-Chuknagar road yesterday, a covered van rammed into them, leaving the duo dead on

Following their death, the Satkhira-bound van crashed into at least 10 roadside eateries and tea stalls and ran over three others sitting at a tea stall at that time.

The other three deceased were identified as Ziarul Islam (35), Touhidur Rahman (38), and Mir Shamsul (60). The accident occurred at 7:30am in Begaritala Bazar area of Jashore's Monirampur Upazila, according to

Monirampur Police Station OC Sheikh Moniruzzaman. Abu Taleb, owner of a roadside restaurant that was damaged in the accident, said, "Around 7:30 in the SEE PAGE 5 COL 1

LDC graduation won't be easy

Experts talk about challenges countries will face during transitional period

Three South Asian nations -- Bangladesh, Nepal and Bhutan – that are going to graduate from the status of least developed countries (LDC) would struggle to get cheaper funds during the transitional period due to global challenges and crises, according to experts.

Coordination among bilateral and multilateral lenders is required so that separate funds are not allotted for the same objective, said Debapriya Bhattacharya, distinguished fellow at Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD).

He said a smooth transition from LDC status is not easy, as concessional loans will not be available for middleincome countries.

Bhattacharva was addressing a webinar on "Multilateral Development Finance: Supporting an Inclusive and Sustainable Recovery in South Asia",

Underestimated, neglected

Female upazila vice-chairs say they are given little to no agency in their roles

Female upazila vice-chairpersons have claimed that they are neglected and underestimated in their positions, and in most cases, they are unaware of their responsibilities, as the chairpersons and UNOs never clearly inform them about their roles.

They also claimed that they do not get any workforce, logistical support or training for their work, which is why they fail to implement the promises they make to the people during the election.

They have no role in decisionmaking regarding project implementations, even though they are elected with more votes that their male counterparts.

Female upazila vice-chairpersons made the comments yesterday at a views-exchange meeting, titled "Effective participation of women in decision-making processes: Women's political empowerment and the role of women vicechairpersons", organised by Bangladesh Mahila Parishad at its Begum Munira Khan Auditorium in Segunbagicha.

Lawmaker Shirin Akhtar, who was a special guest at the meeting, said although women are seen to always struggle, only men are seen to be in control of power.

"If the state wants to ensure democratic rights, it must first ensure them at the upazila level,"

Santu Larma, formally known as Jyotirindra Bodhipriya Larma, said the indigenous people in the hills are being deprived of their belongings and facing an existential crisis.

It took about 15 years for the government to amend the **CHT Land Dispute Resolution** Commission Act, formulated in 2001 in line with the accord, while a set of rules for the act's proper implementation now seems like "building castles in the air".

He said a conspiracy has been hatched and is now well established which saw the ruling class incentivising people from the plains to make settlements in the hills and snatch away what belongs to the indigenous people.
