## Govt having sleepless nights

## Says Fakhrul at Rajshahi **BNP rally about Dec 10** gathering

The BNP yesterday said the government was in constant "fear" of the party's December 10 rally in the capital and that it was having sleepless nights.

"They [Awami League] are talking among themselves that there will be a change of government on December 10. It does not have any confidence in the people and that's why it is in constant fear," said BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir.

He was addressing a massive divisional rally at Rajshahi city's Madrasa ground, which was joined by party men and supporters from eight districts of Rajshahi division.

Fakhrul said they want to hold the Dhaka divisional rally in front of the BNP's Nayapaltan central office on December 10 like they held rallies there before.

'Nothing happened there previously. But today they know that they have committed many misdeeds and that's why they are in constant fear of the BNP and the people of the country."

Speaking at the rally, senior and mid-ranking BNP leaders asked the audience to join the Dhaka rally to show no confidence in the government.

Police gave BNP permission to hold the rally at Suhrawardy Udyan but the party said they wanted to organise the event at Nayapaltan.

# **Economic crisis is** not war-driven

### Say economists at BIDS conference

The present economic crisis is not just because of the Ukraine war but a build-up of legacy issues, economists said yesterday.

There is a narrative that the economy would be normal if the Ukraine war would not happen. However, there are legacy issues that make it difficult to solve the current situation," said Debapriya Bhattacharya, distinguished fellow at the Centre for Policy Dialogue.

Bhattacharya's comments came at the concluding session of the annual conference of the Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies held at the capital's Lakeshore Hotel.

He also gave examples of poor energy planning and project implementation.

"The policymakers are saying that the present economic turmoil will dissipate in three months, but a global recession is looming large in 2023. So, it would be one of the toughest years in the recent decades where three problems will be the cause of tension: food, fuel and finance."

Bhattacharya proposed a package for two to three years where some steps should be taken with the coordination of all stakeholders.

"No one thought that such an impact was coming after the Covid," said Salman F Rahman, private industry and investment adviser to the


