Two-day training changes Hafsa Akter's fate

Scarcity has always been a constant companion to Hafes Akter (passeicoym). It was so bad at one point that Hadas's kids were unable to attend school as the was unemployed while her imphand was a day labour but could not find work everyday.

Living in a one-bodroom house in the Mistri Pura unes under Halla union of Teknat, she was finding it difficult to support her husband.

"Last year, I got a two-day training on goat regring from the upually livestock office in Teknaf and since then, the situation has started changing," Haliu said.

After training, she got Tk 4,000 cash from

Oxfam to buy goats for rearing.

Thought a goat for Tk 9,000. It goes birth to two gosts. I sold one and bought some chicken," she added.

Halin then received five days of training on vaccinating animals from the same office and later

gest a vacazine kit from Oxfam.

In the second instalment from Outum, Halta gest Tk 6,600 and started farming in her yard alongeide rearing goets and poultry while also providing vaccination services.

She started selling nggs and vegetables cultivated in her yard, and also increased the

number of chickens.

But I extend more money and fame through vaccinating other people's animals. So far, I have vaccinated 10,000 poultry and grate," she said, adding that she is now known as a vaccinator.

Hafsa then came up with another idea of vernicempost fertilier. She started preparing verndeumpost in one corner of her yard, making LOOU kilogrammen (kg) of the factiliser so far.

"The demand for vermicompost is home and I can sell it for Tk 20 per kg. I have a plan to increase

production of the fertilizer," she added.

Seeing the success of Hubs, her husband Hanti Mia (mandonym) came forward to help her.

"I don't work as a day labour anymore. Now, I work with my wife and take care of the goats and farmland," he said.

With their newbund solvency, Hallar's two children are going to a local primary school.

Them is no end to learning and no age limit to learning. Oxfam has opened my eyes and people from around the village came to consult me about verious lauses. It's a new journey of my life," she said.

Hafica new plans to start a large poultry farm to increase her income and encourage other women. in her area to become self-sufficient.
