## Three Bangladeshi films to screen at Kolkata Int'l Film Festival

Three Bangladeshi films – Mejbaur Rahman Sumon directorial *Hawa*, Muhammad Quayum directorial *Kura Pokkhir Shunne Ura* and Fakhrul Arefeen Khan's *JK 1971* will be screened at the 28th edition of the Kolkata International Film Festival.

The festival will be held between December 15 and 22 this year. Of the 1078 films submitted, only 183 from 42 countries will be screened there. Around 215 shows will be held across 10 venues.

Amitabh Bachchan and Shah Rukh Khan are the primary guests of the inauguration, along with Jaya Bachchan, Rani Mukerji, Kumar Sanu, Mahesh Bhatt, and Shatrguahan Singha.

Popular film director Gautam Ghosh's documentary on Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, *Bangabandhu in Calcutta*, will also be shown at the festival.

## Mithila wins Maitri Award at Telangana Bengali Film Festival

been preparing for a Canadian university for the last two years.

"If it gets canceled, then it would be so frustrating for me, for my families," he added. He went to three other banks to open a new student profile, but those banks too responded in the negative, citing the current dollar crisis.

Previously, there was a rumour that Bangladesh Bank had directed commercial banks not to open student files. But the current spokesperson for the central bank, Md Mezbaul Haque, told The Daily Star, "We have not issued any such order. We only instructed them to operate on the basis of sufficient funds."

These banks, who cannot open new files, might be facing a fund crunch, he added.

Foyez Uddin Sarkar, a senior executive of Premier Bank's Elephant Road branch, said, "We are in trouble as we don't have enough funds due to the ongoing dollar crisis."

Sarkar, however, hoped the situation would return to normal by January.

The bank are taking a conservative approach to opening profiles due to the dollar crunch, said Syed Mahbubur Rahman, managing director and chief executive officer of MTB. While his bank would open 30-40 accounts a month, it has brought down the number to 5-6.

"We haven't stopped it entirely. We are opening the account on the basis of importance," he said. "For example, if a student wants to go to Oxford or Harvard, he or she can definitely open the file."

Standard Chartered Bank is an exception in this regard.

Naser Ezaz Bijoy, chief executive officer of SCB, said, "We have not stopped processing student files. In fact, we have doubled the number compared to last year. We have set up dedicated desks to provide assistance to students and parents."

According to Bangladesh Bank, in the 2021-22 fiscal year, \$414.50 million were sent abroad for education related services.

UNESCO's "Global Flow of Tertiary

Students" report says a staggering 49,151 Bangladeshi students left the country for higher education in 2021.

"In the last fiscal year, the City Bank played a key role in opening student files. Although this is now a peak moment for admissions globally, we cannot help students properly right now," said a top official of the City Bank, requesting to be anonymous.

As such, students' futures remain bleak. For many they're on the edge of missing out on an opportunity of a lifetime.

kicking into gear in the group stages and then scripting exhausting wins over Australia and the Netherlands, Croatia too didn't make life easy for themselves with back-to-back shootout victories at the knockout stages. But that is something Croatia are happy to live with, having navigated the path to the final after extra-time in every knockout stage match in Russia four years ago. They are a battle-hardened side with plenty of strong characters in all the positions, with Luka Modric the creative spark, just like Messi.

Any notion of playing boring football was summarily brushed aside by Croatia coach Zlatko Dalic at the pre-match press conference. "We are in the semifinals and we are here by merit. That's the end of the topic," he said in reply to a question.

Selection-wise, Croatia are in a better position as they have no suspension and no serious injuries to contend with, unlike Argentina, who have defenders Gonzalo Montiel and Marcos Acuna suspended. However, the good news for the Argentines is that both Angel di Maria and Gonzalo Montiel are available for selection even though they are not likely to start.

With both teams having won twice against each other and the other match ending in a draw, there is not much to separate the two sides, even though the only time these two sides met in a World Cup ended in a convincing 3-0 win for the European side in Russia four years ago.

But that was a different Argentina team, who had only squeezed into the Round of 16 with a one-point advantage and made a meek exit after the Croatia thrashing. In Lusail tonight, they will certainly be a different beast, with a massive legion of fans egging them on for victory.

Finance Division has a say."

Asked whether it would curtail the power of independent organisations like the Anti-Corruption Commission, Anwarul said, "You'll have to have vetting done by the Finance Division while fixing the pay structure and other expenditures. The rest will be done by the respective organisations."

He, however, said the practice had earlier been mandatory for the autonomous, legislative and local government bodies, but the enactment of the existing law in 2018 rendered it ambiguous.

Yesterday, the cabinet also discussed the need for strengthening the cyber security of the country, security of the national data centre and expediting the implementation of a newly adopted project on submarine cables.

In reply to a query, the cabinet secretary said the government was giving emphasis on cyber security as banking transactions and other activities have gone online. To prevent hacking, the government has given the instructions, he added.

The cabinet also approved the proposal to ratify the Minamata Convention on Mercury, an international treaty adopted in 2013 in Japan to protect humans and the environment from harmful effects of mercury pollution.

"The total mercury released in Bangladesh is approximately 32,660kg a year, which pollutes the environment," said the cabinet

secretary.

The treaty came into effect in 2017 with 137 countries participating in the convention. The treaty banned the opening of new mercury mines and asked to close the existing ones gradually and restricted the use of mercury in products.

The cabinet cleared another proposal to ratify the Nagoya Protocol on Access to Genetic Resources and the Fair and Equitable Sharing of Benefits Arising from their Utilisation to the Convention on Biological Diversity.

Besides, the meeting okayed the proposal for signing an agreement between Bangladesh and Iran to avoid double taxation and prevent tax dodging.

**LAST MEETING**

Yesterday was the last cabinet meeting for Anwarul as the secretary as he is going to retire on December 15.

"Let's see what I can do next. I'm lucky; perhaps I'm the longest serving civil servant. It's my 40th year as a government employee. I was also secretary for 12 years," he said when he was asked about his plans after retirement.

Asked, the cabinet secretary said, "Today [yesterday] is my last official meeting with you. You [media] gave me tremendous support. I'm thankful to you."

"The cabinet thanked me for my service. I worked for the welfare of the people... There may be some mistakes and for that, I'm apologising to the people."

granted bail, they added.

The prosecution, however, opposed the bail petitions saying activists had carried out subversive activities as directives from high-profile leaders, including Fakhrul, Abbas and several others.

Upon hearing both sides, the magistrate dismissed the defence pleas considering the depth of offences brought against them in the case.

The case was filed with Paltan Model Police Station on December 8, a day after the clash broke out in front of the party's Nayapaltan office.

The clash left one person dead and scores of others injured.

A total of 450 leaders and activists of BNP and its front organisations were arrested in the case on December 7 and produced before a Dhaka court the following day.

Law enforcers picked up Fakhrul and Abbas from their homes around 3:00am on December 9. The same day, Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Mohammad Jashim sent Fakhrul and Abbas to jail in the case, rejecting their bail petitions.

The two BNP leaders were shown arrested on a charge of provoking party members to launch an attack on police in the Nayapaltan area.
