

Bails of 146 BNP men denied Rizvi, Khokon, Milon, Shimul among them

A Dhaka court yesterday rejected the bail petitions of 146 leaders and activists of the BNP and its front organisations in a case over the December 7 clash with policemen in the capital's Nayapaltan area.

They include BNP Senior Joint Secretary General Ruhul Kabir Rizvi; the party's Joint Secretary General Khairul Kabir Khokon; former BNP lawmaker and organising secretary Fazlul Haque Milon; and BNP Chairperson's personal assistant Shamsur Rahman Shimul Biswas.

Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Md Ataulah passed the order after their lawyers moved the bail petitions saying two BNP leaders -- Amanullah Aman and Abdul Kader Bhuiyan Jewel -- secured bail on December 8 after they were produced before another Dhaka court in the case filed with Paltan Model Police Station on December 8.

The prosecution, however, opposed the petitions saying their bail petitions should be rejected as specific allegations were brought against them.

Upon hearing both sides, the magistrate turned down the defence.

On December 15, another Dhaka court for the third time rejected the bail petitions of BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir and its standing committee member Mirza Abbas in the same case.

The case was filed a day after the clash broke out in front of the party's Nayapaltan office.

The clash left one person dead and scores of others injured.

A total of 450 leaders and activists of BNP and its front organisations were arrested and produced before a Dhaka court.

Law enforcers picked up Fakhrul and Abbas from their homes around 3:00am on December 9. The same day, Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Mohammad Jashim sent Fakhrul and Abbas to jail, rejecting their bail petitions.

The two BNP leaders were shown arrested on a charge of provoking party members to launch an attack on police in the Nayapaltan area.

Heating, power restored in Kyiv

Says mayor after Russian missiles batter Ukraine's grid; one killed, four hurt by shelling of Russian region

Heating has been fully restored to Kyiv after the latest Russian bombardment that targeted water and power infrastructure, the capital's Mayor Vitali Klitschko said yesterday.

"The city is restoring all services after the latest shelling," Klitschko said on the Telegram messaging app. "In particular, the capital's heat supply system was fully restored. All sources of heat supply work normally."

Ukrainian officials said Russia fired more than 70 missiles on Friday in one of its heaviest barrages since the Kremlin's February 24 invasion, forcing emergency blackouts nationwide and cutting access to heat and water.

Temperatures in Kyiv and many places across Ukraine were below freezing yesterday morning, with forecasts expecting them to dip to minus 6 degrees Celsius in the capital by the evening.

Kyiv is by far the largest city in Ukraine with an estimated population of about 3 million, with up to two million more in the Kyiv region. As of late Saturday, a third of the city remained without power.

Sergei Kovalenko, chief executive of

YASNO, which provides electricity for Kyiv said late on Saturday that access to power has been increasing with each hour.

"The situation remains difficult and critical," Kovalenko said on his Facebook account.

Ukraine has managed to restore power to almost 6 million people in the last 24 hours, President Volodymyr Zelensky said in a video address.

"Repair work continues without a break after terrorist attack. ... Of course, there is still a lot of work to do to stabilize the system," he said.

"There are problems with the heat supplies. There are big problems with water supplies," Zelensky added, saying Kyiv as well as Vinnytsia and Lviv further to the west were experiencing the most difficulty.

Meanwhile, one person was killed and four people were wounded by shelling in the southern Russian region of Belgorod near the border with Ukraine yesterday, the governor of the region said.

"Our air defence system was activated over Belgorod and the Belgorod region," Governor Vyacheslav Gladkov said.

"Four people are known to have been injured. Medical teams are taking them to

hospital," he said.

A poultry plant has been damaged and windows in several residential buildings and cars have been hit, he added. Three witnesses told Reuters that loud blasts were heard in the city yesterday.

Meanwhile, veteran US diplomat Henry Kissinger said the time is approaching for a negotiated peace in Ukraine to reduce the risk of another devastating world war, but dreams of breaking up Russia could unleash nuclear chaos.

Kissinger, an architect of the Cold War policy of detente towards the Soviet Union as secretary of state under Republican presidents Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford, has met Vladimir Putin multiple times since he first became president in 2000.

"The time is approaching to build on the strategic changes which have already been accomplished and to integrate them into a new structure towards achieving peace through negotiation," Kissinger wrote in The Spectator magazine.

"A peace process should link Ukraine to Nato, however expressed. The alternative of neutrality is no longer meaningful," Kissinger wrote in the Spectator magazine in an article entitled "How to avoid another world war".

Man dies under train at railway station

A man was killed in a train accident at Nachole railway station in Chapainawabganj yesterday.

Hossain Ali, 65, of Guthoil village in Nachole upazila, went under the wheels of a Rajshahi-bound train, said Mintu Rahman, officer-in-charge of Nachole Police Station.

He was trying to cross a rail track on the station premises around 10:45am. He died on the spot, said the OC, quoting locals.

On information, railway police recovered the dead body and handed it over to the victim's family after completing the legal procedure, the police official further said.

16 Rohingyas held in Moulvibazar

Police detained 16 Rohingyas, including children, from Moulvibazar's Sreemangal upazila yesterday.

They were detained from an Ena Paribahan bus while travelling from Chattogram to Moulvibazar, said Jahangir Hossain Sardar, officer-in-charge of Sreemangal Police Station.

A police inspector of Moulvibazar was going to Moulvibazar from Chattogram in the bus last night. At that time, when he suspected some passengers in the bus to be Rohingyas, he reported the matter to the police control room.

As the bus reached Sreemangal's Chowmuhan road, police conducted a search and detain them. They confirmed that the detainees are Rohingyas from Cox's Bazar after talking to them.

The detained Rohingyas have been kept in police custody, the OC said.

Toddler on mother's lap dies as bus hits rickshaw

A three-year-old girl died after a BRTC bus hit a rickshaw in the capital's Mirpur-1 area last night.

The toddler named Raisa was on her mother's lap in the rickshaw when the bus of the state-owned company hit it, making the child fall on the road and get seriously injured around 8:30pm.

The mother and daughter were immediately taken to Shaheed Suhrawardy Medical College Hospital where doctors declared Raisa dead, said Darussalam police, adding that the bus driver named Al Amin was detained.

On December 11, five out of seven BNP members of the parliament (MPs) submitted their resignation to Speaker of Parliament Dr Shirin Sharmin Chaudhury, as part of their anti-government movement with a 10-point demand that includes dissolution of parliament.

The MPs who resigned in person are Md Zahidur Rahman of Thakurgaon-3, Md Mosharof Hosen of Bogura-4, Gulam Mohammad Siraj of Bogura-6, Md Aminul Islam of Chapainawabganj-2, and Rumeen Farhana, from women's reserved seats.

Md Harunur Rashid of Chapainawabganj-3, who is now in Australia, and Abdus Sattar Buiyan, the ailing MP of Brahmanbaria-2, could not tender their resignations in person and did it through email.

In the afternoon, the Parliament Secretariat issued a gazette notification declaring the seats of six BNP MPs vacant.

The seat of Harunur Rashid was not declared vacant as his resignation letter was not accepted.

The JS secretariat could not be sure whether the signature on Harun's resignation letter was by him.

"He'll have to sign the letter by himself and send it again," Speaker Shirin Sharmin Chaudhury told reporters at her parliament office after receiving the resignation letters.

Tunisia opposition calls for Saied to quit after voters shun election

officials and leaders, several hearses a minute could be seen entering yesterday, while the parking area for private cars was also full.

"Right now it is difficult to book a hearse so many relatives transport the body with their own vehicles," said an employee on condition of anonymity.

Smoke billowed out of crematoriums, where groups of people were gathered to collect the ashes of the deceased. It was not immediately clear to what extent a rise in Covid-related deaths was responsible.

In Shanghai, authorities said schools should move most classes online from today, and in nearby Hangzhou most school grades were encouraged to finish the winter semester early.

Mbappe shares the limelight

In just about 97 seconds, Mbappe made the boisterous Argentine crowd at the Lusail Stadium go silent, learning of not a repeat of the 2014 World Cup final when Messi and Co were denied glory for a whisker.

At first, he stayed calm to capitalise on Argentina defender Nicolas Otamendi's mistake of dragging France forward Randal Kolo Muani down inside the box to convert a penalty in the 80th minute.

Seconds after that, Mbappe showed why he could have the world at his feet in the coming years as he quickly exchanged passes with Marcus Thuram to drive home a sensational volley that had enough precision to have found the back of the net despite a slight touch of the fingers from a diving Emiliano Martinez at the goal.

Mbappe once again had to step up to bring France back into the game when a Gonzalo Montiel handball conceded another penalty in the extra time after Messi had restored the lead for Argentina just 10 minutes ago. And Mbappe made no mistake this time either, showing nerves of steel even at the young age of 23 to become only the second player after England's Geoff Hurst to complete a World Cup final hat-trick.

Hurst was the first player to score three goals in a final when they beat West Germany 4-2 after extra time in 1966 and he was glad to see another player finally join him on the list.

"Many congratulations to Mbappe, whatever happens. I've had a great run," Hurst tweeted as the game

On August 5, the government hiked the fuel price by a record 51.7 percent on average to bring it closer to the rate prevailing in the global market. Sunday's three goals helped Mbappe pip Messi to the World Cup Golden Boot, top goalscorer with eight goals in seven matches -- the most any player has scored in a World Cup since Brazil phenomenon Ronaldo also scored eight in 2002.

However, Mbappe was well short of compatriot Just Fontaine who holds the record with 13 goals in the 1958 World Cup in Sweden.

But despite his young age, Mbappe is only four goals away from German striker Miroslav Klose's record haul of 16.

Just two days shy of turning 24, Mbappe has already played in two World Cup finals and looks destined to lead a young and bright generation of French players for many years to come.

But at Qatar's Lusail Stadium, the night belonged to his Paris St Germain team mate Lionel Messi, whose heart Mbappe helped to break four years ago in Russia when France knocked out Argentina 4-3 to win in another epic match in the last 16.

Mbappe was only 19 then and it is mind-blowing to think that his peak is still ahead of him.

Every match he seems more confident, more poised, more in control, more unstoppable with his jet-heel speed and pin-point accuracy -- terrifying even the best defenders.

French President Emmanuel Macron went down to the pitch to comfort the disconsolate young superstar who is already a national treasure, giving him a long hug.

Mbappe's hat-trick at the end of his outstanding tournament will not erase the pain of losing to Argentina, but in time he will surely look back with pride.

"I'm sad for Kylian, who had a more than perfect game," said Paris St Germain president President Nasser Al Khelaifi.

"If it had been me, I would have given two cups -- one for Kylian, one for Leo. He (Messi) deserves it and Kylian still has years to win a World Cup again."

It may have been Messi's night. But unlike him, Mbappe has much of his career yet to come.

12 killed as oil tanker catches fire in Afghanistan

An oil tanker overturned and caught fire in Afghanistan's high altitude Salang pass, killing 12 people and injuring dozens, officials said yesterday.

The incident happened late on Saturday in the province of Parwan, north of Kabul, leaving travellers on both sides of the mountainous pass stranded.

At least 12 people were killed and 37 others were injured in the incident, said Hamidullah Misbah, spokesman for the Ministry of Public Works, adding the toll was expected to rise.
