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STRANDED IN INDIA
23 fishers
return via
Benapole

Twenty-three Bangladeshi fishermen, who were stranded at India's West Bengal for nearly four months, were allowed to enter the country through the Benapole border in Jashore on Friday night.

The Indian police handed them over to Benapole Immigration Police through "special travel permit".

Confirming the development, Abul Kalam Azad, officer-in-charge of Benapole Check-post Immigration Police, told our local correspondent that on August 18 this year, 90 Bangladeshi fishermen were caught in a sea storm while fishing in the Bay of Bengal. Indian Coast Guard police later rescued them from the sea.

The fishermen were under custody of Buddha Pur flood centre in Kakkdip in India.

After confirming the citizenship of 23 rescued fishermen, the deputy high commission of Bangladesh in Kolkata took the initiative to bring them back to the country, said the OC. Among the 23 fishermen, one is from Bagerhat, one from Chandpur and 21 from Bhola.

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Tk 95 lakh
washing away

Sandbags to protect erosion
vanishing into Karkhana river

In September, geo bags were placed within 300 metres of Karkhana river in Patuakhali's Bauful upazila to protect from river erosion.

Water Development Board (WDB) implemented the project at a cost of Tk 95 lakh, through an agency named Messers Lutfar Rahman. Almost Tk 1 crore of public money were used for this project, which WDB claimed will protect villagers from river erosion.

But barely a month after, these sand bags are disappearing into the river, washing away the tall claims of the WDB authorities.

After visiting Kachipara union of Bauful upazila, this correspondent saw that most of the geo bags were devoured by the river, while the rest were severely damaged.

Sand was coming out from some bags.

Saidul, a local resident, alleged that sand was not properly filled in the bags.

"A geo bag needs at least 150kg of sand. But most of these bags had a maximum of 120kg of sand in it," he claimed.

PROTECTING 3 MOULVIBAZAR UPAZILAS FROM FLOOD
Tk 996cr project in limbo

In 2021, Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecne) approved a mega project worth Tk 996.30 crore in 2021 to permanently free three upazilas of Moulvibazar from flood.

Fifty-three contractors were selected for the project, which was scheduled to be completed by 2023. There were 76 work packages based on which the authorities planned to approach the project.

But due to an apparent fund crisis, no visible work has been completed so far.

Out of the 72 work packages, 26 have already been abandoned. Work on the remaining 46 packages is continuing at a snail's pace. The projects it could be stopped anytime due to a lack of funds, said representatives of the Water Development Board and the contractors, seeking anonymity.

The most important works, including dredging of rivers and

construction of river protection dams have not even started in most of these sites.

Repairing an embankment of the Manu river, and dredging the waterbody was part of this project. However, these works have completely stopped.

Manu river, which descends from Tripura state of India, has completely been filled with silt a long time ago. However, the river was not dredged for a single time since independence.

As a result, every year during monsoon, the river overflows and breaks the defense dam, flooding the three upazilas -- Moulvibazar Sadar, Rajnagar and Kulaura. Houses and crops worth crores of taka get damaged during this time as well.

Sundar Ali, a resident of Manumukh area in Kulaura upazila in the district, said, "At first I thought this project was a blessing for us. But now I am afraid. If the project isn't completed before the next monsoon, we will

be in danger all over again."

According to WDB sources, only Tk 75 crore of the allocated Tk 996 crore has been handed over to them so far.

Moulvibazar WDB sub-divisional engineer Rakhil Raihan said the contractor companies are showing reluctance to work due to the financial crisis.

Moulvibazar WDB executive engineer Muhammad Akhtaruzzaman said they have requested the higher authorities to formally extend the deadline of the project and hand over the remaining allocated money.

"If the deadline is extended, the contractors will be directed to complete the remaining work quickly," he added.

Contacted, several contractor companies said they were forced to stop the majority works of the flood protection project due to unavailability of allocated money.

The rising price of construction materials didn't help either, they added.

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The daily grind of
stone collectors

Nur Mohammad goes down to the river with a net in hand, stays underwater for two to three minutes and emerges with some small and big stones.

Nur, now in his 40s, does this for four to five hours every day to make a living out of stone lifting.

Like him, more than 200 people of seven villages in Lalmonirhat's Patgram upazila lift stones from Dharla river to earn a living, as this is the only source of their livelihood.

"I can lift 12 to 15 cubic feet of stones from the river every day," Nur said, adding that his father and grandfather used to collect stones from this very river using such nets, and now, has entered the profession.

Nur, a resident of Kawamari village and a father of two, said he sells each cubic feet for Tk 40 to 45 and earns up to Tk 500 to 600 daily. "I don't look for fish under the water but rather search for stones."

Sakkul Miah, another stone collector of the village, said they have been collecting stones from the riverbed with nets for many years.

During heavy current, water from the upstream bring in huge numbers of small and big stones into Dharla river, he said. "Although collecting stones from the riverbed is a hard job, the riverside people here have no other alternative."

Jannu Mia of Shrirampur village said after collecting the stones, they bring those to the shore on small boats.

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DAULATDIA-PATURIA
Fog disrupts
ferry services

Ferry services on Paturia-Daulatdia route remain suspended since yesterday morning due to poor visibility caused by fog.

Mahiuddin Russel, manager of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Corporation at Aricha point, said the ferry services remained halted since 3:00am. Three ferries got stuck in the middle of the Padma and operation of 11 more ferries were cancelled.

Several vehicles also got stuck on both sides of the river due to the suspension of the ferry services, he said. "The services will resume once visibility improves," he added.
