

16 fishers held for catching fish fry in Sundarbans

UNB, Khulna

The Forest Department has detained 16 fishermen from the Sundarbans for catching Parshe (mullet) fry, during its breeding period from November-January, from the river and canals defying ban.

A team of the Forest Department (West) led by Zahirul Islam, officer-in-charge of Nilkomol Patrol Outpost, detained the fishers around 4:30am on Thursday during a drive at the Bangabandhu Char area, said Divisional Forest Officer of Sundarbans West Forest Division Abu Naser Mohsin Hossain.

The officials also seized two fishing boats, the DFO further said.

"A case has been filed under the Forest Act; the fishermen have been sent to Koyra Upazila Senior Judicial Magistrate Court."

According to the forest officials fishermen of Shyamnagar, Koyra, Paikgacha, and Dakop areas surrounding the Sundarbans are using illegal nets to catch fish fry. They catch a large number of fish fry from the Sundarbans' Alor Kol, Dublar Char, Batlurchar, Chachanangla, Poshur, Agun Jala, Kalir Char, Gera Chalki, Bajbaja, Hanshoraj, Andarmanik, Dhangmari, Chichkhali and Majjat rivers, said officials.

Due to the use of such nets, Parshe fish fry and different species of fish are being killed, they added.

Poshur River Waterkeeper Coordinator Md Nur Alam Sheikh said a group of money lenders pay low-income fishermen a lot of money in advance to send them to the Sundarbans to make extra profit with fish fry.

Some forest officials and employees are also cooperating with them in exchange for a large amount of money, he alleged.

He demanded that the government take necessary steps to stop catching of fish fry in the Sundarbans.

15 hurt as train derailed in Kishoreganj

At least 15 passengers were injured as a compartment of an intercity train derailed at Bhairab Railway Station in Kishoreganj yesterday morning.

The compartment of the Kishoreganj bound intercity Egarosindhur train from Dhaka came off the tracks at Bhairab station while its engine was being changed at 9:30am, said station master Md Nur Nabi.

At least 15 passengers were injured as the window glasses and floors of three train carts broke down following the derailment, Egarosindhur train attendant Sohel told the news agency.

"We are working to repair and get the train back on track as a salvage train is on its way from Akhaura," the station master said.

Buri Teesta levee, a relief for locals

The newly-constructed embankment along Buri Teesta river in Nilphamari's Jaldhaka upazila has been a blessing for thousands of people residing in 30 villages, because now they are protected from regular floods, thanks to the efforts of Water Development Board (WDB).

Locals and WDB sources said the 69 kilometre Buri Teesta merges with the mighty Teesta at Banpara village, where the embankment was built.

But only a year ago, floods and river erosion were regular scenarios there, as about 13.5-km stretch of the embankment, from Golmunda to Banpara, was in a vulnerable state for a long time.

As a result, people of 30 villages under three unions - Golmunda, Sholmari and Koimari - in the upazila were the worst sufferers. Properties worth Tk 15 to 20 crore used to get damaged every year.

However, locals found new hope when a WDB project titled "Making Charalkata river straight and protection of Buri Teesta embankments" came into effect in 2021-2022 fiscal year.

Mahamudunnabi, a representative for "Save the Buri Teesta" movement, said not only was the embankment of Buri Teesta built, but the river was also dredged adequately to restore its navigability.

Nilphamari WDB Sub Divisional Engineer Abdul Hannan Prodhon said the project was a full fledged package that included river dredging, construction of embankment, flood protection works and tree plantation.

"Not only high embankments, but dredging is also important to control floods," he said.

During a recent visit to Banpara, Taluk Sholmari and Bokshipara villages, this correspondent saw many shoal people either sitting or having a walk by the newly constructed embankment.

Erosion victim Mahatabuddin, now living on other's land at Banpara, said, "If the dam was built two or three years ago, I wouldn't have become landless."

Nilphamari WDB Executive Engineer Krishnakamol Chandra Sarker said, "Beyond flood control, the impact of the project on ecology is great, as the river got back its navigability."

Burn cases surge amid winter chill

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Hasina National Institute of Burn and Plastic Surgery. But in winter, the hospitals give priority to accommodating more burn patients, doctors said.

After coronavirus gripped the country in 2020, the burn unit of DMCH was dedicated for Covid patients. The number of burn patients in the facility was about as low as 50 during that time. But now again, the whole unit is dedicated to burn patients. Besides, many patients are also coming to the outdoor unit with minor burns requiring primary treatment, doctors said.

While visiting the hospital, this newspaper also met four-year-old Arafat.

The child was playing in his house in Burichang upazila of Cumilla while his mother Parul Akhter was boiling bathwater. She was un mindful for few minutes, and Arafat fell in the hot water. The child sustained 13 percent burn injuries following the incident.

For the last 16 days, he has been at the burn unit of DMCH.

"Although almost everything is free at the government hospital, we still needed to spend about Tk 30,000 to buy some medicines and to meet our everyday cost," said Parul.

Mohammad Hasan, a college student from Barishal, came to visit his cousin in Mirpur-II recently. The two went out on Thursday morning

and while returning to his cousin's home in the evening, Hasan saw a group of people warming themselves with a fire they lit up using dried leaves and branches. Hasan and his cousin joined them. After a while, Hasan threw a branch into the fire to keep it running.

"As soon as I did it, the branch exploded and some splinters along with fire hit my face," he told The Daily Star.

He sustained eight percent burns and received treatment including burn dressing at the National Institute of Burn and Plastic Surgery on Thursday night. Talking to The Daily Star, Dr Samanta Lal Sen, chief national coordinator for plastic surgery and burn

projects in Bangladesh, said every year, the number of burn patients increases in winter as the usage of fire and cooking stove go up for the purpose of warming body, boiling water and heating curries.

Many times, it leads to unexpected fire incidents due to negligence and unawareness, he added.

Burn treatment is comparatively expensive than other treatments. Generally, a severe patient needs to stay at the hospital from one to six months, according to doctors.

"This winter, we could not accommodate all patients at the same time as the number of beds is still low. So, we are giving primary treatment to those who have small burns

and asking them to visit hospitals for dressing as per doctor's advice," Dr Sen said.

Dr Sen added that they have taken steps to create awareness among people. From this year, National Burn Day will be observed across the country to raise awareness, he added.
