Barua told The Daily Star that, "The incident of theft is true, and she deserves to be punished for that but in this case the investigation officer showed sheer negligence towards a victim of rape."

"As the accused were in police custody, the investigation officer should have taken measures for the victim's medical test when he came to learn about the rape. The medical report is highly valued in Section 32 of the Women and Child Repression Prevention Act. The police could have sought remand of the accused", he said.

"If the accused had confessed to raping the girl, the officer could have submitted separate charge sheets one for theft and another for rape", Jyotirmov Barua added.

Barua suggested department proceedings against the investigation officer over his playing down the rape Karim added.

Musk faces US fraud trial over Tesla tweet

Elon Musk, the CEO of electric car giant Tesla, will face trial on Tuesday over allegedly manipulating the stock market with a tweet after a federal judge rejected his request to move the case out of California.

The case dates back to August 2018 when Musk tweeted that he had sufficient funding to take Tesla private, causing a whirlwind in the company's share price.

Musk was swiftly sued by shareholders for allegedly costing them billions of dollars with the Twitter post that said funding was 'secured" to buy out the company's shareholders.

According to a spokesperson for the court, Judge Edward Chen on Friday refused to transfer the proceedings to Texas, the southern state where Musk moved Tesla's headquarters and jury selection is scheduled to begin on Tuesday.

Many businesses, including fossil fuel companies, rely heavily on carbon offset schemes based on afforestation to compensate for continuing carbon emissions.

But there has been growing interest the newest carbon dioxide removal (CDR) method, of which Climeworks is the industry leader -- a chemical process known as direct air carbon capture and storage (DACCS).

In its report last year, the United Nations' Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) warned that regardless of how quickly the world slashes greenhouse gas emissions, it will still need to suck CO2 from the atmosphere to avoid climate catastrophe.

But it remains to be seen whether this can be done at scale.

So far, Climeworks's direct air capture facility in Iceland -- the largest in the world -- removes in a year what humanity emits in three to four

The company has not divulged how much its clients are paying for the service, and how much CO2 each client wants extracted.

'Disastrous' flood warning in California as another storm hits

Disastrous flooding could hit parts of California this weekend, forecasters warned Friday, as the eighth storm in succession barreled in over land already too waterlogged to soak up any more rain.

The most populous US state has been pummeled by near-record downpours over a very wet three weeks, which have already caused flooding, landslides and widespread power outages.

At least 19 people are known to have died as communities struggle to cope with the constant deluge.

On Friday yet another system moved in, with forecasters warning the Monterey Peninsula could be cut off and the whole city of Salinas - home to 160,000 people -- flooded.

Iran executes British-Iranian

UK Foreign Secretary James Cleverly warned on Twitter that the execution would not go unchallenged, before announcing sanctions on Iran's prosecutor general to underline Britain's "disgust" Akbari's execution.

France condemned the execution "in the strongest terms" and said it cannot go "unanswered".

Iran summoned the British ambassador to protest what it described "unconventional interventions", after the UK said it would summon Tehran's envoy.

News of the hanging came only hours after the United States had joined its ally Britain in calling for Iran not to go ahead with the execution.

Amnesty International called the execution "abhorrent".

It tweeted that Akbari had been subjected to "torture and other illtreatment" such as being "forcibly administered chemical substances and being held in prolonged solitary confinement".

Media outlets in Iran, which does not recognise dual nationality for its citizens, had broadcast a video this week in which Akbari appeared to speak of his contacts with Britain.

BBC Persian this week aired an audio message it said was from Akbari in which he said he was tortured and forced to confess on camera to crimes he did not commit.

Mizan Online, citing the intelligence ministry, said Akbari had become a "key

spy" for MI6 due to "the importance of his position".

Akbari, a veteran of the 1980-88 Iran-Iraq war, was arrested between March 2019 and March 2020, state media said.

He was once identified by the government's official Iran newspaper as a former deputy defence minister under Ali Shamkhani, who currently heads Iran's Supreme National Security

Akbari had also been an adviser to the navy commander and headed a division at the defence ministry's research centre, state media said.
