BERC adjourns process to fix power price

BERC has adjourned the process of hearing for fixing the price of power after the government bypassed it and hiked the retail price of electricity last week.

"We held a meeting today and took the decision to adjourn the process on hearing for fixing the price of power," BERC member (electricity) Mohammad Bazlur Rahman told The Daily Star yesterday.

On January 8, BERC held a public hearing on proposals to hike the electricity price. The commission had working days to announce the new price since the hearing.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged the affluent section of the society to stand beside destitute people as her government has been working to arrange houses for the homeless



"Not a single person

will remain landless and homeless in Bangladesh. That is our goal," she told the representatives of the Bangladesh Association of Banks (BAB) during a meeting at her office

In the meeting, 36 banks donated a total of Tk 113.25 crore for the construction of houses for homeless people under Ashrayan-2 project, said PM's Deputy Press Secretary KM Shakhawat Moon while briefing reporters.

The premier said most of the country's homeless and landless people have already been given houses and the remaining ones will also get abodes. "Nothing can be greater than the smile and satisfaction of the people who got Ashrayan houses," she added.

She said many who got Ashrayan houses on twodecimal lands are also growing vegetables, rearing chickens, opening cottage industry and shops there. "They're finding a way to make a (decent) living. The life of the people is changing for the better," she said.

Hasina asked the well-off section to come forward in the construction of houses for landless and homeless

Whose interest will it serve?

Asks Shujan on government initiative to 'legally conduct surveillance on citizens'

There needs to be transparency about how surveillance technologies are being used to monitor citizens, said Shushashoner Jonno Nagorik (Shujan) in a statement yesterday.

"Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan told the national parliament on January 12 that the government is going to commence a method to legally conduct surveillance on citizens," pointed out the statement.

"We believe that there needs to be a transparent explanation about the scope of the technology that is being bought using the citizens' money and will be used against the citizens.'

If such technology is abused, there will not be personal privacy left in the country.

said the statement. The citizens have a right to know this, affirmed the statement.

"What was the aim behind the purchase of such technology, and in what context will it be used and whose interest will it serve? Under which law was this bought? There needs to be a clear explanation about these from the government," demanded Shujan.

Shujan fears that in the absence of a clear guideline, such surveillance technology could be abused to violate the constitutional rights of people that guarantee the privacy of personal communications and the right to freedom of expression.

Development budget for indigenous communities has gone down, finds MJF study

The government's development budget for indigenous communities decreased by Tk 108.86 crore in the last fiscal year when compared with the previous one, according to a new study commissioned by Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF).

The report says Tk 2,508.39 crore was allocated from the development budget in 2020-2021, which means an average of Tk 15,258 for each of the 16.44 lakh people belonging to these communities.

In 2021-2022, Tk 2,399.53 crore was allocated, Tk 14,543 for each of the 16.50 lakh people, it says.
