



Stand by the destitute: PM

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged the affluent section of the society to stand beside destitute people as her government has been working to arrange houses for the homeless.

"Not a single person will remain landless and homeless in Bangladesh. That is our goal," she told the representatives of the Bangladesh Association of Banks (BAB) during a meeting at her office in Dhaka.

In the meeting, 36 banks donated a total of Tk 113.25 crore for the construction of houses for homeless people under Ashrayan-2

First phase of Ijtema ends with prayer for peace

The first phase of the Biswa Ijtema concluded yesterday with the Akheri Munajat (final prayers), seeking peace on earth and prosperity for the Muslim Ummah.

Thousands of devotees gathered at the Ijtema ground on the Turag banks and on the roads adjacent to the Ijtema venue during the munajat.

Maulana Mohammad Zubayer, imam of Kakrail mosque, led the 20 minute munajat at 10:00am.

Ijtema is being held in two phases since 2012 to address the accommodation issue.

The second phase of the Ijtema is scheduled to be held on January 20-22 at the same venue.

In the first phase, total seven people have died from old-age complications and respiratory problems on the venue.

Meanwhile, a heavy traffic caused sufferings to the devotees as they had to walk a long way to reach the venue. Rest of the commuters had to stop on Dhaka-Mymensingh highway. "I had to walk for five kilometres to reach Ijtema venue," said Altaf Uddin of Badda. Aminul Islam, another devotee from Badda, echoed him.

Meanwhile, vehicular movements remained suspended on Tongi-Bhogra Bypass, Khamarpara road, Abdullahpur-Bypile road, and Ashulia road from 12:01am yesterday till the concluding prayers ended.

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Another blow for those already struggling

Development budget for indigenous communities has gone down, finds MJF study

The government's development budget for indigenous communities decreased by Tk 108.86 crore in the last fiscal year when compared with the previous one, according to a new study commissioned by Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF).

The report says Tk 2,508.39 crore was allocated from the development budget in 2020-2021, which means an average of Tk 15,258 for each of the 16.44 lakh people belonging to these communities.

In 2021-2022, Tk 2,399.53 crore was allocated, Tk 14,543 for each of the 16.50 lakh people, it says.

Findings of the report "An Analytical Study on Status of Budget Allocation and Budget Spent for Development of Ethnic People in Bangladesh (CHT and Plain Land)" was shared during a programme yesterday at the capital's Cirdap.

Addressing the programme as chief guest, Planning Minister MA Mannan praised the study and hoped that such work will be carried on in future.

He said the government is working to improve the livelihood of marginalised people.

Sharing the findings, lead researcher of the study economist Prof Abul Barkat said people of indigenous communities are one of the most marginalised in the country.

He said the study was "exploratory" and done in about a year.

Prof Barkat said it is hard to estimate how much money is allocated for a specific group of the population in the national budget. Yet, researchers tend to find a method to calculate the figure and say something conclusive so that, if need be, policymakers can use it. This has been applied in case of this study.

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Whose interest will it serve?

Asks Shujan on govt initiative to 'legally conduct surveillance on citizens'

There needs to be transparency about how surveillance technologies are being used to monitor citizens, said Shushashoner Jonno Nagorik (Shujan) in a statement yesterday.

"Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan told the national parliament on January 12 that the government is going to commence a method to legally conduct surveillance on citizens," pointed out the statement.

"We believe that there needs to be a transparent explanation about the scope of the technology that is being bought using the citizens' money and will be used against the citizens," said the statement.

The citizens have a right to know this, affirmed the statement.

"What was the aim behind the purchase of such technology, and in what context will it be used and whose interest will it serve? Under which law was this bought? There needs to be a clear explanation about these from the government," demanded Shujan.

Shujan fears that in the absence of a clear guideline, such surveillance technology could be abused to violate the constitutional rights of
