I'm not sure where you have heard it from, however it wasn't from me. When I sign a film, I have to

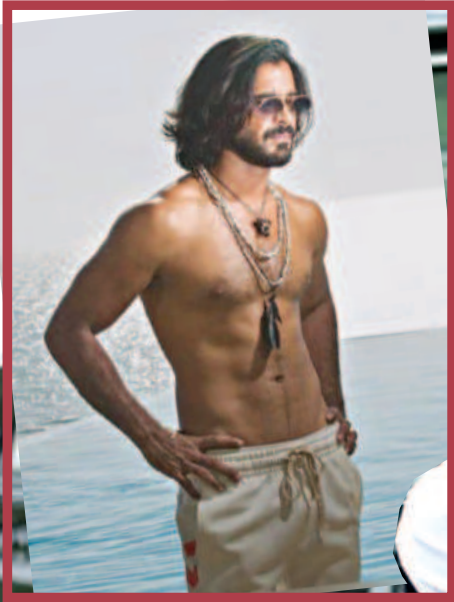

World's oldest runestone

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sometime between year one and 250 AD, Oslo's Museum of Cultural History said on Tuesday.

Normally erected at gravesites, especially during the Viking era, runes are stones inscribed with runic letters, the oldest alphabet known in Scandinavia.

The discovery, which could date from the time of Jesus Christ, is "a dream for runologists", who study ancient runic alphabets, inscriptions and their history, the museum in Oslo said.

"We thought that the first ones in Norway and Sweden appeared in the

years 300 or 400, but it turns out that some runestones could be even older than we previously believed", runologist Kristel Zilmer told Norwegian news agency NTB.

"It's a unique discovery", she said.

The origin of runestones remains largely a mystery.

Re-transcribed into the Latin alphabet, the inscription on the Tyrifjorden rune forms the unknown word "idiberug", perhaps a reference to the person lying in the grave.

The runestone will go on display at the Museum of Cultural History in Oslo from January 21 to February 26.

"Both of them were in special-coloured attire. They could be members of a terrorist insurgent group in Myanmar," Mohammad Ali said.

The BGB members are vigilant in the border area, he added.

Meanwhile, some unidentified criminals set some houses on fire at the camp around 4:00pm.

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aware in the 1970s that their core product was baking our planet," Guterres said.

He was referring to a study published in the journal Science that said ExxonMobil had dismissed the findings of its own scientists on the role of fossil fuels in climate change.

"Just like the tobacco industry, they rode roughshod over their own science," Guterres said, referring to lawsuits that determined cigarette companies had hidden the dangers of their products.

"Some in Big Oil peddled the big lie. And like the tobacco industry, those responsible must be held to account," he said.

In 1998, US states won a landmark settlement against tobacco companies worth \$246 billion aimed at recovering the costs of treating smokers from the harmful effects of cigarettes.

The study on ExxonMobil found that the firm's scientists had modelled and predicted global warming "with shocking accuracy", only for the company "to spend the next couple of decades denying that very climate science".

ExxonMobil is the target of a number of lawsuits in the United States.

Asked about the Science report, an ExxonMobil spokesman said last week that the issue had come up several times in recent years and in each case the company's answer was that "those who talk about how 'Exxon Knew' are wrong in their conclusions".

In his speech, Guterres urged the world to "end the addiction to fossil fuels" as he warned that the aspirational goal of limiting warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius (2.7 degrees Fahrenheit) from pre-industrial levels was "going up in smoke".

Nobel laureate Maria Ressa acquitted

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in prison.

"Today, facts win. Truth wins," a teary-eyed and defiant Ressa told reporters outside the Manila courtroom after the ruling on four government charges that she and her online media company Rappler had dodged taxes in a 2015 bond sale to foreign investors.

It was her first court acquittal since former president Rodrigo Duterte's government began filing charges against her. Ressa had earlier termed the cases "politically motivated" and "a brazen abuse of power".

The tax court said prosecutors failed to prove "beyond reasonable doubt" that Ressa and Rappler had evaded income taxes.

In a separate interview with AFP following her acquittal, Ressa said the verdict was a "victory for journalists" in the Philippines and around the world.

"If you stand up to power, yes you get beaten up (for) four years and two months. But right will win," Ressa said.

"I think this is hope for anyone who has been unjustly accused."

The 59-year-old has been battling a series of cases that media advocates say were filed due to her vocal

criticism of Duterte and his drug war, which claimed thousands of lives.

Ressa and Muratov were awarded the Nobel for their efforts to "safeguard freedom of expression".

Despite the ruling, Ressa still faces the threat of prison from the cyber libel case, while the future of Rappler, which she founded in 2012, remains uncertain.

Ressa told AFP she was more hopeful about the prospects in the remaining cases, although she had left her fate up to the courts.

"What we do know is that the world is watching and that we have a government that wants the world to watch. So I'm optimistic about it," Ressa said.

Rappler is challenging a Philippine Securities and Exchange Commission order to close for allegedly violating a ban on foreign ownership in media. Under the constitution, investment in the media is reserved for Philippine citizens or entities controlled by citizens.

The case springs from a 2015 investment by the US-based Omidyar Network, established by eBay founder Pierre Omidyar.

Omidyar Network later transferred its Rappler investment to the site's local managers to stave off efforts by

Duterte to shut it down.

The third outstanding case is also a tax-dodging charge against Ressa and Rappler.

Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos said in September he would not interfere in Ressa's cases, citing the separation of powers between the executive and judicial branches of government.

Trouble for Ressa and Rappler began in 2016, when Duterte came to power and launched a war against drug trafficking in which, according to official data, more than 6,200 people were killed in police anti-narcotics operations.

Rights groups estimate tens of thousands were killed.

Rappler was among the domestic and foreign media outlets that published shocking images of the killings and questioned the crackdown's legal basis.

Local broadcaster ABS-CBN -- also critical of Duterte -- lost its free-to-air licence, while Ressa and Rappler endured what press freedom advocates say was a grinding series of criminal charges, probes and online attacks.

Duterte's government said previously it had nothing to do with any of the cases against Ressa.

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feedback from all the districts, we will decide what to do next," he added.

Manjur then said the project officials will be investigated and he will see whether any financial irregularities took place.

Project Director Enamul Haque said demarcation in line with the CS, RS (Revisional Survey) and BS (Bangladesh Survey), has not been done on any river of the country.

That's why it is difficult to label anyone as an encroacher in legal terms, he said, adding that the Water Act 2013 and Port Act 1908 were his only options.

"As per these laws, 10 metres from a river bank outside port areas and 50 metres from a river bank in the port areas are part of the river," he said.

However, these laws do not specifically say that structures that are in the areas that fall in the aforesaid criteria are illegal, he added.

Declaring any structure as illegal will only be possible when the rivers are demarcated through a survey by district administrations, he said.

"We did our part. The rest lies with the commission," he added.

Former NRCC chairman Muzibur Rahman Howlader said the study was wonderful. "Had there been goodwill in the commission, it would have considered the list as a baseline to conserve the rivers."

The list was prepared in cooperation with the Water Development Board, Space Research and Remote Sensing Organisation, and the Directorate of Survey, he said, adding that there was no way to dismiss the list.

"By binning the list, the commission is letting the influential encroachers off the hook. There are some encroachers [on the list] whose names we even can't dare to utter."

Rizwana said, "The chairman of a constitutional organisation [NRCC]

can't act in a way that benefits the encroachers."

The reasons cited by the commission for not publishing the list are not credible, she said.

"The chairman could say the list is incomplete. If the CS was followed, the list of encroachers would be longer. But that does not mean this list is worthless. If there is a conflict between the CS and Water Act, the commission could have gone to a court, seeking remedy. But it chose to hide the list instead," she added.

This move will make those killing the rivers more ruthless, she said.

Sharif Jamil, general secretary of Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon, said withholding the names was a clear stand against the rules, laws and a High Court order that made NRCC the guardian of rivers. The commission should be tearing down the illegal structures instead of protecting the encroachers.
