







Nobel laureate Maria Ressa acquitted of tax evasion

Philippine Nobel Prize winner Maria Ressa was acquitted yesterday of tax evasion, among a slew of charges she has long maintained are politically motivated, calling the verdict a victory for "truth".

Ressa, who shared the Nobel Peace Prize with Russian journalist Dmitry Muratov in 2021, still faces three other cases, including a cyber libel conviction now under appeal that could mean nearly seven years SEE PAGE 6 COL 4

NRCC decision to withhold names draws flak

A Rohingya man was killed and another injured in a firing incident at Konarpara Rohingya Camp near the Tambru border in Bandarban's Naikhongchhari upazila yesterday. Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army (ARSA) and Rohingya Solidarity Organisation (RSO), two armed groups in Myanmar, are behind the firing, said Dil Mohammad, a

community leader of Konarpara Rohingya Camp. Multiple shooting incidents have taken place at the camp, situated on the zero line, since 6:00am, he added. Hamid Ullah, 27, a Rohingya man, suffered bullet injuries. He was rushed to the MSF-run hospital in

Kutupalong where doctors declared him dead, said Sheikh Mohammad Ali, officer-in-charge of Ukhia Police Station. The body was sent to Cox's Bazar Sadar Hospital morgue for an autopsy, he added.

Mohib Ullah, 25, another Rohingya man, also suffered bullet wounds. He was sent to the hospital for better SEE PAGE 6 COL 1

The National River Conservation Commission has decided not to publish a list of 37,000 new encroachers of 48 rivers and the environment activists say protecting their identities is tantamount to siding with the

The decision was made at a meeting of the commission on December 15 last year.

The meeting minutes say those who made the list did not follow the British-era Cadastral Survey (CS), which as per a High Court order, should be followed while demarcating rivers.

That's why making public the names of encroachers and

cause legal and administrative to follow the CS to prepare the list complications, added the minutes.

The list was made under a Tk 34 crore project to come up with a study that would also include descriptions of biodiversity, erosion and river health. The Project to Survey 48 Rivers was taken up in 2017 and it ended in December 2022.

Syeda Rizwana Hasan, chief executive of Bangladesh Environmental Lawyers Association, told The Daily Star that the commission apparently took the side of the encroachers by protecting their identities.

which would have required colossal work. But they chose the rather easy way of following the Water Act-2013 and Port Act-1908.

"They did not even have the CS map and record of rights [khatian] that are required to prove one is an encroacher. Otherwise, the list will fall flat if it is challenged in a court of law. The onus will be on me to prove with documents that the land is part of the river," he said.

He then referred to a High Court order issued by Justice Khairul Haque in 2009 that outlined how to reclaim rivers based on the CS.

WOMEN'S U-19 T20 WC Bangladesh romp to Super Six

Bangladesh U-19s topped Group A in the inaugural ICC U-19 Women's T20 World Cup, picking up a comfortable five-wicket win in their third and final group match against USA at Willowmoore Park B Field, Benoni to make it to the Super Six.

It was a disciplined performance with the ball from the young Tigresses as they restricted USA to 103 for four in 20 overs. USA opener Disha Dhingra (20) and number three Snigdha Paul (26) put up a 57-run stand for the second wicket but runs were hard to come by. Dhingra departed to a run-out in the 15th over and next delivery Bangladesh skipper Disha Bishwas, who led the bowling effort from the front, castled Snigdha to leave USA reeling. Disha finished with two for 13 that included a maiden while another medium pacer, Marufa Akter, bagged one for 17.

In reply, Bangladesh lost openers Sumaiya Akter and Afia Prottasha early, with the former holing out at short fine-leg for 10 before Afia found the fielder at mid-on to depart for seven. In-form Shorna Akter came in and quickly turned the tempo with a 14-ball 22, hitting a glorious six to showcase her growing confidence but was holed out to mid-off while attempting another big one against Sai Tanmayi Eyyunni. 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World's oldest runestone found in Norway



Norwegian archaeologists believe they have found the world's oldest runestone inscribed almost 2,000 years ago, making it several hundred centuries older than previous discoveries.

The brown sandstone rock, measuring about 30 by 30 centimetres (12 by 12 inches), was

found during the excavation of an ancient burial ground in late 2021, at Tyrifiorden northwest of Oslo, ahead of construction on a railway line.

Carbon dating of bones and wood found in a ave beside the rune suggest that it was inscribed

Addressing a room full of the world's business and political elite, Guterres drew a parallel between the actions of oil companies and those of tobacco companies that have been hit by huge lawsuits over the adverse effects of cigarettes.
