Second phase of Ijtema underway

Robbed off a playground for 16 years

Even a year after renovation, Golapbagh field still not opened

According to the Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) website, Golapbagh field is the single biggest playground in south Dhaka. This ground was closed for 10 years from 2006 as construction materials of the Mayor Mohammad Hanif Flyover were kept on the ground.

In 2017, the authorities started renovating the field, which ended in 2021. But even after one year, the ground has not been opened to locals. Youths of the area are robbed of a playground and an open space for 16 long

The authorities said locals will be able to use the ground once a management committee is formed.

DSCC sources said a boundary wall and fencing, a gymnasium, basketball court, pavilions, dressing rooms, waiting rooms, walkways, a library and market buildings were set up at the playground for Tk 16 crore. It was done under a project, titled "Different Infrastructure Development of Dhaka South City Corporation".

The contractor of the playground's renovation work, UDC Construction, completed the project by the end of

2021 after extending the deadline a couple of times. A lottery for allotment of 43 shops in the market building was also held on April 12 last year.

Arable land ravaged by industrial pollution

There were very few people on the road. Even the shops and tea stalls were vacant in Gazipur's Dokhola in the afternoon. It seemed life was calm and peaceful for the locals, even though the reality was far

The area lies under Mauna union of Gazipur's Shreepur upazila, the district that has several factories, accused of heavily polluting the environment.

Like the other areas of the district, there are many factories, dyeing and washing plants at Dokhola.

The vast areas of Mauna union's agricultural land have been ravaged due to untreated effluent from many of those factories, said locals.

"Ten years back, our fields were adorned with paddy and different types of vegetables round the year," said 70-yearold Azam Ali of Dokhola village.

"But now we cannot cultivate crops since our fields lost the ability to produce them due to the effluent discharge from

"Almost 1,000 acres of land in our road. ocality lost crop production capacity since the land remains submerged by effluent from the factories," added Azam.

Due to the sheer amount of effluent disposed into the canal from nearby factories, the canal overflows and submerges nearby arable lands.

Talking to this correspondent, Azam informed that the inundation has been occurring in their area ever since the Labalang canal flowing through their locality lost its navigability due to excess waste dumping.

"Let alone our crops, even the tins of our houses don't last for even two years. They get rusted due to chemical-induced air from the factories," said Abdul Jalal of the same area.

While visiting Muktijodhha Nurul



Haque Road, around one kilometre from the Mauna intersection on the Dhaka-Mymensingh highway, this correspondent saw several factories on both sides of the

and discharged liquid into drains covered with concrete slabs.

Ideally, the effluent was supposed to be treated and cleaned before discharging, but most factories don't obey the rule.

The truth came to light when this correspondent reached the Labalang

A deep brown liquid was coming out from the drains and kept mixing with the canal's dark-coloured water, indicating that it has been polluted for a long time.

"Vast agricultural lands have been ravaged on both sides of the canal, stretching around 50 kilometres from Shreepur upazila to Mirzapur upazila's Bhawal in Tangail," said Khorshed Alam, a member of National River Conservation

Committee, Shreepur unit.

"In the early phase of the pollution, factory effluents were being drained out through Labalang canal and straight to Turag River. Once the canal bed had filled up with waste dumped by the municipality and factories, the canal overflowed and the untreated factory liquid spread in the arable land," he said.

"We have been protesting the pollution for eight years with rallies, processions and human chains. However, none of the authorities paid any heed," Khorshed added.

ASM Muaidul Hasan, agriculture officer of Shreepur upazila, said in a rough estimate, around 350 hectares of agricultural land have been reduced in the last 3 to 4 years in the upazila. However, a vast survey is required to determine the exact picture of land loss.

"Not all factories, but dyeing and washing factories are the main polluters in

3 die in Gazipur road accidents

Three people including two college students died in separate road accidents in Kaliakoir and Sreepur upazilas of Gazipur yesterday morning.

The deceased were identified as Mia Chan, 60, a labourer of Nagarpur upazila in Tangail, Shakil Hossain, 18, of Kishoreganj and Siam, 18, of Phulbaria village in Kapasia.

Of them, the two students, Shakil and Siam, died on the spot when their motorcycle skidded and hit the railing of a bridge on Prohladpur-Gazipur road at Sreepur around 8:30am.

Confirming the accident, officer-in-charge of Sreepur Police Station Md Moniruzzaman said, Shakil and Siam were students of Gazipur BGMEA

Meanwhile, Kalikoir Police Station's Inspector Abul Bashar said Mia Chan, who was on a CNGrun auto-rickshaw, was going to Kaliakoir from Mawna around 9:30pm when a truck coming from the opposite direction hit the vehicle he was on.

He died on the spot. Police recovered the body and sent it to family members.

Dhaka's air 'hazardous' most polluted

Dhaka once again topped the list of world cities with the worst air quality yesterday morning.

With an air quality index (AQI) score of 317 at 8:00am yesterday, Dhaka ranked first in the list of cities with the worst air.

An AQI between 151 and 200 is said to be 'unhealthy', while a score between 201 and 300 is considered 'very unhealthy'

On the other hand, an AQI score between 301 and 400 is considered 'hazardous' and is supposed to be posing serious health risks to residents.
