Rising input cost worries Boro farmers

Saiful Islam has lately been busy preparing his five bighas of land to grow paddy. But he reckons he will have to spend Tk 25,000 more than he did last season for the cultivation as the cost of just about everything has gone up.

The farmer of Rangpur is worried whether the price of paddy will reflect the rising cost of farming.

Fuel for the tiller machines and water pumps, fertiliser, pesticide, seed, farm workers and everything in between would now cost an estimated Tk 19,900 for each bigha of land, up from last year's Tk 14,900.

This is a heavy burden for me because I didn't make much profit from my produce last year," says Saiful.

Like him, hundreds of thousands of paddy growers in the 16 northern districts are finding it difficult to cope with what many of them said is a 25 percent rise in the cost of farming Boro paddy

Some expressed fears that the costs may

rise even further in the coming weeks.

Agricultural economist Jahangir Alam Khan said Boro accounts for 54 percent of the country's annual rice production.

"A good yield of Boro is particularly important this year because of the concerns over food security," he told The Daily Star, adding that the government should immediately start providing farmers

BNP goes for fresh agitation

To hold rallies at divisional headquarters on February 4

The BNP yesterday announced that it would hold divisional rallies on February 4 as part of the ongoing simultaneous movement by the party and its like-minded political platforms.

The opposition party made the announcement from a rally in front of its Nayapaltan headquarters in the capital. The Dhaka north and south city units of the party organised the event marking the "democracy

Traffic was disrupted on one lane of the road in front of the BNP office the other lane was blocked during the rally.

Speaking at the programme, BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir announced that the party will stage divisional rallies on February 4 protesting the "killings and repression" by the Awami League government, and demanding the prices of essentials and electricity be cut.

"The incumbent government has restored Baksal [one party rule] in disguise of democracy. Now it is plotting to hold an election of mockery and drama, but people will not allow such an election this time," he said. Fakhrul alleged that the AL killed democracy, and it was destroying people's hopes and dreams every day. "This Awami League government

must be unseated through a movement." Criticising the ruling party for announcing counter-programmes on the day of BNP's demonstrations, he said the AL was doing this out of "fear of losing power".

About the coming presidential election, the BNP leader said, "Which presidential election is going to be held? The president doesn't have any power. The president cannot do anything without having the opinion of the prime minister. That's why we have put forward a proposal for state

'Please point out my failures, I'll correct them' PM asks Jatiya Party in JS

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday asked the main opposition in parliament to point out if there was any failure on her part and said she would correct herself accordingly.

The premier was replying to a question from Jatiya Party lawmaker Fakhrul Imam.

"People will judge the successes and failures, it is not my responsibility to judge that. Why would I fail if I work with honesty and specific goals for the welfare of the people?" she said Hasina also asked the Jatiya Party to find out her

failures saying, "When you are so interested, please point outmy failures, and I will correct them." The premier said she has worked for the welfare of the

grassroots people after the formation of the government. "People are getting the benefits now. Elderly people will know the radical changes in Bangladesh in the last 14

years," she said. But, today's generation will not know that, she added. In response to a question from ruling party lawmaker AKM Rahmatullah, the PM said after the killing of Bangabandhu, Ziaur Rahman seized power illegally and

Chief Election Commissioner Habibul Awal yesterday said they were not disappointed over the suspension of a proposal for buying two lakh electronic voting machines.
