Man held after bodies of wife, daughter found in hotel

Tourist police early yesterday arrested a man from Chattogram city after the bodies of his wife and daughter were found in a Cox's Bazar hotel room on Friday noon.

The arrestee is Dulal Biswas from Banskhali upazila of Chattogram.

Shaheen, an additional SP of Cox's Bazar Tourist Police, said Dulal went into hiding soon after the bodies of his wife and daughter were found, and police arrested him from Chattogram city around 12:00am yesterday.

Dulal is being interrogated, he said, adding that legal actions will be taken in this regard later.

Earlier on Friday afternoon, police recovered the bodies of 35-year-old Suma Dey and her two-year-old daughter from Hotel Sea Alif in Cox's Bazar.

Police said the couple booked a room at the hotel on February 14 with their two sons and a daughter.

A hotel employee saw the door of the room open and found the bodies of the mother and daughter on the floor. Later, police recovered the bodies from the room after getting a call from the hotel.

Whereabouts of his two sons are not known yet, said police.

Five more hospitalised with dengue

Five more people were hospitalised with dengue in 24 hours till yesterday morning.

Of the new patients, three were admitted to hospitals in Dhaka and the rest outside it, according to the Directorate General of Health Services. Thirty-eight dengue patients, including 16 in the capital, are now receiving treatment at hospitals across the country.

So far, the DGHS has recorded 691 dengue cases, 645 recoveries, and eight deaths this year.

National footballer 'forced' out of her home

Accuses neighbours of 'continuous disturbance'

Mili Akter, 17, goalkeeper for the nation's much-lauded women's football team, was forced to leave her home with her family two months ago, following continuous trouble created by her neighbours.

The family is now living at a rented house in Nandail Chowrasta area of Mymensingh.

Mili, the daughter of a banana vendor, hails from Baroigram village in Chandipasha union of Nandail.

As the family barely had a roof over their head, a government house was allocated for them in 2018 under the Ashrayan Project-2. She, her elderly parents, and four sisters had been living in that small house since then.

But on February 14, Mili lodged a complaint with Nandail Police Station, accusing four persons, including one Abul Hossain, of forcibly driving them away from their own home, through continuous harassment.

Mili claimed that her uncle Abul Hossain, who also happens to be their next-door neighbour, has been bothering them in various ways for years.

According to Mili, Abul, a retired railway employee, and her family members keep piled up garbage in front of her house.

Besides, stagnant water from Abul's tube well has blocked the entrance to the home.

Apart from playing as a backup goalkeeper in the Bangladesh national team, Mili regularly represented the red and green side at the under-15, 16 and 17 levels, and achieved numerous accolades.

"But due to the family crisis, I'm currently on leave and staying back at home. My training has come to a standstill because of this," she told this correspondent recently.

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Mango trees in full bloom

Mango flowers have been spreading a sweet aroma in every corner of Chapainawabganj, and the trees are covered with yellowish blossoms as far as the eye can see.

Chapainawabganj, also known as the "mango capital" of Bangladesh, is the largest producer of the delectable fruit.

According to experts and producers, favourable climatic circumstances are anticipated to contribute to a higher yield of mango this season in Chapainawabganj.

Palash Sarkar, deputy director of Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE), said over 80 percent of mango trees in the orchards and homesteads have already bloomed in the district.

He informed that there are 28,26,000 mango trees

on 37,588 hectares of land in Chapainawabganj. The climatic conditions are still favourable.

If this continues, around 4 lakh tonnes of mango will be produced this season, he added.

The area of the mango orchards and the number of trees has increased in the district. Last year, 3.13 lakh tonnes of mango were produced on 37,165 hectares.

Habib Al Sadi, an orchard owner of Chhatrajpur in Shibganj upazila, said he has around 220 mango trees in his orchards and the condition of the orchards is better this year.

Over 80 percent of mango trees are in full bloom in the current season. One can hardly find any mango tree having no flowers in the groves here, he said.

Munjir Alam, a leaseholder of orchards at Dakshin Sahar in Sadar upazila, said, "I bought 2,800 mango trees for this season

with Tk 10 lakh. Over 90 percent of mango trees are in full bloom in my orchards."

Mango growers and agriculture officials said mangoes are the most important cash crop in the region and the income, and livelihood of people is heavily dependent on the fruit.

A large number of people are engaged in different jobs, from nursing to harvesting and packaging during the mango season every year.

The region has a long tradition of producing different varieties of mango, they said.

Chapainawabganj mangoes are key to the country's agricultural growth, largely benefiting the economy of the district's rural areas.

Mango growers and traders, every year, export thousands of tonnes of the fruit to the capital, Chattogram, Sylhet, Khulna and other districts.

Keep train speed under 20km in Lawachara
Railways ministry asks BR director general

The Ministry of Railways has recently asked the director general of Bangladesh Railway to take measures for limiting train speed to 20 kilometres per hour while moving through Lawachara National Park in Moulvibazar.

The initiative has been taken to prevent accidental death of wildlife and ensure free movement of animals inside the park, which is also a reserve forest.

The Daily Star got a copy of the directive that was issued on January 29. But it came to light yesterday after forest officials received copies of it.

For the last couple of years, environmentalists and forest officials have been demanding limiting the speed to 20 km per hour inside the forest, as many wild animals have been killed and injured after being hit by trains.

At least 35 wild animals were killed in train accidents and many were injured in the last five years in Lawachara National Park, according to a document of the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change.

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A municipality or garbage dump?

The entrance to Patuakhali municipal area, the gateway to Kuakata, has now transformed into a dumping ground as the authorities are yet to set up a designated spot for garbage dumping.

According to sources at the municipality office, around 30-32 tonnes of household waste are being dumped regularly on the sides of the Patuakhali-Kuakata highway near the municipality's entrance.

While the unplanned dumping of garbage causes inconvenience to tourists and locals, the strong stench coming from the space has made the area unsuitable for living.

Protesting against the issue, a few conscious citizens have submitted a petition to the Patuakhali municipality mayor, demanding the removal of waste from the spot.



The petition was submitted to the municipality office following a press conference, which was organised at Patuakhali Press Club on January 18.

As per the petition, household wastes from the area are dumped on the road on the northern side of the Patuakhali Bridge toll plaza, which is next to the Patuakhali-Kuakata highway.

This area is home to about 10,000 people.

Earlier, the waste used to be dumped on the Laukathi river banks, near BSCIC industrial area, which was causing serious harm to the waterbody and its marine life.

On September 4, Manjur Ahmed Chowdhury, chairman of National River Conservation Commission, visited the area and instructed the authorities concerned to clear the river banks,
