## **Undoing of** Bangladesh economy

In the end, it was a war that began some 5,800 kilometres away a year ago that laid bare the longstanding weaknesses of the Bangladesh economy.

Low tax revenue, overreliance on imports, narrow export base, inefficacy of the central bank's monetary policy methodology, interest rate caps, project cost overruns and banking sector weakness are some of the structural problems.

The issues left the country exposed to the wrath of the war, which escalated global commodity prices.

This sparked a cost of living crisis in Bangladesh, drained the central bank's reserves at an alarming rate, compelled the government to go into harsh austerity mode and left the economy mumbling.

Growth has weakened, the taka has depreciated by about 25 percent and reserves have shrunk by about 28 percent, prompting the government to knock at the doors of the International Monetary Fund for support. But that does not mean that people like Alam Hossen

Says IMF Asia-Pacific director on Bangladesh's loan programme

Bangladesh's economic crisis will not go away if the government does not strictly adhere to the conditions tagged with the International Monetary Fund's 42-month loan programme, said the lender's top official.

"Implementation is the key," said Krishna Srinivasan, director of the IMF's Asia-Pacific department in response to questions from Bangladeshi ournalists earlier this week in New Delhi.

IMF organised a threeday training programme for economic and financial reporting at the Indian capital for a select group journalists from Bangladesh, Bhutan, Nepal and the Maldives.

The Washington-based multilateral lender has designed the \$4.7 billion programme around restoring macroeconomic stability, increasing tax revenue, addressing banking sector vulnerabilities, modernising monetary policy framework and climate- and

pandemic-preparedness. If the programme is well-adhered to, the upsides are pretty strong, he said.

"In every country where we had a programme, if the programme is adhered to, there is a virtuous cycle which comes back and the problem we faced start declining. That is the whole idea. Being on the programme is one thing,

implementing the programme is equally important."

Bangladesh 'proactively' reached out to he IMF for fund the country faced back-toback shocks, which left its economic growth tapering off, external accounts weak, reserves strained and currency

depreciating rapidly. "If the programme is implemented, you will see a reversal in the context of the shocks. When a country comes to the IMF, its reserves have fallen. Once the programme is implemented, you build reserves organically.'

The objectives set out by Bangladesh's loan programme have been cherry-picked by the government itself and not the IMF.

## Uprooted from a life once stable

#### Bangladeshis displaced by the Russia-Ukraine war still struggling to start afresh

Mehedi Hasan Mohon knew his life would never be the same when the Russia-Ukraine war began a year ago.

"Back in Kyiv, I had my own house and automobile business. Now, I'm living in the Netherlands as a refugee," he told The Daily Star over the phone.

Mohon had gone to Ukraine 32 years ago on a scholarship for higher education. "I had been there since then and married a Ukrainian woman.

"I had to struggle a lot to settle there. I did various jobs before being able to start my own business. Despite all of that, I was leading a very happy life. But then the war came and all my happiness went away."

### **HAJJ REGISTRATION** Poor response compels govt to extend deadline

Only 18,140 Bangladeshis have completed registration till date to perform hajj this year

against the country's quota of 1.27 lakh.

Due to the poor response in registration, the government has extended the registration deadline to February 28 from yesterday.

At least 15,000 of the 1.27 lakh were upposed to perform the ritual under government management and the rest under private management.

Top leaders of Hajj Association of Bangladesh (HAAB) and Association of Travel Agents of Bangladesh (ATAB) said despite the huge interest of people in performing hajj, fewer people registered due to the high cost of hajj packages this year. According to sources at the religious

affairs ministry, of the 18,140 registered people, 11,248 will perform hajj under private management and the rest under government management.

Hajj agencies now doubt whether Bangladesh will be able to meet the quota this year if the costs are not reduced.

# Lack of political consensus may lead to chaos

#### Says chief election commissioner

Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Habibul Awal has said the country's law and order may deteriorate and public safety may be jeopardised if the next national election is held without a political consensus.

"It may put people in danger. We don't expect such a

situation in the country," he said.

The CEC made the comments yesterday while talking to reporters after a meeting with Election Monitoring Forum (EMF), a platform of election observers, at the capital's Nirbachan Bhaban.

We urge the ruling party to make cordial attempts so that opposition political parties participate in the national election and we can present an acceptable, credible and transparent election to the nation," he said.

The political division over the caretaker government issue remains one of the major challenges to holding a fair and credible election, Habibul observed.

The CEC, however, expressed optimism that major political parties would be able to reach a consensus before the parliamentary polls, scheduled to be held in late December this year or early January next year.

"The election is still a few months away. We hope that we will see a political consensus and all political parties will join the polls."

He said the EMF delegation was comprised of some foreign election observers, including former Nepal prime minister Jhala Nath Khanal.
