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\$500m at best from WB this fiscal

Govt fails to implement reforms to unlock more funds

The government can expect budget support of \$500 million at best from the World Bank this fiscal year after it failed to implement key reforms that would have unlocked the entire \$1 billion it was seeking.

As per the original plan, \$250 million was supposed to come from the Green, Resilient Inclusive Development (GRID) programme and another \$250 million from the Development Policy Credit (DPC) scheme.

Further amount would have been mobilised were the government able to meet more conditions, which would have been tangential to DPC's.

CONDITIONS FULFILLED FOR \$500M

The government has more or less met the conditions for the GRID but is yet to meet any of the 12 conditions for DPCs, which encompass reforms in fiscal policy and the financial sector and setting guardrails to future shocks.

The conditions for GRID include setting up a cell in the planning ministry to coordinate the Delta Plan 2100, policies for energy efficiency, renewable energy and green procurement and so on, foundational steps for establishing carbon pricing.

Adoption of the Mujib Climate Prosperity Plan figures

6 killed as blast rips thru oxygen plant

At least 30 injured; many nearby buildings, parked vehicles damaged

Six people were killed and at least 30 others injured in an explosion at an industrial oxygen plant in Sitakunda, Chattogram, yesterday

The explosion at Seema Oxygen Plant in the Keshabpur area rocked nearby neighbourhoods around 4:40pm. The roof of the building of the main plant was blown off and large chunks of

steel and iron flew in all directions, damaging numerous buildings and vehicles.

A projectile from the plant killed a 60-yearold man at a market nearly a kilometre away from the facility, said Shahadat Hossain, upazila nirbahi officer of Sitakunda.

Residents of the area said there was no electricity in the area after the blast, and gas cylinders were seen strewn everywhere around the facility.

Panic grips Panchagarh Ahmadiyya villages

Homes, businesses burnt to ground; tension still high as fresh rumours being spread

He spent his entire life savings to build a house for his family, and then he had to watch that house go up in flames in a matter of minutes. It's all because he belongs to the Ahmadiyya community.

Around 11:00am yesterday, 80-year-old Shahid Ahmed was seen sitting speechless in front of his fire-ravaged home.

He was one of the many from his community that came under attack by supporters of some Islamist outfits in Panchagarh Sadar on Friday. A resident of Ahmednagar village, Shahid said, "My family and I were at the Jalsa Salana venue after Jum'a prayers when we suddenly heard that our house was torched. We rushed there and found our home set ablaze." Akhi, Shahid's daughter, said, "We were lucky that we were not in the

house at that time. I think the attackers would have killed us if we were.' Veteran freedom fighter Mohammad Ali's house too wasn't spared. "We fought for the country in 1971. And this is how we are being rewarded at the end stage of our lives...

"I was alone in the house as the others went to the Jalsa in the afternoon. A group of people suddenly attacked our house with sticks, iron rods and machetes. While I ran to safety, my house, including the furniture and everything else inside, was burnt to ashes. His neighbour Md Hanif, also a freedom fighter, said, "The attackers

In a move that may raise more concerns in Dhaka, the Mamata Banerjee government in West Bengal on Friday took possession of about 1,000 acres of land proposing to dig two canals to channel water from the Teesta Barrage Project for irrigation.

Bangladesh is waiting for the Teesta water-sharing deal with India for more than a decade to solve the water scarcity in the northern parts of the country. New Delhi and Dhaka couldn't clinch a pact to share the Teesta waters because of objections raised by West Bengal chief minister Mamata Banerjee in 2011.
