

PROTECTING HIGH SEAS

UN member states agree 'historic' deal

Environmental groups say it will help reverse marine biodiversity losses

UN member states have finally agreed to a text on the first international treaty after years of negotiations to protect the high seas, a fragile and vital treasure that covers nearly half the planet.

"The ship has reached the shore," conference chair Rena Lee announced at the UN headquarters in New York shortly before 9:30pm (0230 GMT yesterday), to loud and lengthy applause from delegates.

The exact wording of the text was not immediately released but environmental groups say the deal will help reverse marine biodiversity losses and ensure sustainable development after more than 15 years of discussions.

The treaty is seen as essential to conserving 30 percent of the world's land and ocean by 2030, as agreed by world governments in a historic accord signed in Montreal in December.

Following two weeks of intense talks, including a marathon overnight session Friday into Saturday, delegates finalized a text that now cannot be significantly altered.

"There will be no reopening or discussions of substance," Lee told negotiators.

The agreement will be formally adopted at a later date once it has been vetted by lawyers and translated into the United Nations' six official languages, she announced.

> The high seas begin at the border of countries' exclusive economic zones, which extend up to 200 nautical miles (370 kilometers) from coastlines. They thus fall under the jurisdiction of no country.

> Even though the high seas comprise more than 60 percent of the world's oceans and nearly half the planet's surface, they have long drawn far less attention than coastal waters and a few iconic species.

Ocean ecosystems create half the oxygen humans breathe and limit global warming by absorbing much of the carbon dioxide emitted by human activities.

But they are threatened by climate change, pollution and overfishing. Only about one percent of the high seas are currently protected.

When the new treaty comes into force it "This is a historic day for conservation and a sign that in a divided world, a spokesperson who said the agreement will allow the creation of marine protected areas in these international waters.

Rab gets 96th extension for probe report submission

A Dhaka court yesterday extended till April 9 the deadline for submitting the probe report of a case filed over the murders of journalist couple Sagar Sarowar and Meherun Runi in February 2012.

This is the 96th extension of the deadline for the probe report submission.

Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Md Rashidul Alam passed the order after Rab Additional Superintendent of Police Khondoker Md Shafiqul Alam, also the case's investigation officer, failed to submit the report yesterday, court sources said.

On January 4, the same court asked Rab to submit the probe report by yesterday.

Earlier, two separate courts expressed dissatisfaction over the probe, and the investigators' failure to unearth the motive behind the murders and arrest the real culprits.

Teenage boy killed in road accident

A teenage boy was killed after being hit by a bus in the capital's Jatrabari area yesterday morning.

Miraj Hossain, 15, son of bus driver Akram Hossain, was going to Golapbagh from his home in Sayedabad to meet his father, said victim's uncle Younus Ali Khan.

Around 10:30am, a bus of Tisha Plus Paribahan hit the boy when he was crossing the road near a ramp of Mayor Hanif Flyover, he added.

Miraj was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital where doctors declared him, said Tanvir Hossain, sub-inspector of Jatrabari Police Station.

Police seized the bus and detained its driver after the accident.

Illegal Saudi visa trade busted

The arrested ministry officials are sergeant of the Court Security (Rivadh Police) Metab Saad Al-Ghnoum, and corporal of the Special Missions Forces in Riyadh Hatem Mastoor Saad bin Tayeb.

Upon further investigation, Bangladeshi expats Ashraf Uddin Aknad, Almgeer Hussain Khan, and Shafeeq Al Islam Shahjahan were arrested.

The three Bangladeshis, the Palestinian, and the two ministry officials admitted to engaging in illegal visa trading with the complicity of the employees of the Saudi embassy in Bangladesh.

"...By searching their homes, 20,180,000 SR [about Tk 57.54 crorel was found in cash, as well as gold ingots, and luxury vehicles, which turned out to be the proceeds of illegally selling work visas in the

Kingdom," reads a tweet. The other Bangladeshi arrestees are recruitment agency owner Mohammed Nasser Uddin Noor, and Al Ameen Khan, Zaid Uosied Mafy, Abul Kalam Mohammed Rafeeq Al Islam and Aziz Al Haq.

They were arrested for involvement in illegal visa trading and money smuggling outside the kingdom.

"Nazaha affirms on continuation to pursue anyone who exploits the public office to achieve personal gain or harm public interest in any way, and that the accountability extends far beyond the retirement of individuals, as these types of crimes have no statute of limitations," it

HAPPENED IN DHAKA

Sources in Dhaka told this newspaper that three Saudi embassy officials were suspended around two months ago for taking bribes from recruiting agencies for issuing work visas. The third official who has not been arrested is yet to be identified.

The findings by the Saudi antigraft body were corroborated by several international recruiting agents of Bangladesh.

According to them, the Saudi embassy in Dhaka about a year ago started charging recruiting agencies \$220 to \$250 for every work visa.

Lax monitoring, lack of safety gear to blame

"The embassy suddenly set a rule that one recruiting agency would not be allowed to submit more than 20 visa applications a week and an agency would submit applications only once a week," a recruiting agent

However, many agencies had several hundred passports to deal with. As they were desperate to have the work visas issued within a certain period, some individuals at the embassy started taking money.

"Thus, the visas were issued in exchange for money. Interestingly, we had to pay in dollars when there was a shortage of dollars in the country," a recruiting agent told The Daily Star.

The malpractice, however, stopped after the Saudi officials concerned were sent back to Saudi Arabia, the agent added.

Bangladesh's labour recruitment to Saudi Arabia surged phenomenally last year, with a total of 612,412 migrating to the kingdom. In the first two months of this year, 85,319 migrated there.

Interestingly, migrant remittance from the kingdom, where some 20 lakh Bangladeshis work, declined over the last two quarters.

the fire was caused by a cooking Bazar, where more than one million people live in extremely crowded conditions, with bamboo and tarpaulin shelters packed closely together.

Similar fires occurred in January 2022 and March 2021. While the fire in 2022 only damaged some 1,200 homes, the massive blaze in 2021 killed at least 15 refugees, including 6 children, and destroyed over 9,000 homes.

The walls on the second floor collapsed and shards of glass and brick chunks were blown to nearby areas, witnesses

Four fire engines brought the fire under control around 11:15am.

Abdul Qadir, a security guard of an adjacent 14-storey building, said, "The explosion was so strong that the entire area trembled. Shortly afterwards, the residents of the building started coming out on to the street in panic. I saw people lying in front of the threestory building and everything was destroyed."

There were offices of an insurance company and a stationery product supplier on the second floor.

Deceased Shafiquzzaman Shafiq, 42, a computer operator; Sadikur Rahman Tusher, 31, a storekeeper; and Abdul Mannan, 63, an office assistant; were staffers of the stationery supplier. "The three died on the spot.

Something heavy fell on them during the blast," said Prof AMSM Sharfuzzaman, a doctor of the Popular Medical College Hospital which is close to the scene.

Mannan had been working there for over four decades. His wife Shahida Begum told The Daily Star, "We lost our only nine-year-

Five insurance company employees, including Zahur Ali with 44 percent burns, Ayesha Akter Asha with 38 percent burns, and Akbar Ali with 37 percent burns, were admitted to the burn institute, said Dr Samanta Lal Sen, coordinator of the institute.

A Dhaka University student and an autorickshaw driver also suffered

critical head injuries in the explosion. Traffic movement on Mirpur Road -- from Science Lab to Nilkhet intersection -- remained suspended

A team from the Bangladesh Army, and the bomb disposal unit of Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime (CTTC) went to the scene to find out what caused the blast. They ruled out explosives and suspected that accumulated gas might have caused the explosion.

With our detector, we have found the presence of gas at the scene. The massive scale of damage also suggests that the blast was caused by accumulated gas," Rahmat Ullah Chowdhury, in-charge of the bomb disposal unit, told The Daily Star, adding that the gas could have been from a leak in the pipeline or it could have come from the sewer.

"An explosion may occur if there is presence of 5-12 percent gas in the air of a confined space," he said.

Brig Gen Md Main Uddin, director general (DG) of Bangladesh Fire Service and Civil Defence, also said they suspect gas to be the cause. Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP)

Commissioner Khandker Golam Faruq ruled out sabotage and initiated a probe into the incident.

Contacted, Akram Hossain, owner of the stationery supplying company, said he had raised concerns about the safety and maintenance of the building but no action was taken as the owner lives abroad.

The Daily Star could not reach the owner of the building for comments.

But Sheema Group maintains all its papers are up-to-date and the plant had all kinds of fire extinguisher

"It was an accident during operation. Please don't blame us," said Md Najim Uddin, a director of Sheema Group, which operates two oxygen factories, steel re-rolling mills and shipbreaking yards at Sitakundu.

No case was filed in connection with the deadly explosion as of 6:00pm, Tofayel Ahmed, the officerin-charge of Sitakunda Model Police Station, told The Daily Star.

Meanwhile, another Sitakundu blast victim Probesh Lal Sharma, 55, who was undergoing treatment at the ICU of CMCH, died around 11:35pm, said CMCH Director Brig

Gen Shamim Ahsan.

The factory owners were missing and there was no contact from them after the incident, said Abul Bashar Md Fakhruzzaman, deputy Chattogram of commissioner

Abdul Alim, managing director of Sheema Oxygen, arrived at the site 19 hours after the incident, which claimed six lives and injured more than 25 persons.

"It is not true that we were missing we were busy with ensuring treatment for the injured in various hospitals. Our priority was to rush the injured to the hospitals to save their lives and we did that," said Najim, also the MD of Sheema Steel Re-rolling

Sheema Group will bear all the

treatment costs of the injured and financially support the family of the deceased, he said. "We are not sure how the incident

took place but we will compensate

the deceased and injured," Alim said. Meanwhile, the blast also damaged two nearby factories -- Harun Steel Re-Rolling Mill and Rubaiya Oxygen Plant -- bringing their production to a halt. So ferocious was the explosion at around 4:40 pm on Sunday that the factories' walls and machinery were blown away.

The blast affected the electricity line causing a power cut in the Keshabpur area. Sheema Oxygen plant's roof blew off and large chunks of steel and iron flew in all directions, damaging numerous buildings and vehicles.
