



Govt working to build Sheikh Mujib Film City PM says at Nat'l Film **Awards ceremony**

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday handed out The National Film Awards 2021 at a star-studded event, featuring some of the biggest celebrities and artists from across Bangladesh, as they all gathered at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre.

Usually, the award is given in a total of 28 categories. However, this year, 34 awards were given in a total of 27

This year, the jury board selected the winners from the eventual submissions of 21 full-fledged films, 17 short films, and 7 documentary films -- totalling 45 films. While the winners were announced by the information ministry on January

Gunpowder, petrol used in attacks on Ahmadiyyas

Says Panchagarh SP

Miscreants used gunpowder and petrol during attacks on members of the Ahmadiyya community over a Jalsa event that left two dead and over 50 injured on March 3 in Panchagarh Sadar, said police.

SM Sirajul Islam Huda, superintendent of the district police, came up with the claim at a press conference at his office yesterday, six days after the incident, reports UNB.

The attackers used gunpowder and petrol for setting establishments on fire, he added, reports UNB.

Meanwhile, Thakurgaon correspondent reported that police arrested 30 people in connection with attacks between Wednesday night and early vesterday.

With this, the number of total arrestees is now 165, said police.

"We are arresting people on the basis of specific information and footage, irrespective of their political backgrounds," said SP Huda yesterday.

The incident was pre-planned and a group of trained cadres, equipped with lethal weapon, carried out the attacks on the Ahmadiyya community, the policeman claimed.

On March 3, two people were killed and at least 30 others, including seven policemen, injured in a clash between law enforcers and supporters of Islamist organisations demonstrating against SEE PAGE 6 COL 6

Two vendors reluctant to supply fuel to BPC

Late payments to blame

giant Unipec about

Two of the six vendors of the Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation have expressed reservations about providing further fuel cargos, in a development that raises questions of whether the state agency would be able to ensure uninterrupted supply in the coming

BPC owes Singapore-based Vitol Asia and China's oil trading giant Unipec about \$282 million amid the ongoing dollar crunch.

Earlier in 2020, the two won a tender to

supply up to 1.06 million tonnes of oil products in the first half of the year after placing the lowest Vitol Asia, the Asian unit of

the world's largest independent oil trading house, had dues of \$152.60 million from BPC.

The company sent emails on August 8 and 10 last year informing that they will not be

able to supply fuel to Bangladesh if BPC does not clear the dues and demanded interest on the late payments.

Then on February 28, officials of Vitol Asia met with BPC.

As of this month, BPC was unable to clear the dues, an official of Vitol Asia Bangladesh told The Daily Star asking not to be named.

Similarly, Unipec -- a subsidiary of Chinese Sinopec, the world's largest crude oil refiner by total capacity -- had dues of \$129 million.

On February 28, the Beijing-based company

wrote to the BPC about its dues.

Then on March 4, a ship loaded with diesel from Unipec arrived at the Chattogram port but the cargo was barred from leaving the vessel until the dues were cleared.

"We couldn't release the fuel due to the financial hold," said an official of BPC on the condition of anonymity to speak candidly on

On March 5, BPC made a payment of \$62.27 million to Unipec and was able to release the cargo from the port.

The following day, BPC wrote to the ministry

of power, energy and mineral resources expressing concern **BPC owes Singapore**that if they are unable to clear based Vitol Asia and the dues, the company may China's oil trading impose such a ban again.

If the fuel cargoes do not **\$282 million amid** arrive as per schedule, the the ongoing dollar fuel reserves would decline crunch. alarmingly.

"There will be uncertainty over supplying uninterrupted

fuel. As a result, it would impact the agriculture sector in the ongoing irrigation season," the letter added.

Khalid Ahmed, BPC's director of operations and planning, played down the incidents. "Such financial hold is nothing new. It's like

a strategy of the suppliers to keep BPC under pressure.

Vitol Asia got \$30 million yesterday, he told The Daily Star. The rest of the dues will be paid in phases, Ahmed added.

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Nat'l grid gets power from Adani on trial basis

Electricity supply from the controversial Adani power plant in Godda, Jharkhand began on a trial basis yesterday.

"We are getting 50 megawatts of electricity since 7:38 pm," ABM Badruddoza Khan. spokesman for Power Company Bangladesh, told The Daily Star.

electricity was generated at a 1,600-megawatt ultrasupercritical power plant located on 425 hectares of land in an Indian village about 100 kilometres from the Bangladesh border and delivered through a dedicated transmission

Now the power plant will supply electricity to the national grid until commercial operation starts, Khan said, adding that the supply will gradually increase as per demand.

The plant supposed to commercial operation by December 16 last year but was later shifted to March 26 this year.

SWADHINATA PADAK 2023 9 individuals, fire service chosen

Nine individuals and one institution have been chosen for this year's Swadhinata Padak, Bangladesh's highest civilian award, for their contributions to the country.

Freedom fighter Colonel (retired) Shamsul Alam, Lieutenant AG Mohammad Khurshid (posthumous), martyred Khwaja Nizamuddin Bhuiyan, and Mofazzal Hossain Chowdhury Maya have been named as winners of the award for their contributions to Bangladesh's independence and Liberation War.

Begum Nadira Jahan (Surma Zahid) and icddr,b acting senior director Dr Firdausi Oadri will receive the award for their contributions to research and training, the Cabinet Division said in a notification yesterday.

Mohammad Moinuddin Ahmed (Selim Al Deen) will be given the award posthumously for his contribution to literature.

Pabitra Mohan Dey and ASM Raqibul Hasan will receive the honour for their contribution to culture and sports respectively. The Department of Fire Service and Civil

Defence has been picked for the award in the "public service" category. Bangladesh has been honouring individuals

and institutions with the Swadhinata Padak since 1977 ahead of Independence Day on March 26 every year.

Denmark opens undersea graveyard for imported CO2

Denmark has inaugurated a project to store carbon dioxide 1,800 metres beneath the North Sea, becoming the first country in the world to bury CO2 imported from abroad.

"Today we opened a new chapter for the North Sea, a green chapter," Denmark's Crown Prince Frederik on Wednesday said at the inauguration ceremony in the town of Esbjerg in the west of

The CO2 graveyard, where the carbon is injected to prevent further warming of the atmosphere, is on the site of an old oil field.

Led by British chemical giant Ineos and German oil company Wintershall Dea, the "Greensand" project is expected to store up to eight million tonnes of CO2 per year by 2030.

Still in their infancy and costly, carbon capture and storage (CCS) projects aim to capture and then trap CO2 in order to mitigate global warming.

Over 200 similar projects are currently operational or under development around the world. SEE PAGE 6 COL 1



'SCUSE ME, MA'AM! ... A chestnut-tailed starling tries to grab the attention of another, who seems to be lost in its own thoughts! These birds are resident, or partially migratory, throughout India and much of Southeast Asia. Usually spotted in the upper canopies and leaves of trees, they prefer areas such as open forests, plantations, or cultivations. However, they do sometimes venture out into the concrete jungle, like these two taking a tour of Babar Road in the capital's Mohammadpur. Like other species of starlings, they too are omnivorous – eating fruits, nectar and insects mostly. It is most fascinating to watch them fly together like a tight-knit family, often rapidly changing directions with exceptional synchrony. Woman gangraped by supervisers of brick kiln

The supervisors of a brick kiln in Lakshmipur and their cohorts gang-raped and tortured a 18-yearold woman on Wednesday night, according to a complaint filed Lakshmipur Sadar Police Station.

The woman said the accused confined her husband to the brick kiln and then raped her at her home, which is nearby.

Two days before the rape, the supervisors and their men said a relative of the woman's husband, a worker at the kiln, had stolen their money.

On Tuesday, the men held her husband captive and asked him where his relative could be found, said the mother of a twoyear-old child.

The accused chained her husband and tortured him. She went to the brick kiln and pleaded with them to release him, but to no avail.

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
