MYMENSINGH PM to open 23 projects today

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is set to inaugurate 23 projects worth Tk 570 crore during her visit to Mymensingh today.

The projects,

among others, include four-storey academic buildings in 21 schools and colleges, sanitation in 32 municipalities, Sheikh Kamal indoor stadium, and five bridges.

The premier will also lay the foundation stones of 14 more development projects in the district.

The projects worth Tk 2,762 crore include the development of the road and drainage network of Mymensingh, and the construction of seven regional offices for Bangladesh Public Service Commission.

Meanwhile, leaders and activists of the Awami League and its associate bodies in Mymensingh are preparing for the PM's visit.

The city's streets and alleys have already been decorated with banners, festoons, and billboards to receive Hasina, also the AL president.

NATIONAL PEOPLE'S CONGRESS Xi handed third term as China's president

Xi Jinping was handed a third term as Chinese president yesterday, capping a rise that has seen him become the country's most powerful leader in generations.

His appointment by China's parliament comes after Xi locked in another five years as head of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) in October.

Since then, the 69-year-old has weathered widespread protests over his zero-Covid policy and the deaths of countless people after its abandonment.

No robber held yet over looting of Tk 11.25cr Tk 3.89cr recovered so far

The heist of Tk 11.25 crore in Turag area on Thursday is still shrouded in mystery as none of the robbers has been arrested or identified yet.

Police are yet to recover the full amount as they only found about Tk 3.89 crore after seizing three out of four trunks used for carrying the money to ATMs.

On Thursday evening, without opening the trunks, Detective Branch chief Harun or Rashid told reporters that the majority of the looted money was recovered and he assumed it could be about Tk 9 crore.

"We have recovered most of the money, which could be over Tk 9 crore, though we haven't opened the trunks yet. Because, we will bring those who got the keys and then open the trunks. Since three of the four trunks are here, we hope around Tk 9 crore could be inside those," he said at press briefing in front of the Le Méridien hotel in Khilkhet.

Seoul is building biggest spokeless Ferris wheel

But those issues have been avoided at this week's National People's Congress (NPC), a carefully choreographed event that is also set to appoint Xi ally Li Qiang as the new premier.

Yesterday, delegates handed Xi a third term as president and re-appointed him head of the country's Central Military Commission in a unanimous vote.

Beijing's Great Hall of the People, a cavernous state building on the edge of Tiananmen Square, was adorned with crimson carpets and banners for the landmark vote, with a military band providing background music.

A digital monitor on the edge of the stage proclaimed the final tally – all 2,952 votes had been cast in favour of giving Xi another term in office.

The announcement was followed by delegates' fervent declarations of allegiance to the Chinese constitution, in a demonstration of loyalty and unanimity.

Xi held up his right fist and placed his left hand on a SEE PAGE 6 COL 2 contracts did not supply rice. The food department, however, has achieved 80 percent of its procurement target across the

There are 575 licenced husking mills and 19 auto rice mills in the

The Aman paddy and rice procurement drive started on November 17 and ended on March 7.

The government had a target of procuring 12,786 tonnes of rice and 3,914 tonnes of paddy through 11

Bishwas, president of Husking Millers Association in Pabna, said millers refused to enter contracts with the government because of pricing issues.

price of paddy at Tk 28 per kg, and that

of rice at Tk 42 per kg, said officials at

the food controller's office in Pabna. "We have collected only 3,629

tonnes of rice, which is 28 percent of

the target amount of 12,786 tonnes.

Even after sending notices repeatedly,

some millers did not supply rice," said

Muhammad Tanvir Rahman, district

food controlling officer.

"The production cost of each kg rice is Tk 43. It is impossible to supply rice to the government at Tk 42 per kg. If we supply rice at the governmentfixed price, we will have to incur huge losses."

Idris, a major rice trader in Pabna, himself didn't enter a contract with the government.

Food Controller Muhammad Tanvir Rahman, however, said they could not meet the procurement target because of the millers' negligence.

INDO-BANGLA PIPELINE Transportation cost to be cut by almost half Says Nasrul Hamid; now it costs \$11.5 per barrel to bring fuel from India

Once operational, the Bangladesh-India Friendship Pipeline will effectively ensure power and energy security in the country's northern region, said State Minister for Power, Energy, and Mineral Resources Nasrul Hamid.

"It [the pipeline] will be a milestone in providing quick and uninterrupted fuel supply to the northern region of the country in a cost-effective manner," the state minister said yesterday while inspecting the progress of the pipeline under construction in Dinajpur's Parbatipur.

Bangladesh has so far been importing diesel from India through railway carriages and wagons.

Nasrul said now diesel imports through the pipeline will bring the perbarrel price down from the current \$11.50 to \$6.

Myanmar steps up verification amid global pressure

Amid global pressure on the Myanmar junta, their authorities are now showing a positive attitude towards the Rohingya repatriation as they have stepped up the verification of their citizens in recent weeks, say officials at the Bangladesh foreign ministry.

Also, the junta government on March 8 arranged a visit for ambassadors from ASEAN countries and Bangladesh, India, and China to Maundaw region of Rakhine to assess the situation for Rohingya repatriation.

The group of diplomats was led by U Ko Ko Hlaing, deputy chairman of the Rakhine State Stability and Development Coordination Committee-1 and also the union minister of the Ministry of International Cooperation, reports Burma News International from Myanmar.
