ROHINGYA REPATRIATION  
It's time to share responsibility

**Momen urges OIC members**

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen has called for OIC member states to share collective responsibility to ensure safe and dignified return of Rohingyas to their homeland.  
He made the call during a meeting of the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) held yesterday in the Mauritanian capital Nouakchott, on the margin of the 49th OIC Council of Foreign Ministers.  
The meeting of OIC's ad-hoc ministerial committee was on the accountability for human-rights violations against the Rohingyas.  
During the meeting, Gambian Foreign Minister Mamadou Tangara updated the status of the Rohingya-genocide case, filed by the Gambia against Myanmar with the International Court of Justice to hold Myanmar accountable.  
He also presented the status of the member states' voluntary contribution and summary of the fund required to continue case proceedings.  
Momen reiterated the importance of Rohingya repatriation to avoid a transnational socio-economic catastrophe, especially the derailment of thousands of youths' future.  
While thanking the Gambia and OIC for their support for legal action, he shed light on the importance of ensuring the momentum to provide justice to Rohingyas.

THREE YEARS OF COVID-19

Where we stand now and the road ahead

When the first casualty of Covid-19 in the country was reported on March 18, 2020, it made headlines in almost all national dailies the next day.  
The announcement further escalated the public anxiety that began when the first case of Covid-19 was reported 11 days back -- on March 8. The skyrocketing cases and deaths due to Covid-19 eventually forced the government to impose a series of lockdowns countrywide at different times.  
So far, around 20.38 lakh Covid-19 cases were detected and 29,445 lives lost due to the viral disease. Yet Covid-19 has not gone away, with the last death reported on February 13.  
“But it no longer causes any panic among people because now we know how to manage Covid-19,” Dr Mushtaq Hussain, consultant of the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease

Control and Research told The Daily Star.  
Health Minister Zahid Maleque claimed multiple times that the government has become successful in tackling the Covid-19 health crisis.  
“We had been hugely criticised.  
But we did not stop working [to prepare the health system to tackle Covid-19],” he said at an event in Dhaka on Tuesday, titled “Health system now better prepared”.  
In the beginning, there was only one laboratory at the IEDCR that was capable of testing for Covid-19.



There was an outcry for Covid-19 tests across the country, which moved on for the next few months.  
By early December 2020, Covid-19 testing was expanded to 137 government laboratories. Private organisations were also approved to set Covid-19 testing laboratories later.  
So far, there are 885 Covid-19 testing laboratories in the country, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).  
The government instructed all public hospitals up to the district level to dedicate five beds for Covid-19 patients. With the massive spread of the virus, the hospitals were soon flooded with patients.  
Moreover, the shortage of standard personal protective gear like coveralls and masks caused a loss of confidence among the healthcare staffers.  
By late 2020, treatment arrangements were expanded up

Dhaka air remains 'unhealthy'

Dhaka's air quality continued to be in the “unhealthy” zone yesterday.  
With an air quality index (AQI) score of 158 at 9:03am, Dhaka ranked seventh in the list of cities worldwide with the worst air quality.  
An AQI between 101 and 200 is considered “unhealthy”, particularly for sensitive groups.  
Iraq's Baghdad, Myanmar's Yangon and India's Kolkata occupied the first three spots in the list, with AQI scores of 185, 163 and 162, respectively.  
A score between 201 and 300 is said to be “very unhealthy”, while a reading of 301 to 400 is considered “hazardous”, posing serious health risks to residents.  
In Bangladesh, the AQI is based on five criteria pollutants – particulate matter (PM10 and PM2.5), nitrogen dioxide

(NO2), carbon monoxide (CO), sulphur dioxide (SO2) and ozone.  
Dhaka has long been grappling with air-pollution issues. Its air quality usually turns unhealthy in winter and improves during the monsoon.  
Air pollution consistently ranks among the top risk factors for death and disability worldwide. Breathing polluted air has long been recognised as increasing a person's chances of developing a heart disease, chronic respiratory diseases, lung infections and cancer, according to several studies.  
As per the World Health Organization (WHO), air pollution kills an estimated seven million people worldwide every year, largely as a result of increased mortality from stroke, heart disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, lung cancer and acute respiratory infections.
