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Multi-sectoral response crucial to end tuberculosis

Say experts as one dies in every 12 minutes with TB in Bangladesh

Experts at an event yesterday stressed a multi-sectoral strategy to accelerate efforts to eliminate Tuberculosis (TB) by 2035 in the country.

Deaths from TB have reduced from 45 deaths per 100,000 in 2015 to 25 in 2021, according to the National TB Control Programme by the Director General of Health Services (DGHS).

"Despite our efforts, TB is still common in the country, with one person being infected with the disease every minute, said Dr Md Mahafuzer Rahman Sarker, line director at the DGHS, while addressing the event in Dhaka.

International Center for Diarrheal Disease and Research, Bangladesh (icddr,b) organised the event marking World TB

Dr Md Mahafuzer Rahman Sarker said that around 375,000 individuals were infected with TB in 2021, of whom 42,000

In his opening remarks, Prof Dr Kazi Shafiqul Halim, Director (MBDC) at the DGHS, said, "To achieve the goal of reducing TB infection to 95 percent by 2035, it is necessary to increase the rate of detection, notification, ensuring services for all as well as increasing public

Early pregnancy linked to low income

Speakers reveal findings of survey

Pregnancy before the age of 18 is prevalent among those with low per capita household income, revealed a survey.

The prevalence is the highest (46.3 percent) among the lowest per capita household-income group (less than Tk 2,500 per month), said the report

It also revealed that among the participants, 35.8 percent of women in Bangladesh conceive their first child before turning 18. The highest incidence of early pregnancy was observed in Rangpur division (48.9 percent).

The findings of the report, titled "Monitoring the Implementation of SDGs for Ensuring Girls and Child Rights in Bangladesh", were shared at an event yesterday, jointly organised by Plan International Bangladesh, Bangladesh, Aparaievo Bangladesh and Youth for Change under the Y-moves Project.

All the organisations conducted

Shamim Ahmed, executive director of Yes Bangladesh, presented the keynote at the event.

The survey results show that decisions regarding family-planning

methods are taken jointly by males (9.5 percent). and females in 69.3 percent of households. They mostly receive family planning information from television (53.7 percent), community workers (33.2 percent) and social media (29.5 percent).

surveyed women faced physical violence over the last 12 months; 21.9 percent, the highest, reported physical violence in households with a per capita monthly income of less than Tk 2,500. In households with a per capita monthly income of more than Tk 10,000, physical violence was found to be the lowest

Among the surveyed women, 14.7 percent reported that they faced obstacles from male family members in terms of education and employment, which was found high in Mymensingh division (20.1 percent).

The findings reveal that about **The government is** 46.2 percent of households have children who faced physical punishment and/or psychological aggression at home and outside (educational institutions, public places, transport, etc).

The survey was conducted between June 2021 and January 2022. A total of 3,175 households were randomly chosen and interviewed, especially women belonging to the reproductive age group (15-49 years) from 64 districts in Bangladesh.

Lawmaker Aparajita Haque, who is also a member of the parliamentary caucus of child rights and standing committee (post, telecommunication, and technology), said, "The government is determined to ensure the rights of women and girl children. This survey result will help us to enrich our efforts."

USAID and BHC co-hosted the event jointly with the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.

The 2012 Call to Action was a groundbreaking event that catalysed a global movement to dramatically improve maternal and child survival, said a press release.

Following Bangladesh's Call to Action launch 10 years ago, the government reiterated its commitment to end preventable child deaths by 2035 by building on its previous successes in reducing child mortality, the release added.

Lalbagh Fort, the 17th-century monument present in Dhaka, has seen multiple renovations throughout the centuries. However, perhaps few are as impressive as the complete restoration, retrofitting and 3D architectural documentation of the Mughal "Hammamkhana (royal bathhouse)" in the fort.

The project by the Department of Archaeology and the Ministry of Cultural Affairs, which was inaugurated on March 24, 2021, came to an end yesterday. It has been funded by the US Department of State's Ambassadors Fund for Cultural Preservation (AFCP) programme, with an allocation of \$1,85,933 (around Tk 2 crore).
