SUED UNDER DSA Woman dies in **Rab custody**

An employee of a Naogaon union parishad land office who stood accused in a case under the Digital Security Act died in the custody of Rab-5 after suffering haemorrhages of the brain.

Rab officers told doctors Sultana Jasmine, 38, suffered a fall.

Her son Shahed Hossain Saikat, a student of Chattogram University, said, "She died due to torture in Rab custody. She has a mark of injury on her head.' Family members said she

was in perfect health.

Rab picked up Sultana ound 10:00am on around Wednesday (March 22) when she was on her way to Chandipur Union Land Office where she was an office assistant,

law enforcers said. She died at 10:00am on Friday (March 24) at the Rajshahi Medical College

Hospital (RMCH). A day after her detained, she was sued under DSA in Rajshahi "for syphoning off money from job seekers using a Facebook

account". Faisal bin Ahsan, officer-in-charge of

Naogaon Sadar Police Station, told The Daily Star that Rab did not inform police about the arrest and they learnt about the matter from the media.

Sultana's uncle Nazmul Haque Montu, a former councillor of Naogaon municipality, said, "My niece was intercepted at Muktir Mor by a white microbus carrying Rab

officers. We had been looking for her in various [Rab] camps since but failed to locate her. Around noon, we heard that she is under treatment at Naogaon Sadar Hospital." Her family rushed there

o find her unresponsive. She had a bruise on her head. "Rab said that she suffered

a stroke but she was young and in perfect health. Why would she have a stroke in Rab custody?" Montu added.

Sultana was moved to the RMCH the next day. RMCH Director Brig Gen FM Shamim

Ahmed said that Sultana was brought in by a Rab team in a critical condition around 9:20pm on Thursday.

"She was unconscious and was immediately rushed to the neurology ward.

IMPORT BILL **SURGES**

Although Bangladesh has almost achieved self-sufficiency in rice production, its dependence on the international market remains nign for food items with import cost rising two and a half times to Tk 80,800 crore from a decade ago. The country had to spend the money to buy rice, wheat, spices, edible oil, oil seeds, pulses, sugar and dairy and milk products. In the first seven months of this fiscal year, Tk 50,000 crore was spent to import food items, a rise by 10.5 per cent from a year ago.

41 RISKY BUILDINGS Rajuk evacuation move going nowhere

It appears the evacuation notice handed out to 41 risky buildings by the Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk) on March 13 was not wellthought-out.

The notice called for vacating the structures within seven days and their demolition in three months -- raising questions about its feasibility. In the two weeks since it was issued, none Government College, echoed the same.

"We do not have another place to run our academic activities. Besides, it is a college established way back in 1874 and needs to be protected as heritage," he said.

Three buildings of Jahangirnagar University have been identified as risky and the university authorities need at least six months to vacate those, according to Abdus Salam Md Sharif, its chief engineer.

classrooms and hall rooms have been identified as risky by Rajuk between 2021-2022 under an urban resilience project.

But the school authority has no option to relocate the functions of the three buildings.

"It will be really tough for us to vacate those buildings without any alternatives," said its headmaster Arifur Rahman, adding that the institute is yet to receive the notice.

DEMERIT POINT FOR DRIVERS Govt agencies dragging foot on enforcement BRTA says required software to be ready in 7-10 days

When the Road Transport Act-2018 was enacted over four years ago incorporating a system of demerit points on driving licenses for traffic violation, the authorities said the system would go a long way in ensuring road safety.

The law came into force in November 2019, but the authorities could not implement the system because the rules were not there until December 27 last year.

Even though the rules are here, the system still exists on papers only.

The demerit points system, as mentioned in the act, means there will be 12 points for each driver, and a traffic rules violation will result in deduction of one or two points. A licence will be revoked if a driver loses all the points.

Contacted, Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) Chairman Nur Mohammad Mazumder said the software needed for the implementation will be ready within seven to 10 days and the system will be operational then.

Besides, a mobile app will be developed for the task, he said. "Once the app is available, implementation will be easier. But it will take some more time.'

But some BRTA and police officers express doubts as to whether such a system can be implemented with success in a country where over five lakh vehicles operate without fitness certificates, thousands of drivers do not have licences, and cities do not have parking areas.

Netanyahu sacks defence minister

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu yesterday dismissed Defence Minister Yoav Gallant a day after he broke ranks and urged the government to halt a highlycontested plan to overhaul the judicial system.

Gallant's dismissal will likely fuel mass protests against the plan that have already rocked the nation for months. It came as Netanyahu was poised to ratify legislation that would tighten political control over judicial appointments.

That bill, and others that would limit Supreme Court powers to rule against government policy, have triggered warnings at home and over Israel's democratic abroad health.

Gallant on Saturday became the most senior member of Netanyahu's right-wing Likud party to say he would not support the judicial overhaul, saying protests that have included growing numbers of military reservists were also affecting regular forces and undermining national security.

"At this time, for the sake of our country, I am willing to take any risk and pay any price," Gallant said in his televised address.

The response came last night.

"Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has decided this [Sunday] evening to dismiss Defence Minister Yoav Gallant," Netanyahu's office said. It did not name a replacement or give any other details.

Shortly after his dismissal, Gallant, 64, wrote on Twitter: "The state of Israel's security has always been and will always be my life's mission."

Netanyahu, who is on trial on graft charges that he denies, says the judicial overhaul will balance out the branches of government.

Critics, who range from business leaders to former military officers as well as opposition parties, say the overhaul will weaken Israel's democracy, hurt the economy and hand uncontrolled powers to the government of the day.

Risks to financial stability increased

Warns IMF chief, stresses 'the need for vigilance' following recent turmoil in banking sector banking sector in some advanced economies."

International Monetary Fund (IMF) chief Kristalina Georgieva warned vesterday that risks to financial stability had increased and stressed "the need for vigilance" following the recent turmoil in the banking sector.

Speaking at a forum in Beijing, the IMF managing director said she expected 2023 "to be another challenging year", with global growth slowing to below

3.0 percent due the war in Ukraine, monetary tightening and "scarring" from the pandemic.

"Uncertainties are exceptionally high," with the outlook for the global economy likely to remain weak over the medium term, she told the China Development Forum.

"It is also clear that risks to financial stability have increased," she added.

"At a time of higher debt levels, the rapid transition from a prolonged period of low interest rates to much higher rates necessary to fight inflation -- inevitably generates stresses and vulnerabilities, as evidenced by recent developments in the

Her comments came after the financial sector was shaken by the collapse of Silicon Valley Bank and the enforced takeover of Swiss bank Credit Suisse by rival

UBS, leading to fears of contagion. Bank shares tumbled on Friday as fears about the health of the financial sector resurfaced, with German Chancellor Olaf Scholz forced to give reassurances about Deutsche Bank after the long-troubled lender

became a focus of investor concerns.

Georgieva said policymakers had acted decisively in response to financial stability risks.

"These actions have eased market stress to some extent, but uncertainty is high which underscores the need for vigilance," she said

The IMF chief, however, pointed to China's rebound as a bright spot for the world economy.

The IMF forecasts China's economy to grow 5.2 percent this year, driven by a rebound in private consumption as the country reopens after its pandemic isolation.

According to Canadian media reports, hundreds of people gathered outside the Indian consulate in Vancouver on Saturday over India's hunt for fugitive Sikh separatist Amritpal Singh.

The Indian foreign ministry said it summoned Canada's high commissioner on Saturday "to convey our strong concern about the actions of separatist and extremist elements against our diplomatic Mission and Consulates in Canada this week".

"How can a building that was constructed by the Public Works Department only 10 years ago be vulnerable?" said a high official of BSMMU on the condition of anonymity as he is not authorised to

speak with media. He said that they had retrofitted one

of the two other buildings constructed in the 1950s in 2005.

'None of the buildings is vulnerable,' he said.

Delwar Hossain Mojumder, the chief engineer of the Education Engineering Department, said they have received a letter regarding the matter and that Rajuk incorrectly identified them as the authority for 30 of the school buildings.

The EED wrote to Rajuk saying that they only built two of the buildings and those have been handed over to the school authorities.

'Many of the buildings are not so vulnerable that immediate demolition is required. If an earthquake of magnitude 7 hits, then that is a different case.'

Mojumder too spoke for relocation first.

"All the buildings are old and there is no doubt about it," said Adil Mohammad Khan, a faculty member of Jahangirnagar University's Department of Urban and Regional Planning.

There are two options here: either protect those by retrofitting or demolish those.

"Since demolition is a major decision, relevant authorities should do a second assessment before carrying out Rajuk's order.

If both assessments say the same

thing, then the buildings would have to be vacated and eventually demolished, said Khan, also a former general secretary of the Bangladesh Institute of Planners.

The assessments were done using sophisticated equipment and anyone concerned could seek the opinion of a third party, said Abdul Latif Helaly, who was the director of the project that surveyed 3,252 structures and identified 42 as risky.

Of the 42 structures, only one has been taken down so far.

Asked about such a short deadline, Helaly said: "We have informed them about the risk and now it is up to the authorities concerned to take steps to prevent any accident."

Asked about who would fund the demolition, he said the educational institutes or hospitals should ask their parent ministries.

"We may construct new buildings subject to getting another project funding from the World Bank. But it might take a long time.'

In that case, retrofitting could be done.

"But first and foremost, evacuation is a must for safety," Helaly added. On March 11, Anisur Rahman Mia,

chairman of Rajuk, said they would take steps to demolish the buildings as they are in a precarious state and are at risk of collapsing and causing casualties.

He said all institutions that own the risky buildings have received the Rajuk notice. "We have the acknowledgement receipts."

Rafiqul Alam Tuku, a freedom fighter who took part in the battle, said the enemy forces continued heavy shelling till the next morning, adding that the Bangalees fought back valiantly and could sense victory approaching.

After heavy fighting throughout March 31, the Pakistanis faced significant casualties, but about 40-45 of them, including most of their officers, were still alive.

Sensing defeat, they tried to escape that night. They got on two jeeps and a Dodge car, and left towards Jhenaidah at high speed.

But the Bangalees were right behind, Rafiqul added.

A group of freedom fighters had already destroyed the Shailkupa Bridge. They created a trap by covering the vacuum with a coarse mat made from bamboo remains and camouflaged the place to look like a bitumen-sealed road. On each side of it, two groups of Bangalees waited for the fleeing Pakistanis.

As soon as the speeding vehicles fell into the trap, the freedom fighters launched their attack and killed Major Shoeb and several others on the spot.

The remaining Pakistani soldiers, some of whom were injured, fled to nearby areas. However, they could not escape the wrath of the villagers in those places, said freedom fighter Musharof Hossain, adding that the Pakistanis ultimately surrendered to them.

By April 1, the Bangladeshi forces achieved victory and freed Kushtia from the grips of occupation. However, on April 17, the Pakistani army had managed to recapture the area.

While almost all Pakistani soldiers died in the battle, six Bangalees embraced martyrdom.

"It was an unprecedented win. It was a war between .303 rifles versus automatic weapons. It was only possible for the all-out support by the locals of Kushtia," Osman said in the documentary.

He said they had recovered weapons and ammunition that filled a threetonne truck.

HOW PLANNING LED TO VICTORY The preparations for the battle to free Kushtia started from March 26, said Mesbah Ul Haq.

Upon learning that a military crackdown was taking place in Dhaka, Mesbah's father Ashab Ul Haq, then a Chuadanga-1 member of Provincial Assembly (MPA), and Younus Ali, a Chuadanga-2 MPA, held a rally in the town that morning and called for resistance.

Osman fled from Kushtia town the same morning upon seeing Pakistan army men there. He reached the EPR office in Chuadanga in the afternoon and came to know that Bangalees had disarmed all Pakistani EPR members and took control of their weapons.

On March 27, Ashab and Osman chalked out the plan to free Kushtia. They named the area "South-Western Command".

The weapons confiscated from the EPR members were .303 rifles. .303 LMGs, which were used in World War II. and four rusted World War II time 3.5 rocket launchers, also from the time of WW II. Ammunition was absolutely insufficient.

"But I had hope because I knew the common people from all walks of life were with me," Osman wrote in his book

Members of police, ansar and mujahid were inducted into the force after a day's training, while the people of Kushtia, with their indomitable will, ined in.

As thousands came forward, they had with them dry food, supply of rice and lentils from their own fields and whatever weapon they could find.

Several control rooms were established. Mega kitchens were set up to provide hot meals to the frontline fighters.

By March 28 noon, a group of Bangalees went to Jhenaidah and blocked the Jashore-Jhenaidah road to bar the enemies from supplying troops or arms to Kushtia from Jashore.

Enhance water diplomacy to prevent conflict

State minister tells UN Water **Conference dialogue**

Bangladesh has urged the international community to enhance partnership on water management and focus more on water diplomacy in preventing conflict and crisis.

State Minister for Water Resources Zaheed Farooque made the call while addressing an interactive dialogue of the UN Water Conference held at the United Nations Headquarters in New York, which ended on March 24.

He said Bangladesh has 57 transboundary rivers with neighbouring countries including 54 rivers with India, and Dhaka has been working on water cooperation with the co-riparian countries to manage and share the waters of common rivers.

'Knowledge sharing and technical cooperation are critical elements for sustainable water management,' Farooque said.


He said water management cooperation extends crucial support to the achievement of all sustainable development goals -- from addressing water scarcity, building sound economies to global peace and security.

The interactive dialogue was co-chaired by Serigne Mbaye Thiam, minister of water and sanitation of Senegal, and Christian Frutiger, state secretary at the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs of the Swiss Confederation.

Ministers from other UN-member countries also spoke at the dialogue.

Historic water tank now decaying away

Authorities failing to preserve its glory

Once upon a time, Dhaka's residents relied on Buriganga river, and the city's numerous ponds and wells for water. In 1878. Dhaka's first safe water tank was constructed, which saved its residents from the disaster of water scarcity.

The 144-year-old water tank. locally known as "Bahadur Shah Park Panir Tanky" on Old Dhaka's Johnson Road, was declared a historical monument in May 2020 by Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk). Despite the recognition, it has been forgotten and neglected. The significant structure has lost its charms, as Rajuk failed to preserve it even almost two years after recognising it as a historical monument. During a recent visit, this correspondent found that the area has been grabbed and turned into a shrine, with an iron gate at the entrance. Walls are also being constructed around the structure, damaging the tank. There are small cracks in several spots, with the plaster on the upper part of the tank falling off. Three big banners of the shrine have been put up on that part. However, no banners promoting its historical significance were visible. correspondent attempted This to enter the tank's premises but was stopped by an occupant. Tushar Ahmed, a local, said, "This is a shame for us. I can't believe a historical structure like this is being disregarded." Abdus Salam, a university student, said, "The water tank was a lifesaver for the residents. It's unacceptable that it's being neglected and left to fall apart." Meanwhile, four shops have been illegally set up near the tank by the

general secretary of Bangladesh Chhatra League's Kabi Nazrul Govt College unit. Shopkeepers said he collects Tk 200 every day from each shop.

Hossain, Contacted, Faruq the general secretary, denied the allegations.

Mohammad Selim, councillor of ward-42 under DSCC, said, "I'm afraid that these illegal shops cannot be removed so easily."

Rickshaws shall take their own sweet time to get out of your way. Swarms of bikers will snake their way around your car in a rush, with no regard for their lives or your own.



Department of Archaeology (DoA), have been unaware of the developments.

Rajuk Town Planner Ashraful Islam said, "Our team is looking into the issue and will visit the spot soon."

The significant structure has lost its charms, as Rajuk failed to preserve it even almost two years after recognising it as a historical monument.

Afroza Khan Mita, regional director of DoA, said she was unaware of the historical significance of the water tank as it has not been listed. "If it is not listed, then it is not our responsibility."

Historian Prof Muntassir Mamoon has expressed concern over the lack of effort by the authorities concerned to protect the tank. "We keep talking about it, but government officials are not doing anything."

Architect Taimur Islam, chief executive of Urban Study Group, said, "Rajuk listed the tank as a historical monument but DoA did not. Rajuk did nothing to preserve it after the recognition. Both bodies should look into the issue and take steps."

BCL man beaten up by fellow activists

An activist of Bangladesh Chhatra League who studies at Dhaka University was assaulted by fellow activists, who are also the university's students, on campus on Saturday evening.

Zubaer Ibne Humayun, a student of the criminology department and leader of the social science faculty's BCL unit, had to receive treatment at Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

According to witnesses, a speeding car splashed muddy water on Zubaer while he was talking to some of his friends near the faculty building in the evening.

This prompted Zubaer and his friends to chase down the car near Tin Netar Mazar area for an explanation, initiating a quarrel with those inside the car, they said.


According to Zubaer, about an hour later, he was asked to come to Kabi Jasimuddin Hall area over phone. When he reached there, a group of around 15 students attacked him with sticks, cricket stamps. Some of them whipped him with their leather belts. Witnesses said the attackers are also BCL activists.



A Bangladeshi girl went viral on the internet for singing Rabindra Sangeet on Pakistan's national channel, ARY. Musician Sheikh Dina, the NSU graduate who now resides in the US, told us the story that is still circulating on social media.

"I met this group of Pakistani musicians in the UK, who have a band named Sounds of Kolachi. We met while we performed in the UK, for Birmingham Contemporary Music Group," said the artiste. "As we were discussing about Pakistani artistes performing at Bangladeshi folk festival, they said that they wish to invite some Bangladeshi artistes to perform at their festival as well."

Deep inside, the young singer did not want to miss this opportunity. "I felt it would be a great chance to present my mother tongue in Pakistan.'

Dina, is currently pursuing her Masters in Business Administration (MBA) - Business Analytics at Midwestern State University, in Texas.

After she received the official invitation, she was still in dilemma as people around her were making negative remarks about her visit to Pakistan. "I was discouraged, and some even told me that I will struggle to get a Visa for many countries, especially the US. These were all stereotypes, as I am sitting in the US and talking to you right now."

Rabindranath Tagore was considered a taboo and controversial figure in Pakistan, since the partition of India and the formation of Pakistan in 1947. Twenty years later, all works of Tagore were officially banned in all government media (radio, TV, government newspapers, etc.) by the orders of Ayub Khan's powerful information and broadcasting minister, Khwaja Shahabuddin, and East Pakistan governor Monem Khan, in 1967.

Dina had previously performed on several international platforms representing our collaborating with the British Council and Art Council England, on their digital platforms,

which was arranged by Transforming Narratives.

"This initiative has been taken by the British Council and with their sponsored amount, I have produced a short film, 'Dhaka Say Karachi', that connects Pakistan and Bangladesh." Besides this, Dina is also the Global Ambassador at the Office of Global Education at MSU Texas.

On March 8, 2020, Dina performed at Pakistan's NAPA (National Academy of Performing Arts) International Folk Festival, alongside some other international artistes. They performed in some other countries including Germany and Nepal, among 15 other countries.

"When I entered the stage, I saw that the centre was adorned with red flowers representing Bangladesh," Dina recalled. "I performed the song 'Amar Haat Bandhibi', and it was a collaboration with a musical theatre group. The performers who danced with me literally had their limbs tied, and I was in tears during my performance."

Dina's performance was a representation



of the brutal rapes and war crimes that local folk music to the world. She has been took place during our Liberation War. She explained that the lyrics of the song were translated and the audience were in pin drop



silence, as they could clearly understand what the performance signified.

Born and brought up in Chattogram, Dina comes from a conservative family, who did not allow her to explore the world of art initially, which was her only passion. "I managed to come to Dhaka all alone and from there my journey towards my dream began," shared Dina.

She is also the vocalist of the band Ektara, along with other members Amit Rajbongshi, SN Tonwi, Zaim Mustakim, and Azmain Mahtab. "We formed the band while studying at North South University," she adds.

Dina stayed in Pakistan for a week, and apart from participating in the festival, she met many people who left behind

their families in Bangladesh. "Being a Bangladeshi citizen visiting them as a guest was delightful, and learning about their stories was heartbreaking as well," shared an emotional Dina. "I didn't want to miss the opportunity to perform in my mother language in the land of Pakistan," asserts the singer.

Dina had experienced the unheard stories that were left behind, and buried many years ago. Amongst many memories, Dina shared some which will always remain in her heart. "I went on a radio show, where I met an elderly person who has been working in a low-level position. Upon hearing that a Bangladeshi girl has come to their radio for a show, the man couldn't resist meeting me,"

said the singer. "Without uttering a word, he hugged me and cried like a child, and shared that he used to work in West Pakistan during the war, and his family lived in the then East Pakistan."

"Dhaka Say Karachi- A Tale of Two Lost Souls" was released on February 22, 2021. as a collaboration between Bangladesh, Pakistan and the UK. The film highlights Dina's travels to Pakistan. Dina's journey and her experience of visiting the country that still shares a bittersweet relationship, has brought her inner South Asian identity to the forefront. It was not easy for Dina either.

As many people are captioning the video of Dina's performance on social media, Dina shared that she is upset about it. "It is absolutely upsetting that people are making fun of such a critical moment a country is going through," spoke Dina, about Pakistan's current financial crisis.

Many even captioned that sinking Pakistan is desperate to build a relationship with Bangladesh. "I am totally against this, and I would request everyone not to spread hatred connecting with such a special moment that we brought after many decades."

"Since I have travelled there and I have been maintaining a bond with a group of Pakistani musicians who are my friends, I know what perspective they have towards us. They are extremely sorry about the brutality that happened in 1971, and it was interesting to know that they actually had a completely different idea about the history we share. Even the new generation of Pakistan grew up knowing that 1971 was a conflict with India. Many, with their own effort, identified the true history, and they felt guilty for their lack of knowledge. Thus, we should at least show our empathy during their crisis," she concluded.

The authorities issued a gazette mentioned 13 offences.

A driver may lose two points for overloading and intentionally obstructing movement of other vehicles and one point each for 11 other offences including illegal parking, speeding, and violation of traffic signals, the rules said.

A mobile court or a BRTA official not below the rank of motor vehicle inspector or police officer not below the rank of sergeant can deduct the points. The officer must have a photo or video footage of the offence and inform the driver and the authority immediately after deducting a point.

A driver can request a review of the decision within a month by paying a fee and the authorities will make a decision within a month.

If a driver does not violate any rules for six months, the authority can give them back two points following an appeal. The drivers will get two more

Russia, China not creating military alliance Says Putin in an interview

Russia and China are not creating a military alliance and the cooperation between their armed forces is "transparent", President Vladimir Putin said in comments broadcast yesterday, days after hosting Chinese leader Xi Jinping in the Kremlin.

Putin and Xi professed friendship and pledged closer ties, including in the military sphere, during their March 20-

21 summit, as Russia struggles to make battlefield gains in what it calls a "special military operation" in Ukraine.

"We are not creating any military alliance with China," Putin said on state television. "Yes, we have cooperation in the sphere military-technical interaction. We are not hiding this.

"Everything is transparent, there is nothing secret."

China and Russia signed a "no limits" partnership accord in early 2022, just weeks before Putin sent tens of thousands of troops into Ukraine.

Beijing has refrained from criticising Putin's decision and has touted a peace plan for Ukraine. The West has dismissed its proposals as a ploy to buy Putin more

time to rebuild his forces in Ukraine. Washington has said recently that it fears Beijing could arm Russia, something China denies.

In his televised remarks, Putin dismissed suggestions that Moscow's increased ties with Beijing in areas such as energy and finance meant that Russia was becoming overly dependent on China, saying these were the views of "jealous people".

"For decades many have desired turning

China against the Soviet Union and Russia, and vice versa," he said. "We understand the world we live in." Putin also accused the US and Nato of seeking to

build a new global "axis" that he said bore some resemblance to the WWII alliance between Germany,

Italy and Japan. Putin named Australia, New Zealand and South Korea as being in line to join

a "global Nato" and referenced a defence deal signed by UK and Japan earlier this year. "That is why Western analysts... are

talking about the West starting to build a new axis similar to the one created in the 1930s by the fascist regimes of Germany and Italy and militarist Japan," he said.

At least 29 migrants from sub-Saharan Africa died when their two boats sank off the coast of Tunisia as they tried to cross the Mediterranean to Italy, the Tunisian coast guard said yesterday.

Separately, in the last four days, five migrant boats have sunk off the coast of the southern city of Sfax, leaving 67 missing and nine dead, after a significant increase in boats heading towards Italy.

Tunisia has taken over from Libya as a main departure point for people fleeing poverty and conflict in Africa and the Middle East in the hope of a better life in Europe.

Houssem Jebabli, a senior official in the national guard told Reuters that the Tunisian coast guard had also rescued 11 people off the coast of Mahdia, further north.

The coast guard said it had stopped about 80 boats heading for Italy in the past four days and detained more

DEVASTATING TORNADO Mississippi death toll hits 25

Rescuers combed through rubble on Saturday after a powerful storm tore across Mississippi late on Friday, killing at least 25 people there and one person in Alabama as it levelled hundreds of buildings and spawned at least one devastating tornado.

The tornado stayed on the ground for about an hour and cut a path of destruction some 170 miles (274 km) long, according to Nicholas Price, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Jackson, Mississippi.

US President Joe Biden approved an emergency declaration for Mississippi yesterday. Biden ordered federal aid to supplement state, tribal and local recovery efforts in the affected areas, a White House Statement said.

In Rolling Fork, a town of around 1,900 in western Mississippi that was hit the hardest, homes were reduced to rubble, tree trunks snapped like twigs and cars were tossed aside like toys. The town's water tower lay twisted on the ground.

Michael Searcy, a storm chaser who saw the tornado approach Rolling Fork, spent hours helping to rescue trapped people.

"As soon as we would go from one vehicle to the next vehicle or from building to building, we could hear screams and we could hear cries for help," he told Reuters. "And we were just basically in small groups, digging through the rubble, trying to find and extricate people."

Members of one family narrowly escaped by taking shelter in a bathroom and the high winds dropped a van on top of the home, Searcy said.

BLOW TO TAIWAN China opens ties with Honduras

China established ties with diplomatic Honduras yesterday after the Central American country ended its decadeslong relationship with Taiwan, while Taiwan's foreign minister accused Honduras of demanding exorbitant sums before being lured away by Beijing.

The ending of ties with Taiwan had been expected after the Honduran foreign minister travelled to China last week to open relations and President Xiomara Castro said her government would start ties with Beijing.

China said its foreign minister, Qin Gang, and Honduran Foreign Minister Eduardo Enrique Reina signed the deal on diplomatic recognition in Beijing, ending relations with Taiwan dating back to the 1940s.

In a brief statement late on Saturday, the Honduran foreign ministry said it recognised the People's Republic of China as the only legitimate government that represents all of China and that Taiwan is an "inseparable part of Chinese territory".

China claims democratically ruled Taiwan as its own territory with no right to state-tostate ties, a position Taipei strongly rejects. China demands that countries with which it has ties to recognise its position.

As examples, he recalled police operations in which Escobar (in 1993), FARC guerrilla leader Alfonso Cano (2011) and his military chief known as "Mono Jojoy" (2010) were killed. "The existence of the devil is certain. I have seen him. I have felt him," Sanabria said in an interview with Semana magazine.

Beware of methane leaks!

Excess methane concentrations in Dhaka demand proper scrutiny

It has been known for some time that Bangladesh, one of the countries most vulnerable to climate change, has also been a major contributor of methane, a greenhouse gas about 80 times more potent in its first two decades in the atmosphere than carbon dioxide. Bangladesh has some of the highest methane emissions in the world that can be detected by satellites, according to a 2021 analysis. A new study by the well-known scientific journal Environmental Research Letters has now supported this finding, suggesting that methane emissions in Dhaka are well in excess of those of the surrounding regions. In the study, which was based on satellite observations over nearly four years, Dhaka ranked second in a list of 61 cities responsible for the highest methane emissions in the world.

There are three major contributing factors - untreated garbage, wastewater and leaks in gas connections - which, together, form a deadly combination that is not only contributing to the global warming but also making the life of Dhaka residents quite vulnerable. Each of these sources deserve appropriate scrutiny. Apparently, 47 percent of Dhaka's methane emissions is caused by garbage. The study identifies 13 dumps where garbage is left in the open and decomposed leading to methane emissions. Moreover, constant pollution and contamination of water sources is also causing this. The other source identified - leaks in gas connections - is due to negligent handling of Titas Gas connections, which has been responsible for some recent building fires and explosions.

The findings of this study make a compelling argument in favour of taking a critical look at Dhaka's waste disposal system and utility services. Reportedly, Dhaka produces about 10,000 tonnes of waste every day. The city corporations collect and dump about half of them, while the rest is left littering roads, open spaces and water bodies. Often, buildings are constructed on wetlands by filling them up with waste and earth. Add to this the questionable electrical and structural safety of most buildings. Excess concentrations of methane - which is a highly combustible gas without colour or odour - produced in this manner can lead to explosions when it comes into contact with fire or electricity. One may recall that methane leaks, among other reasons, were blamed for the recent Science Lab blast as well as the 2020 explosion in a Narayanganj mosque, which went on to claim 34 lives.

The risks for Dhaka, and Bangladesh by extension, are clearly two-fold: we are not only compromising our long term future and that of the earth, but also causing a very real and immediate threat to the survival of city-dwellers. Lack of awareness and indifference to these urban household methane sources are primarily to blame for this situation. The methane menace, however, is only symptomatic of what residents in general have to go through on a daily basis, with poor air, poor-quality food and water, poor waste disposal (without treatment), and poor services in all other aspects. We, therefore, urge our city fathers to take the methane study as a reminder of the massive reforms that Dhaka needs to improve its quality of life. Residents deserve to live without a threat to their life every other day.

Why low global prices don't reach local consumers

Inflation in Bangladesh continues to be a crisis. In January this year, inflation soared to 8.78 percent, according to data by Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS), exceeding the projection of 5.6 percent for FY2022-23 by the government. This surge is partly attributable to imported inflation as the country heavily relies on fuel and other essential commodity imports. The high fuel prices, transportation, and logistical costs associated with global inflation have also impacted locally produced items. However, this inflation can partly be attributed to imperfect market mechanisms as well.

In Bangladesh, high commodity prices in the global market are often used as an excuse to justify price hikes in the domestic market, even if there is no direct correlation. This is particularly true for critical commodities such as fuel, edible oil, and sugar, which the country imports. Any increase in global prices for these commodities inevitably gets passed on to the consumers without any delay.

This pass-through effect only happens during price increases, however; the domestic market does not benefit when prices fall in the international market. Importers justify that by claiming that their stocks are from when the prices were high, and they cannot sell the products at lower prices immediately following a drop in the global prices. By this logic, the commodities that are imported at cheaper rates should also be sold at lower prices till the old stocks are depleted even if there is a price hike in the international market. But when the international prices go up, some importers immediately increase prices even for their old stocks.

Though irrational price setting is a regular phenomenon in Bangladesh irrespective of global crises, importers are now blaming the costly US dollar for an increase in the cost of imported goods. The government has tried to reduce duties on some commodities from time to time. But traders say this does not help them reduce the gap created due to a sharp depreciation of the taka over the last few months.

While this is a policy failure on the

commodities are also being sold at exorbitant prices, taking advantage of the difficult situations. Here again, the cost of transportation and logistics are cited to justify price hikes. Indeed, opportunists at all levels take advantage of the authorities' weak monitoring mechanism.

Some examples of price differences between local and international markets would help understand the situation. Data from the World Bank Pink Sheet and the BBS indicate that the world price of soybean oil has dropped by 10.46 percent during February 2022-February 2023, but increased by 12 percent in Bangladesh. During the same period, the price of sugar has increased by 31.45 percent in the world market, which has increased by 41.91 percent in the Bangladeshi market.

Apart from imported items, price differences in some locally produced commodities are also high. The price of 1kg of beef has increased by 25.70 percent in the domestic market even though it has declined by 5.98 percent in the international market. The skyrocketing inflation has been further exacerbated by the frequent energy price hikes in the country. Since early November 2021, there have been various types of upward adjustment of fuel prices. With the conditionality regarding the USD 4.7 billion loan from the International Monetary Fund (IMF), it is likely that there will be further increase in energy prices as the IMF wants subsidies to be withdrawn. This will be passed on to the consumers, further increasing their cost of living.

It is distressing to know that yet another traditional craft is on its way to extinction. As per a report by this daily, artisans involved in the century-old craft of making Shital pati (a form of cane mats) in Tangail are struggling to survive due to the shortage of raw materials, rising production costs, and lack of capital. Made from a plant fibre, Shital pati has been popular among the people of Bengal for ages as its surface remains cool even in the hottest weather. It is used primarily in rural households, for sleeping and relaxing purposes. Sometimes, the mats are placed above tin roofs for cooling effects.

Reportedly, around 1,000 families in several villages of Tangail are involved in this craft, who are now facing a threat to their only means of livelihood. With cheaper plastic substitutes flooding the market, the demand for these beautifully crafted mats has gone down, while production issues continue to jeopardise their chance of revival, especially in the face of competition from large corporations. Cane, the primary raw material used in making the mat, is also becoming scarce as there is little investment in this industry. Moreover, the artisans can only earn during the summer months when the demand is relatively high. In the remaining months, they do not have any sales and hence no earnings.

It should be noted that making Shital pati is a slow process as it involves collecting the cane and processing the fibre, after which it is weaved into mats. Most of the weaving is done by women

Apart from its practical use as a cooling mat during the scorching summer months, Shital pati making is an ancient craft that is part of our heritage. Being environmentally friendly, it has the potential to be very popular in both domestic and international markets if the industry is given the support needed, and it could be a reliable foreign exchange earner. Thus, the arguments in favour of keeping this tradition alive are quite compelling. With proper investment, which would increase cane production and ensure fair remuneration to the skilled artisans, Shital pati has immense value as a sustainable product. Design innovations can also create different uses of the material.

Needless to say, government support is vital to make sure that this industry survives and thrives again. It is encouraging to know that the Bangladesh Small and Cottage Industries Corporation (BSCIC) provides loans to small and medium level entrepreneurs in Tangail. This can be expanded further to include more Shital pati entrepreneurs so that the industry can grow. We, therefore, urge the government to take advantage of the opportunity that it offers, and provide all the financial and marketing support needed to ensure that the artisans of this ancient craft can earn enough to make a decent living and also contribute to the national economy.

Collaboration is in our collective interest

According to the latest report of the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), the world is likely to fail to reach its most ambitious climate target - limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius above the preindustrial temperatures. The report warns that now is our last chance to avert a climate disaster. Many believe that unless governments around the world opt for the most aggressive climate change policies, the world is just 10 years away from either catastrophic climate change impacts or some form of greenhouse gas (GHG) emission "tipping point," at which such change will become inevitable.

Reading such reports breeds a certain sense of helplessness, but there is work we can all still do – and we must start immediately. From a personal perspective, I think the most important keyword right now is partnership. Climate change is a joint problem that requires collaborative solutions across supply chains.

In the RMG industry, we keep hearing the same message. The only way the global fashion sector will achieve its goals is by reducing carbon emissions in supply chains. Is this happening? Sadly, no. A recent report by a US-based environmental NGO assessed the progress of many

of the world's leading fashion brands in reducing supply chain emissions. The bad news is, emissions are actually rising – at precisely the wrong time.

Many people are talking about the need to "decouple" growth from carbon emissions. That way, fashion brands can continue to grow while also stabilising or reducing emissions. I accept that. I also accept that our customers need to grow. To standstill is to die in business, we all know that. There is some talk of "degrowth" as

a new form of economic system. That's all well and good, but where does it leave supply chains? The answer is: a huge number of job losses. Degrowth has huge negative social consequences for developing countries like Bangladesh. So growth – decoupled from emissions is the only option as far as I can see.

The problem is that decarbonisation is simply not happening. I've been watching this situation for a decade. Without radical change, I don't believe our industry will hit climate targets.

What might the radical actions entail? It comes back to that word partnership. There is a lot of discussion about suppliers and their customers working collaboratively. Yet, talks are all we have had so far. There is very little in the way of genuine partnership. For me, without fashion retailers and

industry as a whole will continue to see emissions rising. Decoupling will not happen.

What's frustrating is that I look at other industries and I feel sure we are missing a trick. Some of the world's largest multinationals in other sectors have been developing mutually

Some of the world's largest multinationals in other sectors have been developing mutually beneficial relationships with suppliers for more than a decade, investing heavily in supply chains to meet environmental, social and governance (ESG) goals. Many are taking a financial stake in their major suppliers, ensuring that their fortunes are collectively tied together. Why is our industry not following suit?

We all need a place at the table so we can figure out how we are going to finally crack the carbon emission conundrum.

> As I write this, we are already a quarter of the way through 2023. When one considers this, the realisation that 2030 will soon be upon us comes into clear focus. Will we still be having these same conversations in 2024? 2025? Will we still be having discussions around purchasing practices? Will we still be arguing over who funds the "greening" of garment supply chains be it suppliers or brands? Will we still be talking about the need to leverage external investment?

> Personally, I'm tired of the talk. I want to see clear, practical plans which set out what we need to do collectively to reduce emissions. It's time to develop a broad industrial strategy, with input from our international partners and a focus on decarbonisation.

I hear a lot of criticism of fashion retailers and some talk of greenwashing. My personal view is that most sustainability leaders in the fashion industry want to do the right thing and help make the world a better place. But they can't do it on their own. They need their suppliers just as much as we need them. Let's work together and start making a real difference.



It may sound cynical, but questions can be raised whether the intention is to allow the workers of the ruling party to cover their unlawful act of pressing voting buttons for their candidates in the name of assisting the voters. Besides, allowing election officials up to one percent of the voters in a polling booth to cast votes through EVMs in the event of fingerprint mismatch also increases risks of manipulation.

The amount of money that the Election Commission is seeking to repair faulty EVMs is almost double the money allocated for the last parliamentary election - which was also a record in our electoral history. Available data shows that the allocation for the last national assembly election was Tk 700 crore, when the voter number was 104 million. The EC's original plan was to have voting in 150 constituencies through EVMs, and for that it sought Tk 8,711 crore, which would have cost us 14 times more than the previous election. In a way, the ongoing economic predicament has saved us from an exorbitant waste.

people from all walks of life every day. They include young and old, women and men, ordinary villagers and urban elites. They also represent different shades of political opinions. However, one common trait among all of them is, they are preoccupied with our upcoming general election.

The common questions that I face in these interactions are: in which direction is Bangladesh as a nation heading? Will there be an election at the end of 2023 or the beginning of 2024? Will the election be free and fair? Will it be participatory? Will there be dialogues between the major political parties? Will there be a caretaker government? What will be the role of India, US, UK, Japan, and the EU? Will Khaleda Zia be able to participate in the election? Will Sheikh Rehana be in politics and contest the next election? Most of them do have opinions – rather strong opinions - about the future direction of the country. Many of them also do not hesitate to express them. Some even insist that their opinions are the correct ones, and I should wait to see their predicted future unfold.

Most people I interacted with in the last few weeks feel that there won't be serious violence, because the law enforcement agencies will be able to contain it. However, if the violence does escalate, many of the beneficiaries, in their view, will flee the country because they have already stashed away significant financial resources abroad. They also feel that with serious violence, the election will become uncertain.

Almost everyone I spoke with in the last few weeks are convinced that by whatever means, the ruling Awami League and its alliance partners are going to stay in power, the consequences of which, in their view, would lead us towards an uncertain future in the long run. In their opinion, free and fair elections are the only legal, constitutional, and peaceful means of going forward. If that is thwarted, it would lead to violence. Thus, manipulated elections will serve no purpose.

Some of the people, especially those who are sympathetic to the ruling party, are confident that the prime minister is a miracle maker who can use her magic wand to find a solution to our electoral problem. She has solved many thorny problems in the past. She has, for example, abolished the highly popular caretaker government system through the 15th amendment of our constitution and could manage its fallout. She can do it again.

We, too, hope that Sheikh Hasina's lucky streak will continue, and she will be able to pull a solution out of her hat for holding a free

THE LIBERATION WAR MUSEUM Narrating Collective Trauma



Liberation War Museum (LWM) in Dhaka tells the story not only of the Liberation War but also of the long struggles of breaking the fetters that, over the decades, led to the ultimate formation of Bangladesh. For a nation that went through as many major tragedies as Bangladesh, this is not merely a museum meant for education or recreation but a site of personally meaningful memory for millions. The interpretation of history in the museum is from a Bengali Bangladeshi perspective and the narrative is largely that of the victims and sufferers chronicling their own histories. The exhibition of the collections is geared towards visitors who are mostly locals and might often have a personal link to the war, and for whom, the viewing might aid in the process of healing. There is a deeply ethical element to the museum collections, and, for a visitor who has links to the perpetrators of violence, the collections may inspire a sense of guilt or the desire to undo historical injustices. And even for others who do not have a personal connection to the war, the museum has the potential to be one of the most emotionally perturbing sites of memory they ever visit.

Every museum has a specific social, ethical, and perhaps also a political purpose, and every museum has a story to tell. The story that LWM

Digital media has become commonplace in museums, not only in the West but also in South Asia. Thus, my intention is not to marvel at the novelty of digitisation in LWM but to open questions about the target viewership of the museum and the societal changes that bring about this need for newness in museological practice. The social media presence and virtual viewing options are not neutral and inconsequential. What are the societal needs that these changes cater to? Is it that the humdrum of our social media life has encroached upon museums? Are museums succumbing to the unquestioned technophilia around us? Or is it that the museums are transcending beyond the space that they have traditionally been limited to? In a nation like Bangladesh where digital literacy is on the rise, LWM's investment of time and resources into digitisation is meaningful indeed. Museums and archives have always held the power, in the Foucauldian sense, of being storehouses of knowledge. The power to disseminate knowledge of specific memory, to decide what is worthy of remembering, to determine whose archival value mandates preservation. It is interesting to see how LWM exerts its power to create an overarching narrative of the Liberation War. At the same time, it is also interesting to witness the effect that the larger social trends have on its museological practices. Using inventive technology in a museum comes with its own challenges. How to digitise collective trauma without falling into the trap of going overboard, so as not to jeopardise the reverence and contemplation that is aimed for, so as not to trivialize the gravitas of the subject? Populist practices facilitate engagement with the larger public, but it also presents a challenge for museums to not let the populist practices eclipse its larger message. It is to be seen how LWM navigates the difficult terrain of strengthening the legitimacy of its cultural status as a source of authoritative information while, at the same time, opening up the museum space to make it a more welcoming and accessible site.

What is interesting is the ways in which LWM attempts to navigate the challenges of narrating a kind of collective trauma that has been and continues to be narrated extensively and in varied, often contradictory, ways in the larger society.

In the face of increasing number of official apologies and transitional justice movements, memorial museums like LWM have emerged all over the world. Such a museum becomes all the more important for Bangladesh in the absence of any restitution, formal compensation or apology to war victims from Pakistan's end. Museums play a central role in the mediation of memory in the public realm. This becomes even more

significant considering that, in Bangladesh, for a long stretch of time, the military achievements of the war became the focus of attention and the civil agitation behind the war lay buried under layers of dust.

LWM presents itself as a storehouse of the memories of ordinary people as well as freedom fighters. Founded in 1996 in the

backdrop of civil society agitations for war crimes trials, and at a time when there finally was adequate space for commemorating civilian contribution in the war, LWM memorialises objects donated by victims' families and survivors of the war, in the form of photographs, daily use objects and family heirlooms. Many of the exhibits are mundane objects but they each tell a memory story, often a deeply distressing one. For instance, the museum displays burnt wood pieces from Khan-house of Keraniganj near Dhaka, which, the visitor learns, was set on fire by

curators. Such participatory culture fits in with the aim of creating a sense of citizenship through shared suffering, and, in some ways, breaks down the walls of elitism around museums.

As mentioned in the mission statement of the museum, it aims to commemorate not only the suffering but also the heroism of the people, which, together, generates the discourse of martyrdom. The discourse of martyrdom in any culture is fraught with many complexities and can be interrogated at great length. Leaving that aside for another time, one might shift attention to how the museum exhibits offer an entry-point into this discourse through material memory. The galleries are designed in such a manner that there is an impression of allocation of similar space to all martyrs' contributions as the museum exhibits similar objects like monochrome photos and clothes for all victims, whether they be civilian. military participants or those who accidentally came under the wheels of history. This humanises the dead. personalises history and emphasises the individuality of each victim instead of them being reduced to statistical data.

The differing social status and professions of various martyrs is also made evident through the various objects displayed. There are social and vocational clues in the memorabilia. For instance, the museum displays the art works of Bhupatinath Chakraborty Chowdhury, a mentor of music and art. His artwork is accompanied by a narrative of him being compelled to perform during his interrogation by the Pakistani army. Not only material memories of those who died but also those of individuals who contributed in their own ways towards the war efforts are exhibited in the galleries. For example, the museum preserves a radio receiver used by Ejaz Hussain to monitor news broadcasts from which information was later used for Swadhin Bangla Betar. This serves the museum's purpose of illustrating the contribution of the entire population towards the liberation of the nation. The narrative comes

Morocco coach Walid Regragui has hailed his team as history makers after they followed up their giant killing feats of last year's World Cup with their first win over Brazil in a friendly in Tangier on Saturday.

The Atlas Lions became the first Arab team to defeat the five-times world champions, with goals from Sofiane Boufal and substitute Abdelhamid Sabiri earning Morocco a 2-1 victory.

"It feels like I'm dreaming," Regragui told reporters. "We wrote history. $\bar{\operatorname{We}}$ beat Brazil, who are number one in the FIFA rankings and the country of football."

The match, Morocco's first since their stunning run to last year's World Cup semi-finals, was played out in a festive atmosphere at a sold-out Ibn Batouta stadium in front of more than 65,000 fans.

"To make the celebration beautiful, we had to win this match and that's what we did," Morocco centre back Romain Saiss said.

"We were at the level even though it was complicated. The mental state of the team made the difference and made people happy again and that's what is important.'



Russia to play first home match since start of war

After having earned Bangladeshi citizenship in 2021, Eleta Kingsley became the country's first naturalised footballer to represent Bangladesh national football team as the Nigerian-born striker featured against Seychelles in a FIFA friendly match on Saturday. The morning after, Eleta spoke to The Daily Star's Anisur Rahman before training in Sylhet. Here are the excerpts of the conversation:

The Daily Star (DS): Did you have a sound sleep after your dream of donning the red and green jersey came true?

Eleta Kingsley (EK): I couldn't sleep because I had a lot to reflect on. Normally when you have beautiful moments, the next night is very difficult to sleep.

DS: How do you feel now after making the longawaited debut?

EK: At last, I've done it! I'm very excited for this chance I got in the national team. The dream would have been completed had I taken my first [scoring] chance.

DS: Did you even dream of playing for the Nigeria national team when you started playing football?

EK: Yes, I dreamt. As a Nigerian, I had a chance to get in the national team but selection saw me out. I was upset and decided to go outside and play football.

DS: One of your dreams has been fulfilled, what's next?

EK: Scoring as many goals as possible for



the national team is my next dream because eventually] I want to sit back and count how many goals I scored for my country as a striker.

DS: Did you ever think about becoming a citizen of Bangladesh and to play for the national team after marrying a Bangladeshi?

EK: I never thought I was going to be Bangladeshi before 2015 even though I got married in 2012. However, when I won the Sheikh Kamal International Club Championship [for Chittagong Abahani], I took a flag of Bangladesh and ran around the ground to thank our fans. From that moment, my wife [Liza Jafar] was telling me how

I wished it was real and that was how I started the journey.

DS: Were you nervous after being on the ground in debut and finding the first chance to score? EK: Yesterday I was just unlucky because the ball bounced off the ground. I blame the pitch which has not been up to mark for international standard. I was a bit nervous because putting on a jersey for the first time and scoring a goal at the same time was too much load. But, if you ask me just to play, I score.

DS: How was the reaction from your family members, especially your mother in Nigeria? EK: My wife and daughter have come here to watch my first match and fulfilled my dream. I spoke to my mom and brothers yesterday [Saturday] and everyone is happy.

DS: How challenging is it to play football at the age of 33?

EK: Yes, but in my case, I have to rely on experience. As long as the coach tells me I'm supporting the team on and off the ball, I think that's enough for

DS: Can Bangladesh expect something from the upcoming SAFF Championship with your inclusion after having been eliminated from the group stage in last five editions?

EK: In the first meeting I had with the coach, we talked a lot about SAFF Championship. We don't want just to play SAFF this time and qualify for the group, we want to become champions.

Russia 'took Belarus as nuclear hostage'

Says Ukraine as Putin announces deployment of nuke weapons to Minsk; US reacts cautiously

A top security adviser to Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky said yesterday that Russian plans to station tactical nuclear weapons in Belarus would destabilise that country, which he said had been taken "hostage" by Moscow.

Russian President Vladimir Putin announced the decision on Saturday, sending a warning to Ukraine and escalating a standoff

a meeting of the UN Security Council in response. It asked the international community to "take decisive measures" to prevent Russia's use of nuclear weapons.

Putin likened his plans to the US stationing its weapons in Europe, and said Russia would not be transferring control of the weapons to Belarus. However, this could be the first time since the mid-1990s outside the country.

on Twitter. Ukraine called for nuclear superpower, played down concerns about Putin's announcement and the potential for Moscow to use nuclear weapons in the war in Ukraine, reports Reuters

"We have not seen any reason to adjust our own strategic nuclear posture nor any indications Russia is preparing to use a nuclear weapon. We remain committed to the collective defence of Nato over its military support for that Russia has based such weapons the Nato alliance," a senior US administration official said.

Mummies of dogs, goats, cows, gazelles and mongooses were also exhumed by a team of US archaeologists from New York University at Abydos, a site in southern Egypt famous

Congress leaders, workers across India yesterday held a "Sankalp Satyagraha" in protest against the disqualification of Rahul Gandhi from the Lok Sabha.

Congress leaders Priyanka Gandhi Vadra and Mallikarjun Kharge flipped the BJP's pitch against Rahul Gandhi, saying Prime Minister Narendra Modi led the BJP's caustic attacks against the Gandhi family and insulted his Kashmiri Pandit lineage.

Calling Rahul Gandhi the "son of a martyr", his sister Priyanka Gandhi Vadra said the BJP insulted him every day, not even sparing their Nehru-Gandhi family.

Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, the party general secretary, and Kharge, the Congress chief, led a "satyagraha" outside Delhi's Raj Ghat after their protest request at the Mahatma Gandhi memorial was turned down by the police, reports NDTV online.

"You call my brother, the son of a martyr, a traitor and Mir Jafar. You insult his mother. Your Chief Minister says Rahul Gandhi doesn't know who his mother is. You insult my family every day. But no cases are filed," Priyanka Gandhi Vadra said.

"Your Prime Minister, in a parliament full of people, says 'why doesn't this family use the name Nehru name'. He insults the whole family of Kashmiri Pandits, and the custom of a son carrying forward the family's name after the death of his father," she said.
