

## She went to Pakistan, SANG RABINDRA SANGEET on their national television

**A Bangladeshi girl went viral on the internet for singing Rabindra Sangeet on Pakistan's national channel, ARY. Musician Sheikh Dina, the NSU graduate who now resides in the US, told us the story that is still circulating on social media.**

"I met this group of Pakistani musicians in the UK, who have a band named Sounds of Kolachi. We met while we performed in the UK, for Birmingham Contemporary Music Group," said the artiste. "As we were discussing about Pakistani artistes performing at Bangladeshi folk festival, they said that they wish to invite some Bangladeshi artistes to perform at their festival as well."

Deep inside, the young singer did not want to miss this opportunity. "I felt it would be a great chance to present my mother tongue in Pakistan."

Dina, is currently pursuing her Masters in Business Administration (MBA) - Business Analytics at Midwestern State University, in Texas.

After she received the official invitation, she was still in dilemma as people around her were making negative remarks about her visit to Pakistan. "I was discouraged, and some even told me that I will struggle to get a Visa for many countries, especially the US. These were all stereotypes, as I am sitting in the US and talking to you right now."

Rabindranath Tagore was considered a taboo and controversial figure in Pakistan, since the partition of India and the formation of Pakistan in 1947. Twenty years later, all works of Tagore were officially banned in all government media (radio, TV, government newspapers, etc.) by the orders of Ayub Khan's powerful information and broadcasting minister, Khwaja Shahabuddin, and East Pakistan governor Monem Khan, in 1967.

Dina had previously performed on several international platforms representing our local folk music to the world. She has been collaborating with the British Council and Art Council England, on their digital platforms,

which was arranged by Transforming Narratives.

"This initiative has been taken by the British Council and with their sponsored amount, I have produced a short film, 'Dhaka Say Karachi', that connects Pakistan and Bangladesh." Besides this, Dina is also the Global Ambassador at the Office of Global Education at MSU Texas.

On March 8, 2020, Dina performed at Pakistan's NAPA (National Academy of Performing Arts) International Folk Festival, alongside some other international artistes. They performed in some other countries including Germany and Nepal, among 15 other countries.

"When I entered the stage, I saw that the centre was adorned with red flowers representing Bangladesh," Dina recalled. "I performed the song 'Amar Haat Bandhibi', and it was a collaboration with a musical theatre group. The performers who danced with me literally had their limbs tied, and I was in tears during my performance."

Dina's performance was a representation



of the brutal rapes and war crimes that took place during our Liberation War. She explained that the lyrics of the song were translated and the audience were in pin drop

silence, as they could clearly understand what the performance signified.

Born and brought up in Chattogram, Dina comes from a conservative family, who did not allow her to explore the world of art initially, which was her only passion. "I managed to come to Dhaka all alone and from there my journey towards my dream began," shared Dina.

She is also the vocalist of the band Ektara, along with other members Amit Rajbongshi, SN Tonwi, Zaim Mustakim, and Azmain Mahtab. "We formed the band while studying at North South University," she adds.

Dina stayed in Pakistan for a week, and apart from participating in the festival, she met many people who left behind

their families in Bangladesh. "Being a Bangladeshi citizen visiting them as a guest was delightful, and learning about their stories was heartbreaking as well," shared an emotional Dina. "I didn't want to miss the opportunity to perform in my mother language in the land of Pakistan," asserts the singer.

Dina had experienced the unheard stories that were left behind, and buried many years ago. Amongst many memories, Dina shared some which will always remain in her heart. "I went on a radio show, where I met an elderly person who has been working in a low-level position. Upon hearing that a Bangladeshi girl has come to their radio for a show, the man couldn't resist meeting me,"

said the singer. "Without uttering a word, he hugged me and cried like a child, and shared that he used to work in West Pakistan during the war, and his family lived in the then East Pakistan."

"Dhaka Say Karachi— A Tale of Two Lost Souls" was released on February 22, 2021, as a collaboration between Bangladesh, Pakistan and the UK. The film highlights Dina's travels to Pakistan. Dina's journey and her experience of visiting the country that still shares a bittersweet relationship, has brought her inner South Asian identity to the forefront. It was not easy for Dina either.

As many people are captioning the video of Dina's performance on social media, Dina shared that she is upset about it. "It is absolutely upsetting that people are making fun of such a critical moment a country is going through," spoke Dina, about Pakistan's current financial crisis.

Many even captioned that sinking Pakistan is desperate to build a relationship with Bangladesh. "I am totally against this, and I would request everyone not to spread hatred connecting with such a special moment that we brought after many decades."

"Since I have travelled there and I have been maintaining a bond with a group of Pakistani musicians who are my friends, I know what perspective they have towards us. They are extremely sorry about the brutality that happened in 1971, and it was interesting to know that they actually had a completely different idea about the history we share. Even the new generation of Pakistan grew up knowing that 1971 was a conflict with India. Many, with their own effort, identified the true history, and they felt guilty for their lack of knowledge. Thus, we should at least show our empathy during their crisis," she concluded.

war "remains extremely low".

in an altercation around 10:00am.

At one stage, police attacked BNP men, resulting in chases and counter-chases, alleged Johirul.

Police fired blanks during the incident.

Abu Chan, Rukku, and Chhatra Dal activist Shishir were admitted to Durgapur Upazila Health Complex with injuries, Johurul said.

Contacted, Shibirul Islam, officer-in-charge of Durgapur Police Station, meanwhile, claimed the BNP men attacked police first and later they retaliated.

server was infected with ransomware.

On Friday, hackers said the national carrier has approximately four days to comply with the ransom demand or else they would make public about 100GB of data, which include passport details of passengers, employees, and reports on other carriers, according to Biman sources.

The data also included flight, cargo, and crew information of all flights, the hackers claimed.

Asked about the reported demand about ransom yesterday, Mahbub Ali said the information that hackers have demanded ransom was not correct.

In a message, Indian External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said the

multifaceted partnership between the two countries is founded on shared sacrifices.

"Bangladesh will always be a strong pillar of India's Neighbourhood First Policy," he said.

Chinese President Xi Jinping too lauded the remarkable progress of Bangladesh.

China and Bangladesh are enjoying solid and profound political trust, and practical cooperation has been advancing steadily, he said, referring to the development projects under the "Belt and Road Initiative".

He said China attaches great importance to the development of China-Bangladesh relations and stands ready to work to push the strategic partnership of cooperation to a new height.

In a congratulatory letter to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, Russian President Vladimir Putin said the relations between the two countries are based on good traditions of friendship and mutual respect.

Putin said he is confident that

further development of constructive bilateral cooperation fully meets the core interests of the people of Russia and Bangladesh, and goes in line with the promotion of regional security and stability.

WHAT WILL BE THE SYSTEM?

According to section II of the Road Transport Act 2018, all sorts of drivers' licences, except the ones for learners, will be assigned 12 points.

The authorities issued a gazette on December 27 last year putting the rules of the act in effect. The rules mentioned 13 offences.

A driver may lose two points for overloading and intentionally obstructing movement of other vehicles and one point each for 11 other offences including illegal parking, speeding, and violation of traffic signals, the rules said.

A mobile court or a BRTA official not below the rank of motor vehicle inspector or police officer not below the rank of sergeant can deduct the points. The officer must have a photo or video footage of the offence and inform the driver and the authority immediately after deducting a point.

A driver can request a review of the decision within a month by paying a fee and the authorities will make a decision within a month.

If a driver does not violate any rules for six months, the authority can give them back two points following an appeal. The drivers will get two more

points if they do not violate any rules for another six months in a row.

But drivers will not be allowed to appeal for points for two years after losing eight points.

The BRTA has already held meetings about the matter and directed its software vendor to prepare a system so that it can be implemented, said a top official.

But it will be very difficult to implement the system because of the large number of drivers and vehicles without valid documents, said the official, requesting anonymity.

Moreover, the transport associations may become an impediment as they often obstruct government initiatives that go against their vested interests, he added.

Sources at the road transport and bridges ministry said the authority may consider these matters and pilot the system before starting full implementation.

Similar systems of demerit points are used in different countries, officials said.

Contacted, Monibur Rahman, additional commissioner (Traffic) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, said the police are reviewing the system.

"We are hopeful about starting the

system, but it may take some time," he said.

Shahed Al Masud, a deputy commissioner of Tejgaon Traffic division, told The Daily Star that implementation of a new system always poses some challenges.
