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

Agriculture still main job generator

It seems the Bangladesh economy is stuck in a time warp, going by the latest edition of the Labour Force Survey unveiled vesterday.

As an economy develops, more and more labour move out of the agriculture sector and join the manufacturing sector. In the next stage of transformation, workers move out of manufacturing and on to the services sector.



In Bangladesh, agriculture continues to be the chief source of employment -- in 2022. In 2016-17, the sector accounted for 40.6 percent of employment. In 2022, that ratio increased to 45.33 percent - indicating that the country continues to be a largely agrarian society.

The share of manufacturing in total employment declined from 20.4 percent in 2016-17 to 17.02 percent raising questions about the nature of economic

development in recent years. Over the past decade, the Bangladesh economy clocked in respectable GDP growth of about 6 percent on average, and just before the global coronavirus pandemic started, it was amongst the fastest growing nations in the world.

Rice, wheat intakes get smaller for poor

Finds survey by Sanem

Poor people are eating smaller portions of the staples rice and wheat while their protein intake has become few and far between as they strive to make ends meet amid the persistently high inflation, according to a recent survey.

In the first eight months of the fiscal year, inflation averaged 8.74 percent, way above the budgetary target of 5.6 percent, according to data from the Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics.

"Low-income families have become big victims of high inflation, supply chain disruptions and imperfections in the domestic market," said Selim Raihan, executive director of the South Asian Network on Economic Modelling (Sanem), which conducted the survey.

The findings of the survey titled "Effects of Inflation on the Livelihoods of the Poorer Households in Bangladesh" were revealed at a press briefing at the

Brac Centre Inn in the capital yesterday. Sanem surveyed 1,600 households in eight divisions between March 9 and

March 18 and found the average cost for families is 13 percent more than six months ago. The highest cost increase

Poor households have reduced their consumption of staples like rice and wheat by 37.08 percent and 56.55 percent respectively.

More than 96 percent of the poor have slashed their meat consumption and 88.22 percent have reduced fish consumption. Egg and oil consumption was down 77.06 percent and 81.43 percent respectively.

However, the income of the households remained unchanged in the six months -- from September last year to February this year. To cope with the situation, 90

percent of the households are changing their food habits and 74 percent are forced to borrow, Raihan said.

"Poorer households are eating less they are more food insecure now," he said, adding that the extent of the impact is higher in urban areas than in
