ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT Govt takes up Tk 2,995cr project

The government plans to take up a Tk 2,995-crore project for enhancing its technical and administrative capacity to manage the environment in a sustainable manner across

Under this project, the Department of Environment (DoE) will build its permanent regional offices and laboratories in at least 35 districts and four divisions by acquiring 13.15 acres of land.

The project will establish a "Green Credit Guarantee" Scheme" to incentivise the financial sector to support green investments, which will reduce air pollution, according to the documents of the planning ministry.

The project, "Bangladesh Environmental Sustainability and Transformation", will be placed before the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecnec)

The project will also be helpful to improve environmental regulations and curb pollution.

Aiming at reducing pollution, the DoE will establish an

air-quality forecasting system. Bangladesh Bank, Bangladesh Road Transport Authority, and Bangladesh Hi-Tech Park Authority will jointly implement the project under the leadership of the

The project is expected to start in July 2023 and be completed in June 2028. The World Bank will finance the project with Tk 2,569 crore, and French aid agency Agence Française de Développement (AFD) will provide Tk 232.13 crore.

SCBA VANDALISM 24 pro-BNP lawyers get bail in case

The High Court yesterday granted anticipatory bail to 24 pro-BNP lawyers in a case filed over vandalism and attempted murder of lawyers at an iftar mahfil organised by the Supreme Court Bar Association on April 6.

They have been granted bail for 12 weeks or till submission of the police report, whichever is earlier,

The HC also asked the accused lawyers to surrender before the lower court concerned during this period in connection with the case.

The HC bench, led by Justice Md Iqbal Kabir Lytton and Justice AKM Rabiul Hassan, passed the order following a bail petition filed by the 24

lawyers. Earlier in the day, the accused petitioners, including AM Mahbub Uddin Khokon and Md Ruhul Quddus Kazal, appeared before the HC bench seeking bail.

lawyer Senior Mohammad Ali appeared for the petitioners during hearing of the petition, while Deputy Attorney General BM Abdur Rafell opposed the bail petition.

Md Robiul Hassan, administrative officer of SCBA, lodged the case on April 9 with Shahbagh Police Station in Dhaka against 50 to 60 persons, including 24 pro-BNP

The grim picture of street children's lives

4 out of 10 surveyed never enrolled in school, finds BBS

Around four out of 10 street children have never been enrolled in school, according to a survey conducted by Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS).

The survey findings reveal that over 56.6 percent of street children who attend school are unable to complete grade five. Only a small fraction -- 8.8 percent can complete this grade.

"Survey on Street Children 2022" was conducted with support from Unicef Bangladesh and the Department of Social Services. Planning Minister MA Mannan unveiled the survey findings at the BBS Auditorium in the capital's Agargaon yesterday.

The findings reveal that Chattogram, followed closely by Barishal and Dhaka, has the highest number of street children.

The survey findings are based on first-hand reports from a sample of 7,200 children aged five to 17 years in hotspots of the country's eight divisions. While the report does

Human trafficking syndicate busted Gang, in guise of NGO,

The promise of a better life in a foreign land has long been a lure for many. But for some, this dream turns into a nightmare when they become targets of human-trafficking syndicates.

The Cyber and Special Crime Division of the police's Detective Branch (DB) has revealed that a syndicate has been forging documents to obtain visas for countries like the USA and Europe, and then trafficking people into those countries as

The details of this elaborate scheme came to light after the detectives arrested three members of the syndicate. The three suspects, Abul Kashem Shaikh, Bokhtiar Hossain, and Nazrul Islam, were apprehended by DB yesterday. They were involved in the criminal activities for over a decade.

Kashem, who identified himself as the CEO of an NGO called Kathak Academy, has been involved in trafficking people since 2008, according to Harun Or Rashid, additional commissioner (DB) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police.

"We have seized 31 passports from Kashem's possession. He collected these passports through his agents with an aim of trafficking people to the USA, Germany, Japan, Italy, Dubai, and France," said Rashid.

Kashem's modus operandi involved sending a

Lack of awareness the key reason

Speakers tell workshop on online harassment victims struggling to get support

Online harassment victims are struggling to seek redress due to a lack of awareness and institutional mechanisms, as well as poor digital literacy and fear of stigma, said speakers at a workshop yesterday.

They made the remarks at "Advocacy dialogue: Recommendation for strengthening service provision and protection mechanism for citizens who are victims of online crimes and harassment", held at a city hotel. The workshop was organised by the European Union (EU), DNET, and the Friedrich Naumann Foundation for Freedom under the "Foster Responsible Digital Citizenship to Promote Freedom of Expression in Bangladesh" project.

Many victims are unaware of where to seek redress for online harassment and bullying, the speakers said.

Taif Hussain, programme manager of the delegation of the European Union to Bangladesh, said, "It is important to consider one's behaviour and awareness in the offline world. Your online behaviour can be affected by your offline conduct if you are not a civilized citizen in real life.'

The formation of eight cyber tribunals to redress cases of cyber harassment has not been widely publicised, and people often fear approaching police stations due to the stigma associated with being a victim, said independent consultant Mozahidul Islam
