WB to give \$2.75b over next 5 years

Financing meant to accelerate green growth

The World Bank is set to provide \$2.75 billion by way of six projects over the next five years to help Bangladesh achieve greener and more resilient development and greater inclusion.

Financial agreements for five of the projects took place during the celebrations of 50 years of partnership between the WB and Bangladesh at the lender's headquarters in Washington DC on May 1.

The projects are being funded by the International Development Association, the WB arm that offers concessional loans and grants to the world's poor nations.

Those loans are to be repaid in 30 years with a grace period of five years. A yearly service charge of 0.75 percent and an interest rate of 1.25 percent needs

to be paid on the withdrawn amount of

the loans. Besides, a maximum annual commitment fee of 0.50 percent is payable on the unwithdrawn financing balance.

For one of the projects involving \$500 million, a different financing structure is being used: 65 percent of the amount is being treated as a Shortterm Maturity Loan. The \$324 million has to be repaid in 12 years with a grace period of six years. No service charge and interest will be applicable on the withdrawn amount of the loan.

Of the six projects, three were approved by the WB board last year but their loan agreements were not signed. The other three were approved ahead of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's visit to

Washington DC for the celebrations. The loan agreement for one of the projects will be signed later.

The PM was speaking at the plenary session of an event titled "Reflection on 50 years of World Bank-Bangladesh Partnership" at the WB headquarters in Washington DC on Monday, reports BSS.

"My presence here [at the WB HQ] signals that we maintain our trust in the World Bank. Our success in the next two decades would depend on our collective ability and efforts to overcome the emerging challenges in a just and sustainable manner," Hasina said.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has blamed external pressure for the cancellation of World Bank's \$1.2 billion credit to finance the Padma Bridge.

regret that the World Bank moved away from funding this most important project [Padma Multipurpose Bridge owing to external pressure," she said on Monday while addressing an informal interaction with WB's Board of Executive Directors in Washington DC.

Hasina, however, wished to look into the future of the partnership between Bangladesh and multilateral lender.

The PM is now in Washington DC on a weeklong official visit to the US mainly to take part in the celebration of the 50 years of partnership between Bangladesh and the WB.

She also presented WB President David Malpass with a painting of the Padma Bridge, which was opened on June 25 last year, during the signing of a \$2.25-billiondeal between Bangladesh and the WB to implement five projects.

The construction of the 6.1km Padma Multipurpose Bridge with our own financial and technical resources is a sign of our economic maturity," she proudly said.
