100K Russian troops dead, hurt: US

More than 20,000 Russian troops have died and another 80,000 were wounded in five months of fighting in eastern Ukraine, particularly in Bakhmut, a White House official said Monday.

"We estimate that Russia has suffered more than 100,000 casualties, including over 20,000 killed in action," National Security Council spokesman John Kirby told reporters.

"Russia's attempt at an offensive in the Donbass, largely through Bakhmut, has failed... Russia has been unable to seize any really strategically significant territory," Kirby said.

Kirby, citing newly declassified US intelligence, said that about half of those killed were soldiers recruited by the private military company Wagner, reports AFP.

The toll from fighting -- with the most intense battle being for Bakhmut, where Ukrainian troops have been driven from all but a sliver of the city -- accounts for losses since the start of December.

TENSIONS WITH CHINA US, Philippines reaffirm 'ironclad' alliance

President Joe Biden told his counterpart Ferdinand Marcos Jr. on Monday that the US commitment to the defense of its ally was "ironclad," including in the South China Sea where Manila is under pressure

Marcos, on the first White House visit by a Philippines leader in 10 years, stressed the importance of the US as his country's sole treaty ally in a region with "arguably most complicated geopolitical situation in the world right now.'

The two countries reaffirmed their decades-old security alliance in a trip that marks a dramatic turnaround in US-Philippine relations as both countries seek ways to push back against what they see as China's increasingly aggressive actions near Taiwan and in South China Sea.

US officials said the leaders would agree new guidelines for stronger military cooperation. "The United States remains ironclad in our commitment to the defense of the Philippines, including the South China Sea," Biden told Marcos.

A joint statement said this meant that any armed attack on Philippine armed forces, public vessels or aircraft in Pacific, including in the South China Sea. would invoke US mutual defense commitments.

Over 430,000 fled homes amid Sudan fighting

Says UN; warring parties agree to 7-day truce

The fighting in Sudan has caused more than 330,000 people to flee their homes within the country, with over 100,000 others escaping over the borders, the United Nations said vesterday.

UNHCR, the UN's refugee agency, is estimating that more than 800,000 people could potentially flee to neighbouring countries as the conflict continues in Sudan between the army and a paramilitary group.

The UN's International Organization for Migration (IOM) said an estimated 334,000 people had been internally displaced by the fighting, which broke out on April 15.

"Over 100,000 refugees are estimated to be among those who have now fled Sudan to neighbouring countries, including Sudanese

refugees, South Sudanese returning home prematurely, and others who were themselves refugees in Sudan," UNHCR spokeswoman Olga Sarrado told reporters in Geneva.

The IOM said in a situation report that "the total estimate of displaced individuals across Sudan has reached 334,053", reports AFP.

"About 72 percent, roughly 240,000 of these new internal displacements were reported in West and South Darfur alone," spokesman Paul Dillon told reporters.

Meanwhile, warring factions agreed in principle to a seven-day ceasefire from Thursday, reports Reuters.

A statement released by the foreign ministry of South Sudan said its President Salva Kiir stressed the importance of a longer truce and of naming envoys to peace talks, to which both sides had agreed.

Int'l police arrest 288 in dark web bust

A global crackdown has halted a major "dark web" marketplace, with police international arresting 288 suspects and recovering more than 50 million euros (\$54.8 million) in cash and virtual currency, Europol said yesterday.

The joint operation called SpecTor by US, British, Brazilian and European law enforcement also netted almost a tonne of drugs and 117 firearms. "A number of these suspects were considered high-value targets," Europol said.

'Godfather of AI' quits Google

Warns of danger ahead

computer scientist often dubbed "the godfather of artificial intelligence" has quit his job at Google to speak out about the dangers of the technology, US media reported Monday. Geoffrey Hinton, who created a foundation technology for AI systems, told The New York

Times that advancements made in the field posed "profound risks to society and humanity". "Look at how it was five years ago and how it is now," he was quoted as saying in the piece, which was published on Monday. "Take the difference and propagate it forwards. That's scary." Hinton said that competition between tech giants was pushing companies to release new AI technologies at dangerous speeds, risking jobs and spreading misinformation. "It is hard to see how you can prevent the bad actors from using it for bad things," he told the Times. In 2022, Google and OpenAI — the start-up behind the popular AI chatbot ChatGPT — started building systems using much larger amounts of data than before. Hinton told Times he believed that these systems were eclipsing human intelligence in some ways because of amount of data they were analysing.

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM US panel again takes aim at India

A US government panel renewed calls Monday to blacklist India over religious freedom, saying that treatment of minorities has continued to worsen under Prime Minister Narendra Modi. The US Commission on International Religious Freedom offers recommendations but does not set policy and there is little expectation that the State Department will accept its stance on India, a growing US partner. The State Department each year lists countries where it sees particular concern on religious freedom, with the prospect of sanctions without improvement. The independent commission, whose members are appointed by the president and congressional party leaders, supported all of the State Department's latest designations which included China, Iran, Myanmar, Pakistan, Russia and Saudi Arabia.
