WB concerned about project delays


Voices worries in latest country partnership framework

The more than seven years average project implementation period for Bangladesh between 2016 and 2021 presents a risk to the effective implementation of the next country partnership framework, said the World Bank in a report recently.

The internal government processes for project preparation and approval are "very complex and slow", said the World Bank Group's Country Partnership Framework for fiscal 2022-23 to fiscal 2026-27. The CPF was approved by the WB board on April 27.

Project implementation is currently hampered by



"incipient institutional arrangements, limited financial allocation for project readiness and implementation by the government, low execution for funds that are allocated and misalignment of policies and regulations".

Between fiscals 2015-16 and 2020-21, a total of 266 projects were implemented with WB financing, and on an average, it took more than two years to get a project approved by the government.

Project preparation in close collaboration between WB teams, the ministries and implementing agencies averages about one year between Concept Review and board approval of lending operations.

Container falls off lorry, kills

An elderly man and his son were crushed to death and another man was critically injured after an improperly fastened shipping container fell on them from a lorry in Chattogram yesterday afternoon.

Younus Mizi, 60, and his son Rahim Mizi, 30, were on a rickshaw returning home from a hospital when the 20-feet-long container loaded with goods fell on them in the Patenga Khalpar area, police said.

"It appears that the shipping container slid off the vehicle after a rope used to tie the container to the truck snapped," said Shakila Sultana, commissioner of Chattogram Metropolitan Police (port).

Sub-Inspector Rupak Kanti Chowdhury of EPZ Police Station said, "The container was supposed to be tied with chains, but they used nylon rope. Besides, the container was placed in the middle of the 40 feet flatbed

without the corner castings properly bolted.
"The rope broke when the lorry was moving and caused the tragedy," he said, adding that the lorry was going from Chattogram Port to Summit Alliance Port Limited Container Depot in Katghar.

Unrest in Pakistan as Imran indicted in graft case

5 killed in clashes; army called in; ex-PM placed on 8-day remand

Pakistan's government yesterday called in the army to help quell deadly unrest in the wake of the arrest of former prime minister Imran Khan, warning protesters against any further attacks on state installations.

At least five people have died in violence that has aggravated

instability in the South Asian country of 220 million people as it grapples with a severe economic crisis and a delay to an International Monetary Fund bailout since November.
