'Dhaka, Delhi are satisfied with bilateral cooperation

Says PM's press secy after Jaishankar calls on Hasina

UNB, Dhaka

Bangladesh and India have expressed satisfaction over the bilateral cooperation between the two neighbours in various fields.

This satisfaction was expressed when Indian External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar paid a courtesy call on Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina at the Gono Bhaban yesterday.

Briefing reporters after the meeting, PM's Press Secretary Ihsanul Karim said the two leaders discussed the South Asian regional economy amid the situation emerging from the impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic and the Russia-Ukraine war.

They also discussed the 6th Indian Ocean Conference, to be held on May 12-13 in Dhaka, and the G20 summit to be organised in India in September.

Hasina hoped that India will make significant contribution for advancing the interests of the people of the developed and least developed

She conveyed her regards to her Indian counterpart Narendra Modi.

Jaishankar thanked Bangladesh for hosting the 6th Indian Ocean Conference. He said Bangladesh's participation in the event is very important.

Ambassador-at-large Mohammad Ziauddin, PM's Principal Secretary Mohammad Tofazzel Hossain Miah, Foreign Secretary Masud Bin Momen, Indian High Commissioner to Bangladesh Pranay Kumar Verma and Indian Deputy High Commissioner Binoy George were present.

Jaishankar arrived in Dhaka yesterday evening on a two-day official visit to attend the Indian Ocean Conference.

Over 14kg crystal meth seized

Members of Border Guard Bangladesh seized over 14.77kg of crystal meth, commonly known as ice, in Cox's

The officials also recovered 3,90,000 pieces of yaba and arrested three alleged drug traders during a drive, read a press release of BGB.

Details of the drive could not be known immediately.

On April 26, BGB members arrested

three alleged drug traders and seized over 21kg of ice in the district's Ukhiya upazila.

Ten days later, Rab seized over 24kg of crystal meth in the biggest ever seizure of the drug in the country.

The city's Krishnachura blooms

Is Dhaka ugly? Admittedly, this is a rather inappropriate question. Dhaka is our home. We should not call our own city -- nay, our own home -- ugly. But for a moment, if we put emotions aside, one may dare say that compared to many cities of the world our capital is not exactly aesthetically beautiful or well-planned.

Naysayers disagree, though. I shall too, let my scepticism rest for some parts of Dhaka, especially at this time of year, pointing out to the exorbitant Krishnachura blooms that have adorned our

Indeed, the Krishnachura trees dotted across Dhaka provide pleasant sights of beauty in the otherwise largely grey and dull

concrete jungle that is our capital. I am not a poet. Also, I reckon the pace and cutthroat personality of this

city has killed the romantic in me.

Otherwise, I could have waxed lyrical too, captures fascination. about Krishnachura.

Nevertheless, even for an average citizen, we get stunned by the vivid orange and reddish flowers and mesmerised by the sights surrounding them -- a day labourer rests under its shade to catch a breath in the unforgiving heat of a summer noon. A couple lazily

strolls past a line of Krishnachura trees. A group of friends takes selfies whilst photographer tries to capture the blooms in his

DSLR. Although such scenes can be several parts the metropolis, my favourite area for

Krishnachura has always been around Chandrima Udyan. The majestic Sangsad Bhaban and the waters and the relatively smooth and wide road provide a beautiful setting for the abundant Krishnachura trees and their flowers.

Perhaps, the sight of this flower is so pleasing because of the very abundance of it. Bulks and bulks of bright orange together make up for much of its beauty. Sure, a bouquet of any flower looks pretty too, but I would argue that flowers look their best when in trees, especially when there is a lot of them together.

And as for Krishnachura, I reckon it is the perfect flower for Dhaka! This city is as fiery as the Krishnachura blooms, as ambitious as the bright orange, as flamboyant as the riches of the metropolis, and as blazing as the heat of this weather.

On a separate note, it is a sad reality that some trees have recently been cleared off in Dhanmondi in the name of development, in order to build various infrastructures. This has been met with a lot of criticism -- a testament to the fact that even though Dhakaiites busy themselves with the unforgiving pace of life, we still have an intimate connection with the city itself.

So, is Dhaka ugly? Maybe not? Its trees, for example, make us think otherwise. The authorities should keep that in mind when planning those socalled development projects.

Prothom Alo reporter Shams's bail extended till June 12

A Dhaka court yesterday extended the bail of Prothom Alo reporter Samsuzzaman Shams until June 12 in a case filed with Tejgaon Police Station

under the Digital Security Act.

Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Ahmed
Humayun Kabir passed the order after Shams surrendered before it and sought permanent bail

On April 9, Shams got ad-interim bail till today from another Dhaka court after his surrender

Shams got bail from another Dhaka court on April 3 in another case filed with Shahbagh Police Station under the same act.

He walked out of jail the same day, five days after his detention from his Savar home.

On March 29, Shams was picked up from his home in Savar by law enforcers wearing plainclothes around 4:00am, triggering widespread criticism.

On March 26, the Prothom Alo made a "photo card" to post a report written by Shams on Independence Day on social media. The card had a quote from a day labourer named Zakir Hossain juxtaposed against a photo of an adolescent boy.

He was detained less than two hours after a Jubo League leader filed a DSA case with Tejgaon Police Station.

8-yr-old girl raped by madrasa teacher

An eight-year-old girl was allegedly raped by her madrasa teacher in Malandah upazila of Jamalpur on Wednesday evening.

The girl is currently undergoing treatment at

Mymensingh Medical College Hospital, said police. The accused Shariful Islam, 35, is also the imam

Quoting locals, Malandah Police Station OC Delowar Hossain said, Shariful took the child to his home next to the mosque and raped her there and fled the scene soon after.

Locals rescued the girl from his place and admitted her to Malandah Health Complex.

As her condition was deteriorating, she was shifted to Mymensingh Medical Collage Hospital. "A rape case will soon be filed in connection to this incident," OC said.

Cop, 4 others arrested with phensedyl

Five people, including a police constable, with 12 bottles of phensedyl in Habiganj Sadar Upazila on Wednesday night.

Constable Mustafiz Billah, of Sunamganj, was posted at the Habiganj District Police Lines.

The four others are suspected drug dealers Mukhleshur Rahman, Salman Miya, Shamsul Haque, and Nurul Haque, They are all from Baniachong upazila.

Habiganj Police Station Sub-Inspector Mominul Islam said, "Acting on a tip-off, police conducted a drive and arrested five people with 12 bottles of phensedyl. One of them is a police constable."

They were sent to iail via a court order in a narcotics case filed against them yesterday," he added.

OC withdrawn over 'custodial torture' of Jubo League leader

The officer-in-charge of Thakurgaon Sadar Police Station was withdrawn and attached to Rangpur range police on Wednesday night over the allegation of torturing a Jubo League leader in police custody.

Thakurgaon Superintendent of Police Mohammad Jahangir Hossain told The Daily Star about withdrawing OC Kamal Hossain yesterday morning.

Asaduzzaman Pulok, organising secretary of Thakurgaon district unit Jubo League, submitted a petition to the District and Sessions Judge's Court for filing a case on Wednesday, alleging that the OC and four other police personnel tortured him in custody on

The court the same day ordered the Thakurgaon civil surgeon to submit a

report on Pulok's health in 24 hours. It also appointed Judicial Magistrate Md Alauddin for a judicial enquiry into the incident and asked him to submit the report on May 17, the day when the court will decide whether it will record the petition as a case, said Pulok's lawyer Abdur Rahim.

According to the petition, police picked up Khalid Siraj Rocky, sports secretary of the Jubo League unit, from a Baishakhi fair on Thakurgaon Public Library premises on April 29.

They also picked up Pulok when he went to the spot and asked about the reason behind Rocky's detention. Then OC Kamal and several other police personnel took Pulok to the police station and assaulted him, read the petition.

Showing them arrested in a case filed under section 151 of the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC), the two were produced before a court that sent them to jail.

Civil Surgeon Nur Newaj told this correspondent that they checked Pulok's health and submitted the report to the court yesterday afternoon. He, however, refused to comment

on the report findings.

And Hasina called for discouraging that well into the new fiscal year too. Mannan said.

The amount given under safety net programmes will be increased but the coverage will be expanded. And allocation must be kept such

that targeted subsidies can be given in the case of an emergency. There would be no dearness

allowance in the budget, according to

Imran Khan's arrest 'invalid Coasts brace for Cyclone Mocha custody of the Supreme Court of

southwest of Mongla Port, and 1,130km south-southwest of Payra

As a precautionary measure,

the maritime ports of Chattogram, Cox's Bazar, Mongla, and Payra have been advised to hoist warning signal number 2. The Met office has advised all fishing boats and trawlers in the

north Bay and deep sea to stay close to the coast and proceed with caution. According Meteorological Department (IMD), Cyclone Mocha might have a wind

speed up to 175km while making the

landfall on Sunday.

Asked about the possible storm surge, Mohon Kumar Das, executive director at National Oceanographic and Maritime Institute (NOAMI), said he followed IMD. As per the model of Indian National Center for Ocean Information Services (INCOIS), the storm surge could

be 2 to 2.5 metres higher than the normal tide.

He further said both Cyclone Sidr and Cyclone Mocha generated in the same area of the Bay. Mocha is showing a track record more or less similar to Sidr while approaching the coast.

Meanwhile, the government has given directives to the field administration to prepare for the impact of the cyclone.

"If necessary, we will use schools and madrasas as shelters besides the permanent cyclone centres," said Kamrul Hasan, secretary of the Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief.

"The local administration officials and Ansar members will work to motivate people to go to the

Additional Deputy Commissioner of Cox's Bazar Bibhishan Kanti Das said they have an adequate number of cyclone shelters across the district. "We have taken preparations

to shelter about five lakh people," he said. Besides, they asked businesspeople in St Martin's Island to store food for at least seven days.

Special measures have been taken to evacuate around 6,000 people living in the shanties at word-1 of the beach town.

The cyclone is yet to show any impact in the coastal area.

Abdul Matin, a fish trader at Fishery Ghat in Cox's Bazar, told The Daily Star, "Most of the fishing trawlers are now at sea and they are about five hours away from the shore. They will be able to come back if the sea becomes rough."

The fishermen are also not going into the deep sea as a two-month fishing ban will be imposed possibly from May 20, he added.

Ahead of the cyclone, farmers are busy with Boro harvest. The government has already urged growers across the country to harvest ripe paddy, mango and other crops before Cyclone Mocha hits.

At least eight leaders from PTI's

central leadership accused of orchestrating the protests were also detained, Islamabad police said.
