'Chance for others to make statement'

The national selectors will now shift their focus to upcoming home series against Afghanistan after completion of the three-match ODI series against Ireland in Chelmsford.

Bangladesh Test and T20I captain Shakib Al Hasan would likely miss out on the one-off Test against Afghanistan, starting from June 14, as the all-rounder suffered a fracture at the base of index finger while attempting a catch during the second ODI against Ireland on Friday. Such injuries usually take around six weeks to heal.

"We are hopeful that he [Shakib] will be back for the limited-over series. It's always difficult to replace someone like Shakib but it's a chance for others to make a statement," said selector Habibul Bashar yesterday.

The Afghanistan series will be played in two phases. Following the lone Test, the visitors will head to India for a white-ball series before returning to Bangladesh to play the three-match ODI and two-match

Bashar further informed they will take time before announcing squad for the Afghanistan series as they will be assessing performers of Bangladesh A who are set to take on West Indies A series in Sylhet, with the first of the three four-day "Tests" scheduled to begin on May 16.

Diya excluded over poor performance

Bangladesh's premier female archer Diya Siddique, who won a gold medal in recurved mixed events of Asia Cup World Ranking tournament in Chinese Taipei in March, has been left out of the World Cup Stage-2 team over poor performance.

Her poor finishing in the recently-concluded World Cup Stage-1 in Turkey played a pivotal role in her exclusion as she scored 620 to finish 76th out of 105 competitors in the recurve individual qualification event.

Her effort also saw Bangladesh recurve mixed team fail to qualify for the elimination round.

"Diya did not perform well at international level and she needs to make some changes to better her score. With some changes, she will become stable to perform.

So, it is better for her to not participate in the upcoming World Cup, instead she should focus on training," coach Martin Frederick told The Daily Star prior to the departure of the team, which features five archers including one recurve archer, for China last night.

Hosts Bangladesh confirmed final berths in both youth and junior sections of Bangabandhu IHF Challenge Women's Trophy after notching up back-to-back victories at Shaheed M Mansur Ali National Handball Stadium vesterday

Bangladesh's preliminary target was to play in the final of the U-17 youth section, but the U-19 junior women's team did not disappoint either despite being a depleted side due to the unavailability of four key players, who are busy with HSC examinations.

Pre-tournament favourites India also booked final berths and they would square off against the hosts in dress rehearsal for the finals during today's last group matches.

Coming from a comprehensive 48-10 win over Maldives in the opening match in the youth section, Bangladesh dominated over Nepal and handed them a massive 50-4 goals defeat while the junior side, who beat Maldives 38-21, thrashed their Nepalese counterparts 23-09 to ensure the

Despite notching up comfortable victory over Nepal, Bangladesh youth team's coach Dalia Akter expressed her dissatisfaction about the quality of the opposition.

"Though we got a big win, it would have been better to have strong opponents ahead of the match against India, who are a strong side with world-class players," Dalia told reporters after the match.

Bangladesh junior team's coach Amjad Hossain said, "We tested some of our bench players and I'm happy to have seen them in the match. India are an experienced side and it is a good opportunity for us to meet them in group stage before the final. India youth and junior teams beat their Maldivian counterparts 42-14 and 55-09 respectively to confirm the finals.

Tamim among runs but Tigers lose steam

Tamim Iqbal was back among runs, which was a positive for Bangladesh after Ireland sent them to bat in Chelmsford yesterday.

The Bangladesh captain had last scored an international ODI fifty in August last year, against Zimbabwe, and went nine innings without scoring a fifty during a slightly rough patch.

The Tigers' batters, including Tamim, got starts but could not capitalise. Mushfiqur Rahim's contributions, especially during a valuable partnership with Mehedi

Hasan Miraz, set them up for a score of "par score" of 274. Having been unable to play out the fifty over, the batting performance leaves room for

improvement. Bangladesh had Shakib Al Hasan injured and out of the series but he was there to hand out ODI caps to debutants Rony Talukdar and Mrittunjoy Chowdhury before game's start. Meanwhile, Mustafizur Rahman returned to the playing eleven as well after sitting out the first two ODIs. Shoriful Islam and Taijul Islam both were rested.

Early on, Josh Little was

struggling with his wrist position, getting in a few wides and byes. When he did get it right, shaping one into Tamim, the resultant dolly of a catch was dropped by Irish skipper Andy Balbirnie.

Rony, sent in to open, however, looked unconvincing, getting off the mark after 12 deliveries following a few instances of hitting air before he departed nicking Mark Adair following a wild swipe.

Najmul Hossain Shanto, who hit his maiden ODI ton in the second ODI, appeared to be carrying his form from the last game. He moved from 23 to 35, dealing in boundaries while the partnership between him and

Tamim moved to 49. At the end of Powerplay, Bangladesh were looking good but Shanto nudged one from Craig Young, who bowled excellently, to depart for a

He, too, had struggled to bat to his potential this series but despite getting some testing deliveries outside the off stump, he held up his end with some classy shots. Another crucial partnership was developing as Tamim was allowed to find his rhythm during a 70run stand. The Irish spinners, however, managed to put the breaks in.


Andy McBrine darted one in but Liton picked the wrong shot and fell after a 39-ball 35. Other spinner George Dockrell, who had proven to be handy against Bangladesh batters in the previous game, here he got the better of Towhid Hridov.

Craig Young had been fantastic without reward but Mark Adair produced a four-fer as appeared to be pleased with how things unfolded. The early movement apart, the wickets in Essex has produced runs.

Rafa Nadal has turned down a wildcard offer for next week's Challenger tournament in Bordeaux Spaniard's participation in the French Open hangs in the balance, the claycourt event director said on Sunday.

Nadal has been struggling with a hip injury he suffered at the Australian Open in January, and fears the Spaniard may miss the Paris Grand Slam grew after he pulled out of this week's Italian Open.

"I offered him (Nadal's agent Carlos Costa) one of the wildcards. He very kindly told me that Nadal was continuing his preparation at home in Manacor, that he was not ready and was in a race against time to be ready for the French Open," Jean-Baptiste Perlant told French sports daily

Nadal skipped last week's Madrid Open and missed tournaments at Indian Wells, Miami, Monte Carlo and Barcelona.

The French Open, which Nadal has won a record 14 times including last year, starts on May 28.
