Ukraine grain deal extended for two months Says Erdogan; UK, Germany say US must decide on jets for Kyiv

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan yesterday announced a two-month extension of a UN-backed deal under which Ukraine ships grain across the Black Sea to global markets.

"With the efforts of our country, the support of our Russian friends, the contribution of our Ukrainian friends, it was decided to prolong the Black Sea grain deal for two more months," Erdogan announced one day before the deal was due to expire.

Russia agreed not to block ships from leaving two Ukrainian harbours, Erdogan said, expressing his hope that the deal would be "beneficial for all the parties".

He thanked Russian President Vladimir Putin, Ukrainian counterpart Volodymyr Zelensky and UN Secretary General Antonio

Guterres for their roles in extending the agreement. Ukraine was one of the world's major grain

exporters before Russia

invaded in February of last

year.

Russian warships blockaded Ukraine's Black

Sea ports, sending food prices skyrocketing on global markets and disproportionately hitting the world's poorest, reports AFP.

Turkey and the United Nations first brokered a deal between the warring parties in July 2022, which created safe corridors for the export of Ukrainian produce to assuage the crisis.

But the agreement has periodically come under threat since then as Russia and Ukraine struggled to agree on renewing it before expiration deadlines.

Meanwhile, any decision to send F16 fighter jets to Ukraine will fall on the White House, the UK and German defence ministers said yesterday despite a jet "coalition" announced by Britain and the Netherlands this week.

"This is up to the White House to decide whether it wants to release that technology," British Defence Minister Ben Wallace said after talks with his German counterpart Boris Pistorius in Berlin.

"It depends on the White House... to decide whether the F16 fighter planes can be delivered," Pistorius added.

British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak and Dutch counterpart Mark Rutte had agreed on the fighter jet club on the first day of a Council of Europe summit in Iceland this week.

They said they would build an "international coalition to provide Ukraine with combat air capabilities, supporting with everything from training to procuring F16 jets".

MAJOR TRANSPORT NETWORK Iran, Russia ink deal to complete INSTC

Iran and Russia yesterday agreed to collaborate on the construction of the final part of a commercial transport network linking to the Gulf and India

while avoiding Western sea lanes. Iranian Transport Minister Mehrdad Bazrpash, who signed the agreement

with his Russian counterpart in Tehran, said the 164-kilometre (102mile) railway in Iran's north would be completed within three years.

It is the only missing link in the International North-South Transport Corridor (INSTC) from northeast Russia via Azerbaijan to Iran's southern coastline and on to India by sea.

Russia and Iran are both under international sanctions that restrict trade.

The freight network of ship, rail Ru

and road routes, which covers some 7,200 kilometres, avoids the Suez Canal between the Mediterranean and the Red Sea which would otherwise transport some Russian seaborne cargo.

Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi, who attended the signing ceremony, and Russia's Vladimir Putin, who spoke there via videoconference, both hailed the economic opportunities the agreement presents.

The planned railroad would connect Rasht, a city in northern Iran, and the Astara crossing on the border with Azerbaijan. Bazrpash said the "process of construction" of the Rasht-Astara railway "has started and we will finalise it within the next three years".

Raisi said that, once completed, the INSTC will boost regional trade and noted the "great potential" in ties with Russia. SUDAN CONFLICT Aid needs surge as fighting rages on

The United Nations said yesterday more than half Sudan's population now needed aid and protection, as civilians sought shelter from air strikes and sporadic clashes between rival military factions in the Khartoum area.

Residents said power had been cut, food was in short supply, and drinking water scarce due to the violent power struggle, now in its second month despite international mediation efforts. In Geneva, the OCHA said 25 million people needed help - the highest number ever recorded in Sudan.

ADANI PROBE India's top court grants 3 months extension to SEBI

India's Supreme Court yesterday granted the country's market regulator additional time till August 14 to complete its investigation into possible violation of securities law and regulatory disclosures by the Adani group. The court directed the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) to complete its probe in three months and file a status report on its investigations against the group, whose shares plunged after being criticised by US-based short-seller Hindenburg Research in January. In a petition filed on April 29, SEBI had sought another six months to complete its probe, following a court order on March 2 which had asked the regulator to submit a report by May 2. Hindenburg Research had raised several governance concerns around Adani group, leading to a loss of more than \$100 billion in the market capitalisation of companies in the group founded by billionaire Gautam Adani. Following this, the SC asked SEBI to probe the allegations and submit a report to a court-appointed panel.

Harry, Meghan in 'near catastrophic' car chase

Prince Harry and wife Meghan Markle were involved in a "near catastrophic car chase" involving paparazzi in New York, a spokesperson for the couple said yesterday. The incident happened on Tuesday night after Harry, 38, and Meghan, 41, attended an awards ceremony in America's financial capital. Meghan's mother Doria Ragland was with them in the vehicle, the spokesperson said in a statement emailed to AFP. "Last night, The Duke and Duchess of Sussex and Ms. Ragland were involved in a near catastrophic car chase at the hands of a ring of highly aggressive paparazzi. "This relentless pursuit, lasting over two hours, resulted in multiple near collisions involving other drivers on the road, pedestrians and two NYPD officers," the spokesperson said. A source close to the couple said Meghan and Harry were pursued by half a dozen blacked out vehicles with "unidentified people driving recklessly and endangering the convoy and everyone around them.'

ACCESS TO CYCLONE-HIT STATE Aid groups seek green light from Myanmar junta

Relief organisations were awaiting clearance from Myanmar's military rulers yesterday to access areas of Rakhine State devastated by a deadly cyclone three days ago, and deliver food and medicine to communities in urgent need.

Hundreds of people are estimated to have been killed in the impoverished region after cyclone Mocha on Sunday tore down houses, communication towers and bridges with winds of up to 210 kph (130 mph) and triggered a storm surge that inundated the state capital Sittwe.

Residents contacted by Reuters said no help had arrived even days after the storm and volunteers were digging through debris to search for the missing.

One resident who declined to be identified for safety reasons said about 400 people had died and more were at risk of dying "for not having food, purified water and emergency treatment. There are no ... search and

rescue teams."

Rakhine State, with a population of more than three million, is particularly vulnerable, and is home to the persecuted Rohingya Muslims minority that successive governments in predominantly Buddhist Myanmar have refused to recognise.

Some 600,000 Rohingyas still live in the state, while more than a million live in sprawling camps in neighbouring Bangladesh, having fled military crackdowns in recent years. Some still embark on perilous boat journeys to Malaysia and Indonesia.

UN agencies said they were still awaiting a green light from authorities to assess and distribute supplies in affected areas, some of which were inaccessible due to extensive damage.

"We have established communications channels with all authorities in Myanmar. We have asked for unrestricted access to affected communities," said Pierre Peron, a spokesperson for the UN office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs.

Quad summit cancelled REUTERS, Sydney

Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said yesterday a Quad summit would not proceed in Sydney next week without US President Joe Biden, who postponed his trip because of debt ceiling negotiations in Washington.

Albanese said the leaders of Australia, the United States, India and Japan would instead meet at the G7 in Japan this weekend, after Biden cancelled a trip to Sydney on the second leg of his upcoming Asia trip, which was also to have included a visit to Papua New Guinea.

"The Quad leaders meeting will not be going ahead in Sydney next week. We, though will be having that discussion between Quad leaders in Japan," Albanese told a news conference.
