AL loses in its bastion

Zaida elected Gazipur city mayor, defeats Azmat by 16,197 votes in peaceful polls; voter turnout around 50pc

It all happened quietly.

There were hardly any polling agents for Zaida Khatun. Even her supporters could barely be seen in the largest city corporation of the country. Even during the campaign, her posters were rarely seen.

in Gazipur City But Corporation polls, Zaida has won defeating ruling Awami League mayor nominee Azmat Ullah Khan by 16,197 votes.

Unofficial results show that Zaida bagged 2,38,934 votes while her nearest contender supporters was overbearing at most of the polling centres.

The electronic voting machines (EVMs) slowed down polling as the devices took a long time to detect the voters' fingerprints at some centres.

The Daily Star correspondents visited at least 50 polling centres and found a thin presence of voters when polling started at 8:00am, but as the day progressed, people started pouring in.

After casting their ballots, Azmat and Zaida both expressed satisfaction over the voting atmosphere and said they were confident of victory. At different polling centres in Gazipur, Azmat's supporters wearing badges of boat, the AL electoral symbol, were seen outside the polling stations in violation of the electoral code of conduct.

US VISA CURBS Who said what

The US Secretary of State Antony Blinken on Wednesday announced that the US would impose visa restrictions on individuals and their immediate family members "if they are responsible for, or complicit in, undermining the democratic election process in Bangladesh". The new visa policy for Bangladesh has triggered reactions from the government, political parties and others.

Bangladesh won't let polls be compromised: foreign ministry

Taking note of the new US visa policy, the foreign ministry yesterday said Bangladesh appreciates that the international community, including the US, firmly stands by the prime minister's commitment to ensure free and fair elections

The ministry said the government would like to view the announcement in the broader context of the US government's unequivocal commitment to free and fair elections at all levels.

The government apparatus would take necessary measures to prevent and address any unlawful practice or interference by any individual, group or entity, which can compromise elections, the ministry said in a statement.

The electoral process will remain under strict vigilance and international observers would be there too, said the statement.

The government expects that the local undemocratic forces that resort to violence, arson, and destruction would remain cautious and refrain from their misguided efforts to jeopardise the electoral process, it said.

Says Momen; Haas termed it 'show of support' for those seeking fair polls

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen hoped that the new US visa policy will help Bangladesh hold free and fair elections.

"We hope it will help us conduct free and fair elections, especially violence will not be there. Those who resort to violence will refrain from it," he told reporters after a meeting with US Ambassador Peter Haas at the foreign ministry yesterday afternoon.

"But it was not less than 50 percent." About slow casting of votes at some polling centres, the election commissioner said, "Some voters might have faced difficulties understanding how to cast votes using EVMs. This might be a reason for the slow voting.

'We're very satisfied' **Says Election** Commissioner **Md Alamgir**

Election Commissioner Md Alamgir yesterday said they were satisfied with the Gazipur city polls.

"We are very satisfied Voters and candidates are also satisfied," he said while briefing reporters at the Election Commission office

Azmat got 2,22,737, said Returning Officer Faridul Islam.

The voter turnout was 48.75 percent.

Zaida will be the country's second woman mayor of a city after Salina Hayat Ivy of Narayanganj.

Zaida is the mother of suspended Gazipur mayor Zahangir Alam. After the ruling Awami League nominated Azmat to run for mayor, a disgruntled Zahangir attempted to run as an independent.

He collected nomination papers for himself and his mother. After the Election Commission scrapped his nomination, he started campaigning for his mother.

After Zaida was unofficially elected early today, Zahangir said he would help his mother run the city corporation.

About the presence of AL supporters inside the polling centre at Rising Sun Academy, presiding officer Delowar Hossain said, "This was not supposed to happen. We will definitely look into it."

At 22 polling centres in Tongi, the correspondents of this newspaper could not find any agent for Zaida.

A correspondent of this newspaper who visited 15 polling centres, found an agent for Zaida only at Sharifpur Government Primary School.

Abdul Kader, presiding officer at Shaheed Britti School and College told The Daily Star that only Azmat's supporters contacted him about being polling agents.

POLLING CENTRES Admin, police to be engaged in selection

EC brings changes to guideline; number of centres may come down

MOHIUDDIN ALAMGIR

The Election Commission has made major changes to the guidelines for selecting polling centres for the national elections, including a provision for involving the local administration and the police in the selection process.

The polling centres in the last several national polls were selected by the commission officials.

The guideline, passed by the election commissioners at a meeting yesterday, dropped a provision that allowed polling centres to be kept for use unless they were destroyed.

"We repealed the provision for retaining previous polling centres as many of them are old, some are dilapidated, and some had gone into the river or were destroyed," Election Commissioner Md Alamgir told The Daily Star.

He said new polling centres would have to be set up ahead of the next general election. "The number of centres might decrease."

In the last general election, there were 40,051 polling centres.

The next national election is likely to be held in late December this year or early January next year.


DEATH THREAT TO PM Rajshahi BNP leader arrested, remanded

BNP's Rajshahi district unit Convener Abu Sayeed Chand, arrested for issuing a "death threat" to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, was placed on a five-day remand

The police produced him before the court at 3:30pm and submitted a 10-day remand appeal, he added.

Earlier in the day, a special team of police apprehended him at a checkpost in the Bheripara area around 11:15am, said Rajshahi Metropolitan Police (RMP) Commissioner Anisur Rahman.

The police commissioner briefed journalists detailing the arrest at a press conference held at the RMP headquarters in the afternoon.

PAKISTAN CRISIS Imran moves SC against 'undeclared martial law'

Pakistan's former prime minister Imran Khan yesterday filed a petition with Supreme the



Court against the government invoking Article 245 in several provinces, terming it

"undeclared martial law". Under Article 245 of Pakistan's Constitution, the army can be called in to aid the civil administration to defend the country.

Imran, through his lawyer Hamid Khan, has requested the apex court to probe into the government's decision to call "in the aid of the armed forces in the Federal Capital Territory, Punjab, Balochistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (K-P) in the purported exercise of powers under Article 245 of the Constitution".

In his petition, the PTI chief said the arrests, investigations and trial of citizens under the Army Act 1952 were "unconstitutional and void and of no legal effect and amounts to negation of the Constitution, rule of law and independence of the judiciary."

He also pointed out that the "dismantling of PTI through forcible quitting of party membership and office are unconstitutional and void being against Article 17 of the Constitution".

The ex-PM also urged the top court to order the formation of a judicial commission to probe the events of May 9 and 10.

The plea named Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, PML-N Supremo Nawaz Sharif and his daughter Nawaz, ex-president Marvam Asif Ali Zardari, Foreign Minister Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari, JUI-F chief Maulana Fazlur Rehman and other as respondents.



JCD leader shot dead in Narsingdi clash

A leader of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal was shot dead during a clash between two groups of the pro-BNP student body in Narsingdi town yesterday afternoon.

Deceased Sadekur Rahman, 32, was a former senior joint convener of District Chhatra Dal's convening committee.

Sadekur was declared dead at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital around 7:30pm after he was taken there with bullet injuries, inspector Bachchu Mia, in-charge of the DMCH police camp, told The Daily Star.

JCD leader Ashraful Islam, 20, who was also shot during the clash, is under treatment at the same hospital, the inspector added.

Local JCD leaders said on January 26, the central JCD formed a five-member convening committee for the district.

Since then, JCD leaders and activists, who were did not get posts in the committee, have been demanding cancellation of the committee. They were protesting near the district BNP office in Chinishpur yesterday afternoon, said the district's former senior BNP vice-president Mainuddin Bhuiyan, adding that the leaders and activists of the other group then attacked the protesters.

2 students die on road

Two motorcyclists were killed in a head-on collision between their motorbike and a bus near Paikpara Mirzapur village in Kushtia's Khoksa upazila yesterday.

The deceased were identified as Abu Musa, 18, and Parvez Hossain, 18. Both of them were firstyear students of Abu Taleb Degree College in Shomspur.

Sub-Inspector Mozammel Haque of Khoksa Police Station, who was present on the spot, said the highway police will prepare a report and decide on whether a case should be filed or not.

According to witnesses, the Kushtia-bound motorcycle collided with the bus coming from the opposite direction, leaving them dead on Kushtia-Rajbari road around 1:30pm.

The bus driver and other staff fled the spot following the accident.

Man held for killing wife

He said they want the new policy to contribute to the dialogue in Bangladesh and efforts by everyone the government, opposition, civil society -- to create the environment for a free and fair election.

But that's not the only reason."

Enquired about the absence of polling agents of independent mayor candidate Zaida Khatun, he said they didn't have any such reports.

Speaking to reporters in the morning, Alamgir said several EVMs were no working at the beginning of the voting, but the problem was fixed immediately and the voters were able to cast their votes.

He said that there were some problems with 10-12 CCTV cameras at some polling centres due to internet issues, but footage was still being recorded at those centres.

Voting ended at all 480 polling centres without any report of violence.

Rohingyas have to go through verification

Talking to The Daily Star, multiple Rohingyas said the delegation assured them of providing education, medical and other facilities.

"We requested them to prioritise our prime demand of Myanmar citizenship. Besides, we also sought for security after our return," said Bazlul Islam, an inhabitant of camp-26.

Mainul Kabir, head of the Rohingya wing in Bangladesh's foreign ministry, said that repatriation was "the only way to solve the Rohingya issue", reports AFP.

He said the Myanmar delegation "assured that the confusions that are being created will be resolved gradually", AFP added.

The first Myanmar delegation arrived in Bangladesh on March 15 on a five-day visit to scrutinise the list of Rohingyas sent by Bangladesh to their country for repatriation.

Then a 20-member delegation of Rohingyas and seven Bangladeshi officials visited Rakhine state on May 5 to see the arrangements made two repatriation attempts have failed by the Myanmar authorities for a so far.

This is the second delegation of Myanmar visiting Cox's Bazar to accelerate the Rohingya repatriation.

Around 1.2 million Rohingyas have been living in Bangladesh. Most of them fled a violent military crackdown in their homeland in 2017 and joined others who had fled to Bangladesh since the 1980s.

Since the biggest influx in 2017, Bangladesh and Myanmar signed a bilateral deal for repatriation. But

DEATH OF PASSENGER ON FLIGHT What action taken against Biman captain?

Aviation ministry asks CAAB

Fariduzzaman, a flight operation inspector of Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (CAAB), had violated the rules and sat in the captain's seat on flight BG 336 of Biman that departed from Jeddah for Dhaka on January 15.

At that time, the pilot in command Captain Dildar Ahmed Tufail was resting in the bunk, leaving the cockpit of a Boeing 777-300ER technically unmanned. He had Irfan Ul Haq beside him who was under training and not qualified to fly the aircraft. It was Irfan's test flight.

Meanwhile, a passenger had a heart attack

No medical emergency was declared and the plane landed in Dhaka four hours after the incident. The passenger, Kabir Ahmed, a migrant from Noakhali, was pronounced dead on arrival. Kabir's death certificate, issued by Kuwait Bangladesh Friendship Government Hospital, shows that he was brought in dead.

CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES Inclusive education, still a far cry

Speakers discuss opportunities, challenges at roundtable

The government should implement a flexible education curriculum, infrastructure develop and create more job opportunities to implement inclusive education for children with disabilities, speakers said during a roundtable.

While presenting the keynote, CDD Thematic Expert Jahangir Alam said more than half of children with disabilities are not enrolled in any formal education. "Among the persons with disabilities aged 5-24 years, 40.90 percent have no formal education, which increases further with the increase in age," he said, quoting National Survey on Persons with Disabilities 2021. Tahmina Khan Mojlish, project manager of Save the Children International, said, "The curriculum for disabled children is still going through experiments. Their assessment process is also the same as other children, which is not helpful at all." Besides, there is no proper infrastructure for children with disabilities. Teachers also need more training to teach children with disabilities," she added. Alodia Santos, development adviser at Liliane Foundation, said, "We see different efforts of the government. But their efforts will

The OHCHR proposed amendment of sections 8, 25, 27, 29, 31, 32, 43 and -53

The OHCHR is concerned about the blocking and removal power, given to the authorities under section 8, of any data-information published or propagated in digital media that threaten digital security, hampers the solidarity, financial activities, security, defence, religious values or public discipline in the country or information that incites racial hostility and hatred.

The power is extremely broad and given to the executive body BTRC. And take-down orders do not require the content to be unlawful or criminal, thus it unduly restricts freedom of expression and access to information, it said.

Sections 29 criminalises "defamatory information", and section 25, criminalises "offensive, false threatening data or

it said, adding that the DSA also has provision for harsher punishment in comparison to the Penal Code.

The OHCHR said defamation should be decriminalised as it discourages the media from publishing critical information.

It said that section 27 (d) criminalises a broad range of acts of accessing or interfering with

computers and computer networks data-information without and establishing any clear link to the elements commonly understood to define "terrorism".

The section carries the potential for arbitrary application and misuse of the term "terrorism". It is recommended that in defining terrorism, the definition directed by the Special Rapporteur of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms is used.

Moreover, the possibility of data-information to be used against friendly relations does not constitute a sufficient basis for the criminalisation of accessing such information, it said.

Section 31 relates to an offence of "deteriorating law and order, etc" for the publication of material that "creates enmity, hatred or hostility among different classes communities of the society, or destroys communal harmony, or creates unrest or disorder, or deteriorates or advances to deteriorate the law and order situation."

The OHCHR notes the vague and broad nature of the language and the harsh nature of the sentence.

Section 32 refers to "breaching secrecy of the government" for the commission or assisting the commission of an offence under the Official Secrets Act.

The OHCHR is concerned that the broad scope of this section, coupled with the harsh penalty of a maximum jail term of 14 years and/or a fine, could have a negative impact on investigative journalism.

Its note said section 43 allows warrantless searches, seizures and arrests by police officers and they are afforded "unfettered discretion".

Section 53 refers to offences that are cognisable and nonbailable.

"This means that the default approach is to keep the accused

in Bangladesh are in pre-trial detention," the OHCHR said.

Under international human rights law, pre-trial detention shall be the exception rather than the rule.

On the amendment request for the eight sections, Anisul said the government is reviewing those. He, however, did not say when the reviewing will end.

University Professor Dhaka Emeritus Serajul Islam Choudhury said the DSA is curbing the freedom of the media and it should be scrapped immediately. "This law is being misused and journalists are being arrested."

Supreme Court lawyer Jyotirmoy Barua said, "... We are not calling for an amendment. Rather, our demand is repealing the law. Because the DSA is contrary to the constitution and fundamental rights."

LATEST CEASEFIRE BREACH Sudan's warring parties trade blame

AFP, Khartoum

Sudan's warring sides yesterday accused each other of being behind breaches of the latest ceasefire that was negotiated by the US and Saudi Arabia, now in its third day.

The one-week truce was violated only minutes after it came into effect on Monday night, with residents of the capital Khartoum reporting air strikes and artillery fire shaking the city.

Breaches have since persisted of the ceasefire agreement, which is meant to allow for much-needed humanitarian aid to reach war-ravaged parts of the northeast African country

It is the latest of a series of truces that have all been systematically violated.

Since April 15, Sudan's capital and other parts of the country have been gripped by brutal urban warfare between the regular army, the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF), and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF).

But though the current ceasefire has been violated, it has allowed for a lull in fighting that has seen frightened residents cautiously venture out of their homes, some for the first time in weeks.

Many have gone out for supplies of food and water or to seek much-needed medical attention after nearly six weeks of war that have sharply depleted vital supplies and

pushed the healthcare system to the brink of collapse.

In a statement issued late Wednesday, the RSF, which is led by Mohammed Hamdan Daglo, sought to place the blame for ceasefire breaches on the army led by Sudan's de facto leader Abdel Fattah al-Burhan.

The army "launched a series of unwarranted attacks today", the RSF said, adding that "our forces decisively repelled these assaults".

"Our forces successfully shot down a SAF MiG jet fighter," it said, reiterating however that it remained "committed to the humanitarian truce" and called on the aggressors to respect the ceasefire".

The army responded yesterday morning, saying it had "countered an attack on armoured vehicles by the militias of the Rapid Support Forces in a clear violation of the truce".

The United States and Saudi Arabia, which brokered the ceasefire, on Wednesday pointed to reports "indicating that both sides violated the agreement" but said "fighting in Khartoum appeared to be less intense". But desperately needed aid has yet to reach the capital despite the brief lull.

The conflict has so far killed over 1,800 people, according to the latest figures from the Armed Conflict Location and Event Data Project.

Net migration to UK hits 'record' 606,000 PM Sunak vows to cut immigration

Net migration in the UK hit a record 606,000 in 2022, official figures showed yesterday, heaping pressure on the government, which has pledged to cut dependency on foreign labour.

Responding to the figures, Prime Minister Rishi Sunak described legal immigration levels as "too high". "It's as simple as that and I want to bring them down," he told ITV in an interview.

Measures announced earlier this week to tighten the number of international students allowed to bring their families with them would have a significant impact, he added.

Immigration has long been a key political issue in the UK and was one of the main battlegrounds of the Brexit referendum in 2016, which saw the country leave the European Union. In 2021, net migration -- the difference between the number of people leaving the UK and those arriving was 488,000. Jay Lindop, director of the centre for international migration at the Office for National Statistics (ONS), said world events such as the end of the Covid-19 pandemic and Russia's invasion of Ukraine played a part in the increase.

Chinese hackers spying on US critical infrastructure Say Western intel agencies, Microsoft; Beijing rejects claim

A state-sponsored Chinese hacking group has been spying on a wide range of US critical infrastructure organizations, from telecommunications to transportation hubs, Western intelligence agencies and Microsoft MSFT.O said on Wednesday.

The espionage has also targeted the US island territory of Guam, home to strategically important American military bases, Microsoft said in a report, adding that "mitigating this attack could be challenging.'

While China and the United States routinely spy on each other, analysts say this is one of the largest known Chinese cyber-espionage campaigns against American critical infrastructure.

Chinese foreign ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said yesterday the hacking allegations were a "collective disinformation campaign" from the Five Eyes countries, a reference to the intelligence sharing grouping of countries made up of the United States, Canada, New Zealand, Australia and the UK. Mao said the campaign was launched by the US for geopolitical reasons and that the report from Microsoft analysts showed that the US government was expanding its channels of disinformation beyond government agencies. "But no matter what varied methods are used, none of this can change the fact that the United States is the empire of hacking," she told a regular press briefing in Beijing. It was not immediately clear how many organizations were affected, but the US National Security Agency (NSA) said it was working with partners including Canada, New Zealand, Australia, and the UK, as well as the US Federal Bureau of Investigation to identify breaches. Canada, UK, Australia and New Zealand warned they could be targeted by the hackers too.

Cambodia's main opposition party yesterday lost a bid to overturn its ban from the upcoming elections, paving the way for long-serving leader Hun Sen to run a one-horse race. Last week, the National Election Committee (NEC) refused to register the Candlelight Party -- the chief challenger to Hun Sen -- for the July polls after it failed to submit certain documents. The Constitutional Council said in a statement it had rejected the appeal against NEC's ruling. "We are so regretful... Our party was rejected (from the polls), we are so disappointed," Candlelight Party (CP) spokesman Kimsour Phirith told AFP. He said CP had hoped to take part in the elections "to restore the base of democracy in our country".


Bart Hoggeveen, a senior analyst at the Australian Strategic Policy Institute who specializes in state-sponsored cyber attacks in the region, said the submarine cables made Guam "a logical target for the Chinese government" to seek intelligence.

"There is high vulnerability when cables land on shore," he said. New Zealand said it would work towards identifying any such malicious cyber activity in its country.

"It's important for the national security of our country that we're transparent and upfront with Australians about the threats that we face," Australia's Minister for Home Affairs and Cyber Security Clare O'Neil said.

A woman and two male police officers were killed in a shooting and stabbing attack at a farm in central Japan yesterday, media reported. A suspect, believed to be a farmer in his 30s, was holed up inside a building after the incident, which also left a fourth person injured, the reports said. Residents were urged by authorities to stay indoors in the semi-rural area around the city of Nakano in Nagano region, where the attack took place. NHK and other major outlets said the woman was stabbed and the two police officers were shot in the attack. Police did not immediately confirm details when contacted by AFP. A witness told NHK he had been working at a farm nearby when "a woman came running from the road saying 'help me', and she fell down". "Behind her came a man wearing camouflage and carrying a large knife, who stabbed her in the back," the 72-year-old witness said.

Will there be relief from waterlogging?

City authorities must bolster efforts to prevent it this

monsoon

With the monsoon season approaching fast, there are growing concerns about waterlogging which seems certain to haunt residents and commuters in major cities, like in the past years. Already, intermittent rain has exposed cracks in the fragile defences put up by city corporations and other relevant authorities. On Wednesday, Chattogram, where waterlogging has long been a major issue, saw heavy rainfall causing waterlogging in various low-lying areas. People had trouble move freely as traffic was slow on many roads, because excess water could not be channelled away. Over the last week or so, we have had similar reports from Dhaka, Khulna, Sylhet, Cumilla and other cities on waterlogging thanks to clogged drains, blocked canals, and streets full of potholes.

The sufferings caused in the process are not unknown. First, there is the public health issue as stagnant water becomes a breeding ground for mosquitoes, leading to risks of diseases such as dengue, which last year saw the highest death toll on record. Moreover, waterlogged areas may cause accidents and hinder mobility, making it difficult for people to commute, access healthcare, etc. The question is, why does the problem persist to this day despite the many crores spent in upgrading infrastructure, clearing blockages in canals, and building drainage systems to dispose excess water?

In Dhaka, both city corporations have various projects in place, and the authorities are confident that streets will not be submerged after light rain. But in recent days, intermittent rain was invariably followed by waterlogging in many areas, suggesting that there will not be expected relief when the monsoon brings more frequent and heavy precipitation. At the DNCC, 103 places were apparently identified where sustained waterlogging is anticipated. At the DSCC, delayed dredging of four major canals, which remain clogged with garbage, is expected to exacerbate people's suffering come monsoon. In Chattogram, ward councillors at a city corporation meeting on Wednesday blasted the Chittagong Development Authority (CDA) and Wasa for lack of action and coordination on this issue


Clearly, the authorities have a lot to do to address the impending waterlogging menace but little time to do it. This is totally unacceptable. Already, dengue is threatening to come back with greater force than last year. We urge the government to take the situation seriously, and direct all departments and agencies to bolster their efforts to prevent waterlogging and associated problems.

A reckless exercise in harming nature

Jashore government employee must be held accountable for filling up a pond

At a time when the need for protecting our rivers, lakes and bonds has become very urgent, it is frustrating to see the lack of efforts to stop those grabbing or polluting them. The result is, one by one, these waterbodies are disappearing or being degraded, with nothing being done to punish those culpable. The latest example of this has been reported at the Manirampur upazila of Jashore, where, according to a Prothom Alo report, a government employee has been filling up a public pond situated next to his house. By doing so, he has committed at least two crimes. First, he disregarded the law prohibiting the fill-up of any such waterbody. Secondly, he extracted sand from a nearby river to fill it, which is also illegal. Reportedly, when the residents of the area brought this to the notice of the local Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO), the latter directed him to stop it and the work remained suspended for a few days. But it started again soon afterwards, with soil brought from another place. We wonder what emboldens a person to carry on with such illegal and environmentally destructive activities despite being duty-bound to uphold the law. It may be mentioned that section 4 of the Sand Quarry and Soil Management Act, 2010 strictly prohibits sand or soil extraction in such manner. The Environment Conservation Act 1995 (last updated in 2010) also prohibits it. Unfortunately, as various reports suggest, these legal provisions are often flagrantly disregarded by powerful land grabbers and encroachers with their political connections shielding them from any legal consequences. The involvement of government employees, or even institutions, in such activities is no surprise either. The truth is, unless we create an environment respectful of the law and our precious natural resources, such activities will continue to happen. We, therefore, urge the local administration of Jashore to save the pond from being destroyed and take action against the person responsible. With Bangladesh fast losing its natural resources, the government must take stern action against such grabbers and polluters.

Given our limited fiscal space, we cannot afford any wastage or inefficiency; therefore projects should be selected carefully, considering their implications on the development efforts of the country. In this connection, a regular (preferably quarterly) ministry-wise project-based micro-level monitoring and evaluation practice should be adopted and strictly followed.

Another crucial area that needs greater attention in budget allocation is the areas of social sectors, e.g. education and healthcare, along with social safety nets. An increased allocation that is consistent with the practice in other South and East Asian economies while focusing on better implementation is crucial in this context.

Given the challenges that our economy is going through, the government needs to prioritise its development targets. In this context, the

C5 SUMMIT Strong message from Beijing to Washington, Moscow

Was the timing of the recent China and the five Central Asian countries' summit (C5) a mere coincidence? It took place almost simultaneously with the G7 event in Hiroshima, making similar headlines all over. The venue, the historic city of Xi'an at the eastern end of the ancient Silk Route that connected China with Central Asia and many other cities all the way to the Middle East, was no less significant either, aptly symbolising the summit's theme of connectivity and shared future shaping up in extensive transport and energy networks.

In stark contrast, the G7 summit in Hiroshima was mainly on two not-toobenevolent agendas: strangle-holding Russia and containing China. But is the rest of the world with them?

Indian Foreign Minister S Jaishankar was blunt about how Europe (and the US) is trying to impose its problems on the rest of the world. Delhi, defying Western sanctions, is also leading the "Laundromat" countries (India, China, Turkey, UAE, and Singapore) that are increasingly buying Russian crude and selling refined products to Europe.

Brazil's President Lula de Silva squarely pointed out who should be responsible for the Ukraine war and suggested that Kyiv should come to a settlement with Moscow. South Africa's Foreign Minister Naledi Pandor made scathing remarks about selective applications of "international order," referring to the different ways it applies to Palestine and Ukraine. The oil producing group OPEC+, led by Saudi Arabia, angered the US by refusing to increase production, and maintained warm relations with both Russia and China. Turkey, a Nato member country, positioned itself as a neutral player in the Ukraine war. Most other countries are watching precariously, trying hard not to appear to be on either side.

Amid such strong voices of dissent, China is steadily rising on the world stage as it brokered the Iran-Saudi Arabia deal, challenging US monopoly. It has also become a major player in the global arms trade on the back of its economic growth coupled with sustained military modernisation campaigns. Then there is the increasing push for de-dollarisation in the BRICS

and other economies such as Saudi including Russia, India, and Pakistan, Arabia. All these are telltale signs that Washington's global grip is steadily loosening.

The C5 Summit was just one of many ways the world is changing. But will the US and other G7 members care to admit?

Now let's see how Moscow may perceive its smaller neighbours' cosying up with Beijing.

Russia and China have long been competing for influence in the huge landmass that lie between these two powerful nations. Neither wants an Afghanistan-like situation to spill over, and both want to reduce American influence in their neighbourhood. Despite such common interests, they remain competitors and vie for influence that has a long history since the 1600s. It continued after the Bolshevik revolution as the Kremlin followed a cold-blooded geopolitical strategy against Mao's Communist Party and supported Chiang Kai-shek. Later, as the Communist Party defeated the Nationalist regime, they became strategic allies, though occasional border clashes continued.

During the Soviet era, Central Asia was under Moscow's control. Even after its dissolution in 1991, it acted as the power broker and security provider. But that started to wane as China's economic and military might grew. It became more prominent as Beijing launched the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) in 2001, which has all countries in the region as members

with Iran and Afghanistan as observers. After many years of watching from the sidelines, China has now secured a strong foothold in Central Asia, almost replacing Russia. In 2022, President Xi Jinping travelled to the Central Asian countries in a whirlwind tour that nearly resembled a victory lap, and inked several wide-ranging deals. The C5 Summit is a culmination of the last few decades of carefully choreographed plans where Beijing has made it clear that Central Asian countries should better turn to it for trade, commerce and security, more so when Moscow is bogged down in Ukraine.

The Central Asian countries have their own security calculations too. Moscow's invasions in Georgia in 2008 and Crimea in 2014 made the former Soviet republics nervous about what may happen if they don't abide by Moscow's wishes. Now that the power balance has shifted significantly towards Beijing, especially after Russia's Ukraine quagmire, they feel more comfortable in freely choosing a trading and security partner, allowing China to increase its influence. The C5 Summit has made it abundantly clear, sending an unmissable message to Moscow

Potentially, that is also opening another front for China-US rivalry famously known as the Eurasian Heartland, a landmass of immense strategic importance that no superpower would like to let go of.

Heatwaves, global warming, and the ethics of our cities



Recent heatwaves in cities across the conversation has been singularly world have stirred a lot of thinking about what to do with the "heat island effect." In lavman's terms, a heat island is a localised thermal condition created by a city's built environment, in which we typically see a lot of concrete and asphalt surfaces, densely built houses, paved areas, absence of green spaces and waterbodies (relative to rural areas), carbon-emitting industrial activities and vehicles, and a lot of people and their daily work. A heat island reaches its peak during the night when the city's buildings and heat-absorbing surfaces emit heat they have accumulated during the day. The heat island's temperature is considerably higher than those of its surrounding areas.

An immediate environmental menace with long-term climatic implications lurks at the geographic centre of the country because of the uncontrolled urban growth of Dhaka and its deleterious effects on the fragile land-water ecosystem that has historically sustained the capital and its surrounding regions. Dhaka's frenzied growth in all directions – devouring rivers, water bodies, and agricultural lands - is as serious an environmental threat as the coastal dangers posed by the sea level rise.

Less private cars on the street means less emission, less carbon, less heat, and less noise. Champion bicycling and walking as carbon-free commuting options. This is how the rewilding of the city begins at a micro scale. Let's talk about the seemingly oxymoronic concept of "innovative regulation." Innovation implies free thinking, whereas regulation suggests control. So, how does innovative regulation work? In a free society, one can't control its disastrous effects on such low-lying how an architect designs a building. But let's pose this question: should an architect design a tall building with an all-glass west facade? Under a fierce tropical sun, a building with a glass west façade literally But a monolithic emphasis on the becomes an oven in the afternoon. One can, of course, use up a lot of energy to cool the building by deploying an expensive airconditioning system, which then becomes a key contributor to the heat island. This is a case of environmental injustice, one in which a selfish building releases a lot of heat to the city, disregarding the city's public health. How do we, then, create a regulatory framework that ethically encourages the architect to design a building with a lot of natural shading and ventilation so that it doesn't need to depend on the wasteful, energy-guzzling artificial climate control of the building? This is both a design question and a moral quandary. Both should be part of necessary policy debates on environmental sustainability and urban equity. Innovative regulation may strengthen the ethical foundation of and incentivise environment-friendly architecture and cities. To create a culture of innovative regulation in cities, the government may consider creating an autonomous executive agency to oversee environmental sustainability matters in Bangladesh. A good example could be the US government's Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), created in 1970 during the heyday of environmental movements in America. The US president appoints, and the Senate approves, the EPA administrator. In consultation with state, tribal, and local governments, the EPA sets national guidelines for the environmental well-being of the country. Empowered to create environmental regulations, such an autonomous executive agency can promote environmental research. education, awareness, and innovative regulation. If the mayor of the Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) applied to cut the trees on Satmasjid Road, an autonomous environmental protection agency would have denied him the permission. The world's liveable metropolises are reducing the road width to discourage automobile dependency and encourage both pedestrianism and greening. We are doing the opposite in Dhaka. When development takes precedence over nature's balance, when human activities radically alter a place's elemental geography, their environmental consequences are bound to be calamitous. Since Bangladesh's future is urban, the most effective place to ensure the country's

CONFRONTING RACISM IN LALIGA At what point is it enough?

LaLiga has problems. A lot of problems. But you can rest assured that racism is not this? As former footballer Ian Wright a problem – at least not to them, and that is where the problem lies.

Last Sunday, Vinicius Jr, commonly known as Vini, the talented young Brazilian winger of Real Madrid, received a red card for angrily reacting during the game against Valencia. Throughout the course of the game, he was subjected to racist chants from the home fans and tensions eventually reached a boiling point. Tempers flared and Vinicius Jr was shown the red card for shoving Valencia's Hugo Duro. Interestingly, it was Vinicius Jr who was held back by the neck just seconds before he reacted, but the referee seemed to only perceive wrongdoing in Vini's actions.

The conversations that have taken place among fans, pundits and his fellow players since then have raised the same question that has persisted for a decade: at what point is it enough?

During the height of the pandemic, George Floyd's story shed light on the deep-rooted racism that permeates our society. Football, which rightly sees itself as a catalyst for change, decided to showcase its support to eradicate racism from the sports. We took knees, wore armbands, donned T-shirts, and created advertisements proclaiming that there is no place for racism in football.

Yet, one of the biggest leagues in the world continues to find itself embroiled in allegations of racism, time and time again. The unfortunate target of discrimination this time: a young man of Real Madrid who happens to be one of the most talented players of this generation.

The manner in which Vini reacted was not surprising. There is only so much someone can endure, and that is precisely what happened on Sunday. In fact, Vini was perhaps much calmer than how most of us would have reacted had we been in his shoes, especially since he has been enduring this brazen prejudice season after season.

It is not just a current issue: it has always been a problem and will continue to be, unless LaLiga takes significant actions. By the looks of LaLiga President Javier Tehas' reaction on Twitter, it is evident that the league is far more concerned about its own image, rather than the welfare of the player. The league's response is muddled with deflecting responsibilities and somehow diverting it towards the player himself, suggesting that the reaction from fans is more a response to how he plays the game, rather than a racist attack. In whatever way you look at it, Tebas' stronger reaction to Vini's comments about Spain being a country of racists and racism being normalised there, rather than directing his anger or condemning the fans, reveals the deep-rooted problem of racism in Europe. Tebas' comment reflects that he, as a privileged white male, is completely unaware of the implications such vile discrimination may have - not just on the individual who is subjected to such harassment, but also on society in general. The cookie-cutter phrases of "Stop Racism" and "Say no to racism" are great campaigns, but unless stern actions are actually taken, all this will remain ineffective.

So, the question is, how do we eradicate mentioned in his podcast this week, the answer is, "Walk out." Yes, walk out.

victim is another lesser-known player, who does not have the same level of influence as Vini? We never even hear about it.

For now, LaLiga has fined Valencia 45,000 euros and ordered a partial closure of the Mestalla Stadium's south stand, which Vinicius had pointed to during the second half on Sunday as the originating points of racist taunts. Valencia has appealed this decision, but it is crucial to remember that unless a collective punishment is imposed on the entire club or the league, meaningful changes will not occur. It is vital to address the issue seriously enough to make a club take drastic measures to tackle racism. It is all too easy to sweep it under the rug when it does not directly affect you. As football fans, lovers, players or anyone remotely connected to the game, we must stop apologising or making excuses for the existence of racists within our society. We need to stop conflating racism with rivalry. They are not the same and they do not coexist. Racism is racism; there are no two ways about it. And if things do not improve, UEFA and FIFA will need to consider imposing sanctions on clubs embroiled in such incidents. They took action against English fans, the "Hooligans" in the 1980s, and significant progress has been made since then. So why are they hesitant to enforce anti-racism policies against clubs and leagues in 2023?

Dhaka's recorded highest temperature this year so far, according to the Bangladesh Meteorological Department, is 40.5 degrees Celsius. The Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) has recently appointed a chief heat officer (CHO), a local government position that emerged in many cities around the world in recent years. At a very basic level, the CHO develops strategies to alleviate the city's heat island effects.

The cumulative heat island effects of the world's cities have something to do with global warming and climate change. We often don't make this connection. It is important that we do, as there are robust policy implications. The world's aggregate urban areas cover only three percent of the planet's surface, but they produce 80 percent of the world's GDP. Those who occupy this meagre three percent area consume 80 percent of world's energy. Because of their high carbon footprint and heat-producing activities, cities are responsible for most of the global warming and climate change-related vulnerabilities. Thus, paradoxically, if cities are the root cause of global warming, they are also an opportunity for its mitigation.

That means urban planners, architects, local government officials, policymakers, and regulatory bodies must see the cities' heat island problem through the broader lens of global warming, because both are the result of the same phenomenon at two different scales. That also means we must rethink how cities are planned, designed, and administered to combat the adverse effects of both the heat island problem and climate change.

This is counterintuitive because when we think of the effects of climate change. we usually conjure up haunting images of coastal areas, melting icebergs, deserts littered with animal carcasses, and drought-hit territories with burnt trees. We seldom think of the city as the cause of climate change. We rarely examine how the processes of urbanisation and climate-related vulnerabilities are deeply interconnected. Mitigating climate change problems, thus, requires a sustained and ethical engagement with the ways cities are developed.

Bangladesh has missed this policy focus so far. Here, the climate change

The capital's frenzied urban growth along with its skyrocketing energy consumption – should alarm us about the urgent need to view cities as the frontier of climate change. Time has come to realise that with smart energy consumption, environment-friendly, and people-centric urban design, cities present the most potent weapon to combat climate-related environmental problems.


This brings us back to the basic question. How do we lower the city's temperature as a solution to the problems of both the heat island and global warming? The easy answer is, regulate and reduce the city's heat-generating surfaces and activities without sacrificing its economic opportunities. There should be two sides to this task: a) design and planning resilience; and b) innovative regulation.

Let's talk about design and planning resilience first. We should consider the city's green as a soft and low-investmenthigh-yield public health infrastructure. Just as we need vaccines to protect ourselves against the pandemic, we need green to survive well and remain healthy. Thus, rewild the city. Strengthen the city's green lungs. Expand green spaces. Cover heat-producing pavements and building roofs with green canopies. Most authoritative research confirms that green helps mitigate air pollution, heat and noise, and enhance public health and mental well-being.

Planning resilience today must include environment-friendly mobility options in the city. Thus, create and promote an affordable mass transit network that serves most areas of the city, both creating a transit-oriented compact urban DNA and reducing the city's need to expand ecological well-being is its cities.

We must formulate sophisticated legal regime and encourage innovations in FDIs

Rumana Islam is a Professor of Law at University of Dhaka currently on deputation. She joined Banaladesh Securities and Exchange Commission (BSEC) in May 2022 as the first female Commissioner of the BSEC for a term of four years. She was nominated as a Panel Arbitrator designated by the Government of Bangladesh to the World Bank's International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes (ICSID) in April 2021 for a term of six years. She completed her LLB (Hons) and LLM from the University of Dhaka with first class in both. She earned another LLM (specialisation in commercial law) from the University of Cambridge, UK with a Cambridge Commonwealth Trust Scholarship in 2006 and obtained her doctoral degree from the University of Warwick in 2015 with Commonwealth Scholarship. During her PhD she also obtained Charles Wallace Bangladesh Trust Doctoral Bursary. Her seminal work has been published as a book titled as "Fair and Equitable Treatment International Investment Arbitration: Developing Countries in Context" (Springer, 2018). She is also an alumna of Scholars Workshop (2011) of Institute of Global Law and Policy (IGLP) at Harvard Law School. She has acted as the Assistant Director of Research (Law) (part-time) in Bangladesh Institute for Law and International Affairs (BILIA), from September 2015 to September 2019. She has served as a consultant in different research projects led by the Faculty of Law, University of Dhaka; University Grants Commission (UGC), Ministry of Law, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung (FES) and UNDP. She is an affiliated expert of Asia Pacific FDI network and a founding committee member of South Asian Economic Law Network (SAELN). Law Desk, The Daily Star speaks to her on some pertinent issues regarding the country's recent economic progress and the relevant legal concerns.

Law Desk (LD): How do you view the impact of the Russia-Ukraine war and the Covid-19 pandemic on foreign investments in Bangladesh? What are the proposed ways forward?

Rumana Islam (RI): The economic journey of Bangladesh over the last decade has been a remarkable one. The country once termed snappishly conducting roadshows in different as a "bottomless basket" has now become the hub-spot for FDIs with initiatives got seriously interrupted by



at the global scale. Therefore, it was foreseeable that Bangladesh would face a drastic decline of FDI inflow as a consequence of the predictable economic crisis due to the pandemic. To worsen matters for the struggling global economy, came the Russia-Ukraine war without giving the time and space for many countries to recover from the economic devastation from the pandemic. Bangladesh is no exception to that. The country's economy has rebounded quite well after the pandemic through efforts to increase the inflow of FDI through bilateral initiatives with different governments and multinational corporations and destinations. Nevertheless, the

that FDI flow will go down by 40% war and the sanction on purchasing Russian fuel has sent energy prices soaring, pushing up the cost for consumer and companies. This has increased the cost of doing business across borders for foreign investors. As a consequence, the foreign investors have reduced their share of earning in cross border reinvestment and are reluctant to go for new investment or mergers and acquisitions.

In short, both the pandemic and the war have created short, medium and long-term negative effects on the foreign investment in Bangladesh. If we want to overcome these challenges, we need long-term planning from the policymakers as well as an increase in sustainable and diversified investments. I must emphasise that, for formulating such long-term policies in attracting phenomenal GDP growth. In 2018, the country had an increase of 67.94% the war. LD: How has Bangladesh performed upholding international in standards on human rights and environmental protection as far as it relates to the requirements of foreign investors? What improvements would you recommend to balance between human rights compliance and development goals?

Revising the Foreign Private Investment (Promotion and Protection) Act, 1980 is now long overdue. Some recent initiatives have significantly improved the overall environment for FDI. Data breach takes place when confidential or sensitive information is stolen, leaked or accessed by unauthorised individuals or entities. This can include personal information such as names, addresses, phone numbers, social security numbers and financial information such as credit card numbers, bank account details and more. Information theft refers to the act of stealing or taking someone's confidential data without their knowledge or consent.

Unfortunately, the threat of data breaches and information theft is a growing concern in Bangladesh and around the world. In Bangladesh, some of the most common forms of data breaches and information theft include phishing attacks, social engineering tactics, malware attacks and insider threats. To be protected from these threats, it is important to practice good cyber hygiene by using strong passwords, avoiding suspicious emails or messages, and implementing multi-factor authentication on all accounts. World number one Carlos Alcaraz faces a tough path to a maiden French Open title after being placed in the same half of the draw as 22-times Grand Slam champion Novak Djokovic on Thursday.

In the absence of 14-times winner and defending champion Rafael Nadal, who will miss the claycourt major through injury, all eyes are on Djokovic and Alcaraz.

The 20-year-old Alcaraz, who will play a qualifier in the opening round, could face some treacherous match-ups en route to a potential semi-final against world number three Djokovic with 2021 runner-up Stefanos Tsitsipas, Lorenzo Musetti and Felix Auger-Aliassime in the top quarter of the draw.

Djokovic, who starts against Aleksandar Kovacevic, has a seemingly smooth journey to the last four with Russian seventh seed Andrey Rublev his main threat.

World number two Daniil Medvedev,

who plays a qualifier in the first round, is in the lower part of the draw and could face either last year's runner-up Casper Ruud or Norway's Holger Rune.

Sixth seed Rune won the Munich title on clay this season and reached the final in Monte Carlo and Rome, losing to Medvedev in the Italian capital.

No French man has won the singles' title since 1983 and it would take a miracle to see one of them lift the Musketeers Cup on June 11.

In the women's draw, defending champion and world number one Iga Swiatek will start against Cristina Bucsa, the world number 67. She faces a potential quarter-final clash against Coco Gauff, the American

she beat in last year's final. French hopes will rest on the shoulders of fifth seed Caroline

Garcia, who is on a quarter-final collision course with second seed Aryna Sabalenka.

Rome champion Elena Rybakina of Kazakhstan is expected to have a smooth run to the last eight, where she could face Tunisian seventh seed Ons Jabeur.

Says refugee commissioner after Myanmar team visits camp

Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh will get Myanmar citizenship if they go through verification under the national verification card (NVC) scheme.

Mohammad Mizanur Rahman, refugee relief and repatriation commissioner (RRRC), yesterday made the comment after a Myanmar delegation visited refugee camps at Teknaf in Cox's Bazar.

The 14-member Myanmar delegation, led by Aung Myew, regional director of Myanmar's social affairs ministry, visited Bangladesh as part of the initiative that was launched to start Rohingyas' repatriation on a pilot basis.

The delegation talked to 280 Rohingyas. They mainly focused on creating awareness among the refugees about the repatriation process, said RRRC Mizanur.

During the talks, Rohingyas demanded Myanmar citizenships and told the delegation that they wanted to return to their homeland, said Mizanur.

"In response, members of the delegation said Rohingyas would have to apply for national verification card (NVC) to get citizenship," he said.

"Now we will work for the repatriation of Rohingyas who want to return to Myanmar voluntarily," Mizanur said. SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

DSA goes against int'l rights treaty

Says UN human rights office, asks govt to scrap 2 DSA sections, amend 8

The Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) recommended over 11 months ago that the government scraps two sections and amends eight others of the Digital Security Act but the government said it will not scrap them and is reviewing the sections.

Experts said the DSA has become the government's and ruling party activists' favourite tool to muzzle critics. Despite harsh criticism from the media, rights bodies, and experts, filing of cases under this law and arrests of journalists continue unabated.

The OHCHR made the call as the sections concerned failed to meet the standard for upholding article 19 (3) of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), which protects the right to freedom of opinion and freedom of expression. Handing control of Bakhmut to Moscow

Says head of Wagner mercenary group

The head of Russia's Wagner mercenary group yesterday said his troops had started transferring their positions in the flashpoint eastern Ukraine city of Bakhmut to the Russian military.

His announcement comes days after Moscow's military said it had deployed jets and artillery on Russian soil against a "sabotage" group that crossed from Ukraine.

The Kremlin said meanwhile that China's special envoy for Ukraine would be visiting Russia today as part of a tour of European capitals including Kyiv.

The battle for Bakhmut has raged for nearly one year, levelling the city and decimating waves of Wagner recruits who have led

More than 2,000 cases have been filed under the act, which came into force on October 1, 2018.

The abuse of the law came to the fore again on early March 29 when Samsuzzaman Shams, a journalist of Bangla daily Prothom Alo, was picked up from his home hours after a case was filed against him under the law. Bangladesh has been a party to the ICCPR since 2000 and thus has obligations to uphold article 19 of the treaty.

Another DSA case was filed that night against Prothom Alo Editor Matiur Rahman and Shams. Shams was sent to jail the next day. He got out on bail on April 3.

The High Court on April 2 granted a six-week anticipatory bail to Matiur.

UN Human Rights Chief Volker Türk on March 31 called upon the Bangladesh authorities to immediately suspend the application of the DSA.

"My office has already provided detailed technical comments to assist with such a revision," he said.

The OHCHR, in June last year, submitted its recommendations titled "OHCHR Technical Note to the Government of Bangladesh on Review of the Digital Security Act".

Bangladesh has been a party to the ICCPR since 2000 and thus has obligations to uphold article 19 of the treaty.

Article 19 (2) says: "Everyone shall have the right to freedom of expression; this right shall include freedom to seek, receive and impart information and ideas of all kinds, regardless of frontiers, either orally, in writing or in print, in the form of art, or through any other media of his choice."

Article 19 (3) says: "The exercise of the rights provided for in paragraph 2 [article 19 (2)] of this article carries with it special duties and responsibilities. It may therefore be subject to certain restrictions, but these shall only be such as are provided by law and are necessary: (a) For respect of the rights or reputations of others; (b) For the protection of national security or of public order, or of public health or morals." **REPEAL**

The OHCHR proposed repealing sections 21 and 28 of the DSA. Section 21 says that if any person by means of the digital medium, makes or instigates to make any propaganda or campaign against the Liberation War of Bangladesh, the spirit of the Liberation War, the father of the nation, the national anthem, or the national flag, then such an act of the person shall be an offence.

The OHCHR said that given the overly broad language, section 21 risks criminalising legitimate expression that cannot be limited under article 19 (3) of the ICCPR.

Moreover, its lack of precision renders it difficult for individuals to regulate their conduct to avoid prosecution. The harshness of the penalty, including life imprisonment for repeat offences, could serve as a deterrent to legitimate public discourse, it said.

between the two planets, according to scientists. Earth is a relatively small rocky world. Jupiter, whose namesake ancient Roman god flung lightning bolts, is a gas giant so immense that all the other planets in our solar system could neatly fit inside it - including more than 1,300 Earths.

Tapping into five years of high-resolution data acquired by Juno's radio receiver as the spacecraft orbits Jupiter, the researchers found that the planet's lightning initiation processes pulsate with a similar rhythm to that observed inside clouds on our planet. The pulses observed on Jupiter as flashes of lightning were initiated with time separations of about a millisecond, similar to thunderstorms on Earth.



A river jelly, or Acromitus flagellates, in the Bay of **Bengal at Saint Martin's** Island. Found mainly in brackish waters like mangroves, estuaries or coasts, these jellies aren't as harmful to humans as many others. The swarming of Acromitus flagellates occurs with the changes in the environment like habitat deterioration, overfishing, deep sea trawling, coastal pollution and climate change. So, swarms of jellyfish in a particular area isn't as a good a sign as you would think – it means we are destroying the environment there. Since they feed off zooplankton and ichtyoplankton, once they swarm, they can disturb the food web. However, according to research, their venom has shown anti-proliferative properties, confirming that it could be used for anticancer drug development in the future.
