3 Bangladeshi peacekeepers injured in IED blast in Mali

Three Bangladeshi peacekeepers were injured in an Improvised Explosive Device (IED) blast in Mali on Sunday

The blast took place at around 9:30am local time in Mali, when a motorcade of a patrol team under the Bangladesh Formed Police Unit (BANFPU-2) reached a remote desert road along the mountains Gundam-Tongka-Niaphungke Highway, some 15km off from the Gundam Super Camp in Mali's Timbuktu Region, according to a press release issued from Police headquarters here yesterday evening.

The Armoured Personnel Carrier (APC), which was carrying the policemen, was also damaged in the incident, the release added.

The Police headquarters did not disclose the identities of the three injured Bangladeshi police peacekeepers.

The patrol team was part of the United Nations Multidimensional Integrated Stabilization Mission in Mali (MINUSMA).

Russia hits military facility in Ukraine

5 aircraft damaged, Odesa port hit

Russia vesterday said its military had hit Ukrainian air bases in overnight strikes and Ukrainian forces had shelled industrial facilities inside Russia as both sides sought the upper hand ahead of what Kyiv hopes will be a decisive counter-offensive.

In a rare acknowledgement of damage to a military "target", Ukraine said that work was under way to restore a runway and that five aircraft were taken out of service in the western region of Khmelnitskiy, although it did not name the site or sites.

A large military airfield was located in the region before the war. "At the moment, work is continuing to contain fires in storage facilities for fuel and lubricants and munitions," the Khmelnitskiy region governor's office said.

Russian state-owned news agency RIA cited the defence ministry as saying more than one air base was hit, but there was no confirmation from Ukraine of damage to any other air bases.

Two industrial facilities were hit in the town of Shebekino and four employees were wounded, Vyacheslav Gladkov wrote on Telegram.

Russia said yesterday that the Black Sea grain deal would no longer be operational unless a UN agreement with Moscow to overcome obstacles to Russian grain and fertiliser exports was fulfilled.

UN says nearly 1.4m people displaced from their homes

Gunshots and artillery fire rocked the Sudan's capital yesterday, residents said, hours before the expiry of a shaky ceasefire deal that had brought some respite from a six-week-old conflict but little humanitarian access.

Fighting continued from Sunday into yesterday in the south and west of Omdurman, one of three adjoining cities that make up Sudan's greater capital. Across the River Nile in southern Khartoum residents also reported clashes late on Sunday.

Sudan's army and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) have been locked in a power struggle that erupted into conflict on April 15. Nearly 1.4 million people have now been displaced, the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) said in a new report.

Both sides have said they are considering extending a deal for a week-long ceasefire brokered by Saudi Arabia and the United 9:45 pm (19:45 GMT) local time yesterday.

Woman's body recovered from in-law's house **Husband detained**

Police last morning detained a man after recovering his wife's hanging body from her inlaw's house at West Charandwip village under Chattogram's Boalkhali upazila.

Nur Nahar, 19, was married to Kader for one and a half years and she was the mother of a fivemonth-old daughter, said Abdur Razzak, officerin-charge of Boalkhali Police Station.

According to the victim's family, Kader and his family members used to torture her over dowry soon after their marriage.

"They presumed that Nur Nahar was tortured to death and her body was later hanged to make it look like a suicide," said the OC.

Police recovered her body from her bedroom around 8:00am. The body was sent to Chattogram Medical College Hospital Morgue for autopsy, said the OC, adding that filing of a case in this regard is underway.

8 get death penalty for killing BCL leader

A Lakshmipur court yesterday sentenced eight people to death in a case filed over the killing of BCL leader Mehedi Hasan Jasim in 2013.

Seven of the convicts were present at the court and the other, Hizbur Rahman Swapan, remains a fugitive. The seven convicts are Ali Hossain Bachchu, 43, Mostafa, 43, Khokon, 48, Abul Hossain, 68, Mubarak Ulla, 61, Kabir Hossain Ripon, 26, Zafar Ahmad, 61.

Mehedi Hasan Jasim was the Literature Affairs Secretary of Chandraganj Kofil Uddin Degree College's BCL unit.

On February 10, Jasim went to his relative's house in Radhapur village and stayed there. On that night, the accused broke into the house and shot Jasim before fleeing the scene. On the following day, a murder case was filed with Sadar Police Station.

On March 27, 2014, police submitted a charge sheet against 12 accused in the case. Later four of the accused died.

Boy killed as rod

Medical College Hospital, where doctors declared him dead around 12:45pm, Inspector Bachchu Mia, incharge of the DMCH police outpost, told The Daily Star.

Matin Biswas, a sub-inspector of Banani Police Station, said they, after primary investigation and talking to witnesses, learnt that the rod fell about 60 feet to the ground below.

An employee of a shop nearby said, "This is sheer negligence. People walk there and trains run. Workers should have been on the ground to stop people and divert them."

During a spot visit, this correspondent saw workers working on the expressway even though people were walking beneath. The same was noticed at the Mohakhali level crossing where people walk, and vehicles and trains ply under the

An expressway worker, who was about 100 yards away from the incident, on condition of anonymity, told this newspaper, "No one was deployed beneath to prevent people's entry there."

"We only restrict people's movement during a major work like lifting girders or viaducts ... The authorities usually do not take adequate security measures during minor work on the viaducts," he said.

AHMS Kamal, project director of the Dhaka Elevated Expressway, could not be reached for comments despite multiple attempts.

This paper tried to talk to expressway officials at the site office in Banani, but they refused to

On August 15 last year, five people were killed after a segment of a box girder of the BRT project fell on a car at the Jasimuddin Road intersection on Dhaka-Mymensingh highway. The crane that was lifting the girder segments toppled.

The highway was neither closed nor was the traffic diverted for the work.

"We want a peaceful solution to any conflict," she said. "We don't want an arms race because women, children, and each family suffer the most for it. Therefore, our goal is to protect them from the sufferings."

Sheikh Hasina said ensuring peace in the world is now more difficult than in the past.

"We are ensuring the supply of clothing, other essential items, and modern military equipment compatible with the mission area's environment, weather, and terrain," she said.

In this connection, she mentioned that the government incorporated modern mine-resistant ambush-protected vehicles into the Bangladesh contingents and state-of-the-art technology peacekeeper communications. "Incorporating modern

technology and training are an ongoing process that we will continue in the future," she added. Foreign Minister AK Abdul

Momen, Chief of Army Staff General S M Shafiuddin Ahmed and the United Nations Resident Coordinator Gwyn Lewis also spoke at the programme.

significant progress, but observed that the progress remains fragile as those lifted out of poverty may become poor again anytime as they cannot withstand any shock

This is more so because of the climate change impacts as well as poor social protection systems mired with irregularities in a country where income and asset inequalities are quite high, he said.

Schutter said in 2000, 48.9 percent Bangladeshis were counted as poor, and the figure dropped to 18.7 percent in 2022. Extreme poverty fell from 34.3 percent to 5.6 percent during the same period. However, general indicators do not tell the whole story as income inequality is rising.

Measured in Gini coefficient, income inequality stood at 0.499 in 2022, up from 0.458 in 2010, he said.

The special rapporteur said a category of "new poor" is also emerging. The households, which are just above the poverty line, have little to no savings, and are highly vulnerable to becoming poor after a shock.

The Gini coefficient measures the extent to which the distribution of income within a country deviates from a perfectly equal distribution.

A 2022 survey conducted in Dhaka by the Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies found 51 percent of the people in poverty fell below the poverty line to become "new poor".

Finance ministry officials said bearing in mind the uncertainty in the global economy, the allocation for remittance and export incentives will be kept the same as the outgoing

fiscal year. The government kept aside Tk 9,025 crore as incentives for exports in the current fiscal year since there was a 34-percent growth in exports in the previous fiscal year.

But exports grew only 5.38 percent between last July and April this year. Not only that, in April, exports dropped by 16.52 percent year-onyear, according to Bangladesh Bank

A finance ministry official said more allocation can be made for export incentives in the revised budget for the next fiscal year if exports pick up.

Another official said incentives should be given to those who are exporting new and diversified products and exploring new markets. Allocation for incentives in
