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NEW US VISA POLICY PM strikes a defiant tone

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has said it doesn't matter if no one takes a 20-hour flight across the Atlantic to go to the US.

"There are many other oceans and continents in the world. We will make friends with those continents across the other oceans. Our economy will be stronger, more developed and vibrant," she said.

Bangladesh will stand on its feet and the government will build this country, she said while inaugurating a new office building for the Dhaka District Awami League in the capital's Tejgaon.

"We will not be dependent on others. There is no point in fretting over who will not give us visas or who will impose sanctions."

She then advised the USA to look at the party that "rigged votes" and "played with people's fate".

The PM mentioned that the Canadian High Court had declared the BNP "a terrorist party".

"The USA did not issue a visa to Tarique Zia over terrorism and corruption."

The Awami League knows what benefits the people of Bangladesh, she said. "We always keep that in our mind. The country will be a developed one by 2041. We have also formulated the Delta Plan 2100 for the future generations."

People know that their fate will change only if they vote for 'boat', the AL's electoral symbol.

About the criticisms of the proposed budget for 2023-24 fiscal, Hasina said the government was confident of implementing it.

"They [critics] are singing the same old songs again, which is something they usually do during the presentation of each budget."

The government has been able to achieve remarkable development in Bangladesh. "This happened as the people of the country voted Awami League to power through the elections in 2008, 2014 and 2018."

288 dead in India's worst train crash in decades

Two of 1,000 injured are Bangladeshis

As Indian rescuers wrapped up last night's race against time to retrieve survivors and bodies following the devastating train crash in Odisha state, preliminary investigations revealed that a signal failure was behind India's worst rail crash in over two decades.

At least 288 people have died and nearly 1,000 others were injured. There are fears that the death toll may further rise as rescuers struggled to lift a train coach buried by the impact of the crash.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi arrived at the scene, talked to rescue workers and inspected the wreckage. He also met the survivors at hospitals.

"(I) took stock of the situation at the site of the tragedy in Odisha. Words can't capture my deep sorrow. We stand committed to providing all possible assistance to those affected," Modi told Reuters.

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina also expressed deep shock and sorrow following the deadly crash.

So far, two Bangladeshi citizens have been reported injured in the accident.

However, it was a lucky escape for three Bangladeshis, including a couple, who came out unscathed from the deadly train accident.

The collision occurred at around 7:00pm (1330 GMT) on Friday when the Howrah Superfast Express collided with the Coromandel Express.

Over 18,000 non-govt primary schools close doors in 2 years

Officials say pandemic to blame

At least 18,465 non-government primary schools closed their doors for good in 2021 and 2022 due to what officials said were the impacts of Covid-19 pandemic.

Most of these schools were closed in 2021 because the owners could not bear the cost of running them.

The final draft of Annual Primary School Census (APSC) 2022 shows 4,352 private primary schools faced closure last year.

In 2022, the number of teachers in non-government primary schools was 6,26,042, which indicates that 1,14,429 had left the profession since 2020, shows data from the Department of Primary Education (DPE).

"We have been talking about the possibility of private primary schools closing down because of the lingering impact of Covid-19 pandemic. Now the government data has shown the reality," Rasheda

K Choudhury, executive director of Campaign for Popular Education, told The Daily Star.

The schools that faced closure used to cater to the needs of certain

Days after the first few cases of coronavirus were detected in Bangladesh, the government on March 17, 2020, ordered the schools to close their classrooms and impart
