The song is available on Swagata and Hasan’s official Facebook and YouTube channels.

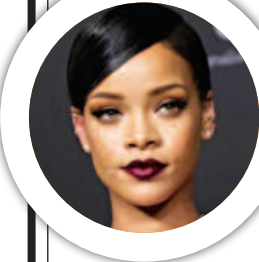
The artiste has been working as an actor on the television serial *Bou-Shashuri*, which has been airing on Boishakhi television for a long time now.

Cry for drinking water in remote Netrakona villages

Several thousand people from the indigenous community at different remotest villages in two upazilas of Netrakona have been suffering immensely for want of drinking water for years.

People, mostly belonging to the Hajong community, living at several villages in Kalmakanda and Durgapur upazila said the crisis becomes acute in dry season when most of the water sources dry up due to the scorching heat.

Although several thousand people have been living in the bordering Lengura, Rongchhati and Kharnoi unions under Kalmakanda upazila, and Kullagara and Durgapur unions under Durgapur upazila for some 400 years, they never had any modern facilities for drinking water, villagers alleged.

Drinking water is a far cry for the villagers as they do not have any easy source of getting drinking water, said Sajol Hajong, a former member of Lengura Union Parishad (UP).

Locals said the situation gets more worsen during this time of the year due to lack of water in the springs and decline in underground water level.

As a result, indigenous villagers, mostly women are compel to collect drinking water from different spots.

Nayem Hajong of Gopalbari Chengri village in

Kalmakanda said there are around 10 ring wells in his village, where over 70 families live.

But, villagers have been collecting drinking water in such a way for years, he said.

Farmer Rupkumar Hajong of the village said this problem can be minimised through proper planning, but unfortunately such a situation is continuing for decades.

Saidur Rahman, chairman of Lengura UP in Kalmakanda, said around 50 ring wells have been installed at different spots in his union in the last three years, but those too are insufficient.

Motilal Hajong, a retired schoolteacher, said nearly 20,000 indigenous people living in Gopalpur, Bijoypur, Kullagara, Arapara, Sangara, Gujikura, Bhawanipur and Guchhagram villages in Durgapur upazila have been collecting drinking water from insufficient natural sources for decades.

While talking, Nazrul Islam, engineer at Kalmakanda Department of Public Health, said they are planning to install submergible pumps on community basis to supply drinking water in the hilly areas from reserve tanks.

Netrakona Deputy Commissioner (DC) Anjana Khan Majlish said they have taken up a project to install 10 deep tube-wells in the hilly areas of Kalmakanda and Durgapur in order to mitigate the serious water crisis.

After the grisly murder in 2016, a bounty of Tk 5 lakh was declared by the CMP to catch Musa and Kalu alive.

The PBI last year pressed charges against Babul and six others, alleging that Babul was the mastermind of the murder.

On June 5, 2016, Mitu was stabbed and shot dead when she was walking her son to his school-bus stop at the port city’s GEC intersection. After the murder, Babul filed a case against three unidentified men with Panchlaish Police Station.

If the industries do not get enough electricity and fuel at fair price, their production will be hampered, which will affect the economy, said FBCCI President Jashim Uddin.

Apart from the energy sector, the government should give more focus on skills development, he said.

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There were a total of 1,14,539 government primary schools, kindergartens, NGO-run schools, ibtadai madrassas, and other private schools in the country last year.

The number was 1,33,002 in 2020 and 1,18,891 in 2021, shows the DPE data.

The number of NGO-run schools fell from 4,619 in 2020 to 3,753 in 2021 and 2,911 in 2022. The number of kindergartens fell from 29,897 in 2020 to 28,193 in 2021 and 26,478 in 2022.

The number of primary school-level students was 2,15,51,691 in 2020, and it fell to 2,00,90,057 in 2021, and slightly rose to 2,05,46,091 in 2022.

Farid Ahmed, secretary at the primary and mass education ministry, said many students quit schools during the pandemic and enrolled to Qawmi madrassas. This happened mainly because of the temporary suspension of a stipend programme for students.

Rasheda points out that the closure of so many schools means a greater number of educated people are unemployed.

Iqbal Bahar Chowdhury, chairman of Bangladesh Kindergarten School and College Oikya Parishad, says the chances that the closed schools would reopen are slim.

12 women return from KSA

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complained that he could not contact his wife since she reached Saudi Arabia.

The man alleged that his wife was abused both mentally and physically. He also complained about the recruiting agency and sought assistance from the AAPBn for bringing his wife home.

After receiving the complaints, the AAPBn intelligence team started working on the matter, said Ziaul.

He said that they contacted the recruiting agency and enquired its officials about the allegations. “We also wanted to know about the

whereabouts and the conditions the women were in.”

Soon after the interrogation, the recruiting agency shut its office and its employees went into hiding, the official added.

“The [recruiting] agency later started the process to bring the 12 women home hoping that they would be able to avoid legal complications.”

Ziaul further said that they were trying to convince the women to file a case against the recruiting agency.
