### **ELECTRICITY CRISIS** Situation to improve in 10-15 days: PM

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said more electricity will be added to the national grid within the next 10-15 days, ending the ongoing power crisis.

We have been compelled to go for load shedding .... I can realise the sufferings of the people. We've been trying our best. Around 500 megawatts electricity will be added to the national grid within the next one or two days. More power will be added within 10-15 days. Then there'll be no sufferings," she said.

The PM was addressing a discussion arranged by the Awami League at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre in the city, marking the historic Six-point Day.

Hasina said unfortunately, this time the people are enduring abnormally high temperature. "We can't think the temperature would go up to 41

She said the lack of rain aggravated the people's suffering. "We're meetings time and again to find the ways out and trying to ease this suffering."

## Turkish pro-opposition media hit with fines

Turkey's journalists' association yesterday criticised fines imposed by the country's media regulator on four pro-opposition television channels during the election campaign, saying they "penalise the public's right to information".

The Supreme Council of Radio and Television (RTUK) targeted Tele 1, Fox TV, Halk TV and Flash Haber for comments made by some of their guests ahead of the elections.

association journalists' president Nazmi Bilgin said it was an "unacceptable violation of the public's right to receive information and make electoral choices"

"(The) merciless punishment of the right to free expression" had "transformed the regulator into an instrument of the government to silence the opposition and those who criticise it", he said in a statement.

The level of the fines, which was not specified, will be determined by the channels' advertising revenues.

Onderoglu, Turkey representative for Reporters Without Borders (RSF), told AFP the outlets 'egularly receive fines that are disproportionate to their revenues".

# Military factions battle over fuel depots, weapons

Sudan's army has been battling to defend a military industrial complex believed to contain large stocks of weapons and ammunition in southern Khartoum, close to fuel and gas depots that are at risk of exploding, residents said yesterday.

The paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF), in the eighth week of a power struggle with the army, had attacked the area containing the Yarmouk complex late on Tuesday before retreating after heavy fighting, witnesses said. Clashes could still be heard yesterday morning.

The RSF quickly seized swathes of the capital after war erupted in Khartoum on April 15. Army air strikes and artillery fire have shown little sign of dislodging them, but as the fighting drags on the RSF may face a challenge restocking with ammunition and fuel.

Fighting across the three cities that Khartoum, Bahri and Omdurman has picked up since a 12-day ceasefire transition. formally expired on June 3 after repeated violations.

More than 1,428,000 people have been driven from their homes within Sudan and a further 476,800 have fled into neighbouring countries, most of which are already struggling with poverty and internal conflict, according to estimates published on Tuesday by the International Organization for Migration (IOM).

Sudan's health ministry has recorded at least 780 civilian deaths as a direct result of the fighting. Hundreds more have been killed in the city of El Geneina in West Darfur. Medical officials say many bodies capital, triggered new outbursts of deadly remain uncollected or unrecorded.

### Dialogue not on AL's mind at the moment Mayor Taposh

'In the column, the name of Dhaka South City Corporation was distorted to make Dhoka South Town Corporation ... the person who wrote this column distorted their own opinion and, in inverted commas, passed them off as comments of the honourable mayor."

Such comments are defamation under the existing law – the Penal Code, he said.

"After reading the report, the DSCC mayor has directed me to take legal steps and accordingly I sent a legal notice as a primary step. In the notice we have sought two things -- the report must be removed from online version in 24 hours, they [notice receivers] must apologise unconditionally in the print version and will have to pay Tk 100 crore as compensation," he added.

The lawyer said he will take the next course of action on the advice from the DSCC mayor after seeing what briefing yesterday. steps the notice receivers take.

Mejbahur Rahman sent the legal notice on behalf of Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh on June 5, asking Mahfuz Anam, the editor and publisher, Executive Editor Syed Haque, and the writer, Naziba Basher, to pay the money within seven days of the date of receipt of the legal notice served "for creating and publishing defamatory imputation in your national Daily, in online publication and on social media and network with criminal intention to insult, humiliate and persecute our client, thus intentionally harming hard earned reputation of my client, his family and his institution".

The notice said the article went against the principles of journalism as present in the existing laws.

Appropriate legal action would be taken against the notice receivers if required steps are not taken within the time, the lawyer said during the

In response to the legal notice and the subsequent briefing, we humbly reiterate that it was neither a "report" nor a "column," but a satirical piece, which is mostly presented in a parody format in mainstream iournalism. Satire relies heavily on irony and deadpan humour. Globally, such satirical articles are written on important and powerful persons and/or institutions. Political leaders, Nobel laureates, famous writers and prominent activists are subjects of satire and irony. It is the standard literary and journalistic practice.

We, however, are shocked to

find ourselves so fundamentally misunderstood. In no way was our we could come up with our response article meant to defame, humiliate or hurt anybody; it was simply a satire published in Satireday, our weekly page designated for satire. The topic was chosen only because it was one of the public interest issues and many reports, articles and editorials had already been written on it. It is a long-standing journalistic

practice, and it's known all over the world that important leaders and toplevel decision makers are subjects of satire. This piece was written to draw more attention to a matter of public concern and assist the authorities to reconsider and re-evaluate their decision, and not, we repeat, not to hurt anyone in any way. It was furthest from our intention. Still, we are sorry to know that our satire piece has ended up upsetting the notice giver.

As a gesture of goodwill, we have already unpublished the link upon knowledge of the unintended hurt as communicated in the legal notice.

its hand to repay the debt with... Here, the government is lagging. At 7.77 percent at the end of fiscal 2022-23, Bangladesh's tax-to-GDP ratio is the lowest amongst its peer countries, according to the finance division study.

"After a 23.8 growth in fiscal 2020-21, revenue grew at a modest rate of 1.8 percent last year. To meet the development goals set for 2031 and 2041, revenue collection needs to be increased significantly," the MTMPS savs.
