Here's how sunglasses can safeguard your vision in this scorching summer

With the heat wave in full swing, our throats are parched and our skin is left sunburned, sweaty not to mention sticky. While we are chugging litres of water and turning to summer-friendly habits, let's not forget to give our peepers a little break from the harsh rays of the sun. Much to our dissatisfaction, the pressures of work and other responsibilities often require us to venture out into the furnace. But according to studies, excessive heat can damage many of the tissues in your body and our eyes are no exception.

In 2022, a study found that heat and humidity trapped in a pair of goggles might damage your eyes over time. This can lead to eye issues such as fatigue, pain, soreness, and blurred vision. Moreover, summer months are known for causing eye dryness due to excessive spells of heat and wind. The weather, like we are currently experiencing, dries out the tear-inducing film that keeps our eyes lubricated and protected.

Our eyes have three layers of fluid inside them that keep them moist. An oily layer that forms the outside of the tear film, a watery layer that forms the middle of the tear film, and a mucus layer on the innermost part of the tear film. These layers combined help lubricate our eyes to help them stay moisturised whilst washing away debris. When they are dried out, symptoms like stinging or burning, eye redness, scratch sensation as if there's something floating inside or even sensitivity to light. But thanks to ophthalmologists and the fashion industry, sunglasses were made with the intention to cater to comfort and style statements to consumers. The following reasons will remind you to keep those shades on under the blazing sun

Protection from UV rays and airborne debris

Between 9 AM – 3 PM, the sunlight is at its harshest, especially during this heat wave.



If you are out for classes, running errands, working, or simply meeting people, it would be essential to carry your favourite sunnies. Wearing sunglasses protects your eyes from ultraviolet (UV) rays which can adversely affect eyelids, cornea, lens, and retina. A good pair of sunglasses block 100 per cent of the sun's harmful UV rays. Moreover, the glasses work as a shield to protect your eyes from the wind blowing dust, sand, and other airborne particles which could irritate your eyes and even scratch the cornea which could permanently damage them.

Navigate better through light-sensitivity
Too much of a good thing can sometimes
be a bad thing. The same goes for sunlight
— even though it's necessary for us to soak

up some Vitamin D, too much exposure to the sun can very well blind us. If you are having to squint or block the sun's rays with your hand, that's not exactly a pristine vision. Additionally, if this occurs whilst you are crossing a main road or driving, it can easily become a recipe for disaster. In order to prevent these situations, shades come in handy as they can help you navigate safely, especially if you have issues like light sensitivity; they can safeguard you and others from meeting with severe injuries or accidents.

Reducing future occurrences of eye diseases perpetuated by sunlight

There is substantial research that shows that exposure to the sun's harmful UV ravs on a daily basis can gradually increase the risk of developing cataracts, macular degeneration, and other eye conditions over the years. Cataracts are a yellowish clouding of the eye's natural lens that can cause light sensitivity and blurred vision. Macular degeneration is a deterioration of the macula—the central part of the retina responsible for your detailed, up-close vision, such as seeing people's faces, reading or watching tv. The sun's rays can also cause eye cancer and a condition called pterygium, a growth of excess tissue on the eyeball. Hence, it's advisable to keep wearing sunglasses to prevent such diseases from occurring in the future.

Improves outdoor vision

The best way to ward off the brightness and glare of the blazing sun is to invest

in polarised lenses to improve your vision. These can

immediately cut down the sun's glares that bounce off horizontal surfaces such as the sea, sidewalks, or glasses. Thus, adjusting your ability to see colour and contrasts.

Reduces headaches or migraines

If you are someone who frequently suffers from headaches or migraines, you would know better that sunlight can often trigger these pain flares. When buying sunnies, make sure you get dark lenses, preferably sold at outlets which specialise in medically approved optical wear, particularly those which fully block UVA and UVB rays. This way you can both enjoy the sunlight while safeguarding your vision.

WATERMELON LEMONADE

The combination of the lemon's tartness and the watermelon's subtle sweetness gives a well-balanced flavour to this summer drink. The drink typically has a smooth, creamy texture with a slight pulpy consistency.

Ingredients

4 cups of cubed, seedless watermelon ½ cup freshly squeezed lemon juice 1/4 cup honey

4 cups cold water Ice cubes

Mint leaves Method

In a blender, blend the watermelon until smooth. In a large pitcher, combine the watermelon puree, lemon juice, honey, and cold water. Stir well until the honey is dissolved. The mixture should be chilled for at least an hour in the refrigerator. Serve the watermelon lemonade over ice cubes and garnish with mint leaves if desired.

ICED HIBISCUS TEA

Some people describe the taste of hibiscus tea as slightly earthy or herbal. Overall, iced hibiscus tea offers a flavour that is both tart and sweet, making it a perfect summer

beverage.

Ingredients 4 hibiscus tea bags 4 cups boiling

1/4 cup honey

2 cups cold water

1 lemon, sliced

Ice cubes Method

Dip the hibiscus tea bags in boiling water for 5 minutes. To dissolve the honey, remove the tea bags and add it while stirring. Add cold water and stir. Refrigerate for an hour. Serve the iced hibiscus tea over ice cubes and garnish with lemon

PINEAPPLE MINT AGUA FRESCA

An energising and flavourful beverage that is popular in Mexican cuisine is pineapple mint agua fresca. Due to the pineapple pulp's smooth, slightly thick texture, and the addition of mint's herbal flavour, this drink is ideal for overcoming summer exhaustion.

Ingredients

4 cups chopped fresh pineapple ¼ cup freshly squeezed lime juice ¼ cup honey

4 cups cold water

Ice cubes Fresh mint leaves

Method

Blend the pineapple until smooth. In a large pitcher, combine the pineapple puree, lime juice, honey, and cold water. Stir well until the honey is dissolved. Chill in the fridge for an hour. Serve the pineapple mint agua fresca over ice cubes and garnish with fresh

mint leaves.

RASPBERRY PEACH SMOOTHIE

It is an excellent option for breakfast or as a snack on a hot day because of its texture and overall flavour.

Ingredients

1 cup frozen raspberries

1 cup frozen peach slices

1 cup unsweetened almond milk ½ cup vanilla Greek yoghurt

1 tbsp honey

Ice cubes

Method

Blend the raspberries, peach slices, almond milk, Greek yoghurt, and honey until smooth. Add ice cubes as needed to thicken the smoothie and blend again. Serve the raspberry peach smoothie chilled.

CUCUMBER LIME COOLER

This is a tasty beverage that combines the tartness of lime with the crisp, fresh flavour of cucumber.

Method

1 cucumber, peeled and chopped 1/4 cup freshly squeezed lime juice

2 tbsp honey 4 cups cold water

Ice cubes Fresh mint leaves

Method

In a blender, blend the cucumber until smooth. In a large pitcher, combine the cucumber puree, lime juice, honey, and cold water. Stir well until the honey is dissolved. Keep in a refrigerator for 60 minutes. Serve the cucumber lime cooler over ice cubes and garnish with fresh mint leaves, if desired.

ALHAMBRA Europe's love letter to Moorish culture

For centuries, the Muslims have ruled large swaths of an unconverted population in Spain, the Balkans, and India. Each of these countries has endured periodic cycles of religious violence and ethnic cleansing of the Muslims — Balkans in the 1990s and the bitter partition of India in 1947. There are still Muslims in the Balkans. And despite partition, which saw the creation of a predominantly Muslim Pakistan, there are still around 210 million Muslims in India.



What makes Spain unique is that here ethnic cleansing was fully realised. Yet, everywhere in the Andalusian part of Spain my wife and I went recently, we were surrounded by the remains of the Moors, who are Muslims from North Africa. This was particularly so in Granada, which is all about the Alhambra, "Europe's love letter to Moorish culture".

An exquisite ensemble of Islamic architecture and art, celebrated for centuries in poetry and songs, its image endlessly replicated on postcards, the Alhambra represents the essence of Andalusia. As the last and greatest Moorish palace and one of the world's finest architectural wonders of the Islamic Golden Age in Europe, it is a historic landmark encrusted with romantic associations.

The Alhambra — al-qal'a al-hamra in Arabic, meaning red fort or castle — is more than just a palace. Named for the reddish walls and towers that surround the citadel, it is a walled city within the city of Granada.

Perched on top of the Sabika Hill and set against the majestic mountain range of Sierra Nevada, the impressive palace was built between the 13th and 14th centuries by the Moorish monarch Ibn al-Ahmar and his successors of the Nasrid Dynasty, one of the longest-ruling Muslim dynasties in Spain.

After reigning for more than 250 years, Moorish rule was on the decline and eventually ended in 1492 with the Christian Reconquista of Granada. However, unlike the conquerors who ripped apart every semblance of other cultures elsewhere, Catholic Monarchs Queen Isabella of Castile and King Ferdinand of Aragon walked into Alhambra and probably thought, not this one

The palace is beautifully laid out in three sections: The Mexuar where matters concerning the administration of justice were dealt with, Palace of Ceremonial Rooms — a throne room where the rulers of Granada received foreign envoys, and the Palace of the Lions — the Sultan's private quarters.

We took a guided tour because it is impossible to go through the complex on one's own. Walking through the rooms of the palace was a progressive experience that became more and more marvellous.

Exotic Middle Eastern tiles, stucco decorations, and delicate carvings on the walls of the lavishly decorated rooms and serene courtyards speak loudly of the finest achievements of Moorish art and architecture in the world. While the rooms are empty, it takes a little bit of imagination to picture the ornate furnishings that filled the vast rooms when the Moors ruled Spain.

Carved wood, intricate plaster arches, decorative columns, and elegantly laid mosaics define the Alhambra. Islamic calligraphy, mostly poems, floral patterns and verses from the Quran etched on mosaic could be seen everywhere. The phrases "Allah hu Akbar" and "La Ilaha Illa Allah" are repeated thousands of times throughout the palace.

There is a hall with a dome displaying in great detail a dazzling honeycomb that appears to drip like icicles in a cave. It is called the "Hall of the Two Sisters"

because of the two large identical slabs of marble on the floor. The walls of the hall are covered with extremely fine plasterwork with different themes, among which is Kalima Tayyab: "There is no god but God but Allah, and Muhammad is His messenger."

An alluring structure in the Alhambra complex is the Courtyard of the Lions. It has a central alabaster fountain encircled by twelve white marble lions spewing jets of water. The courtyard was a private area for the king, his family, and mistresses. Encompassing the

courtyard is an ornately decorated gallery supported by white marble columns. There is a pavilion with filigree walls and a wooden domed ceiling, projecting into the courtyard at each extremity.

At the east end of the Courtyard of Lions is the Hall of Justice where 15th century ceiling paintings are wonderfully preserved its alcove-like recesses. Most noteworthy are three paintings on leather depicting scenes of court life with portraits of rulers and councillors, a hunting scene, and rescue of a maiden from the clutches of a wild man.

Another section of the palace that impressed us beyond measure is a spacious courtyard called Patio del Mexuar. It features graceful arcades and two fountains, feeding a pond. The green water of the pond contrasts brilliantly with the white marble patio and the parapet above the northern gallery that reflects in the pool on a clear day. It is also called the Courtyard of the Myrtles. The myrtle bushes that surround the central pond and their bright green colour pleasingly accentuate the whiteness of the surrounding stone.

We eventually emerged into an area of terraced gardens called Jardines de Partal. Here a reflecting pool stands in front of the Palacio del Partal, a small portico-style building with its own tower.

From the Partal gardens, we continued along a path to the Generalife, our last stop at Alhambra. Taking its name from the Arabic phrase jinan al-'arif, meaning "Garden of the overseer," Generalife is a terraced garden, situated on the slopes of Cerro del Sol, which is Spanish for Hill of the Sun. Pools, patios, trickling fountains, maze-like hedges along with exotic flowers, fragrant orange trees, cypresses, roses and a soothing ensemble of pathways combine to form an enchanting effect at Generalife. Simply stated, the garden is stunning, something that looks like out of a fairy tale.

In sum, the graceful, reticent decoration and inlay of the Alhambra give the eye a sense of lightness. In the words of a European visitor, Alhambra is "so magnificent, so exquisitely executed that even he who contemplates it can scarcely be sure that he is not in a paradise."


Disposable Shower Caps
