Hackers feast on govt sites

Troves of citizens' data out in the open

With the general election around the corner, data leaks and cyberattacks have intensified alarmingly, with the latest being a suspected leak of five crore citizens' data from the Office of the Registrar General, Birth & Death Registration (BDRIS)

The exposed data was first found out on June 27 by Viktor Markopoulos, a researcher from Bitcrack Cyber Security, a computer security solutions firm based in South África. While the government's Computer Incident Response

Team (BGD e-GOV CIRT) confirmed the data breach, it is currently verifying the extent of it. The data leaked from BDRIS includes birth dates and national identification numbers — two key information with which anybody can use publicly available online government tools to extract other personal details like

names, addresses and more. The authorities have not yet been able to identify the

This, however, is only the latest in the spate of such assaults in the past few months. Some of these are "Distributed Denial-of-Service (DDoS)" attacks -- a cybercrime in which the attacker floods a server with internet traffic to prevent users from accessing connected

online services and sites. Other attacks -- such as the BDRIS leak are more threatening, sensitive, private data and government information are being exposed to the public.

At the moment. Bangladesh Bank's server is under attack by a ransomware that has encrypted the core banking system. Mohammad Saiful

Alam Khan, project director of BGD e-GOV CIRT, said, "Our team visited the bank. We are assessing the damage and whether the data can be recovered."

Earlier in March, hackers demanded \$5 million in ransom from Biman Bangladesh while holding 100 gigabytes of data hostage. As government was unable to retrieve the data in time, a vast amount of financial.

human resource, training and satellite communications information was leaked.

Within secure messaging channels, a cyber war, fueled by nationalist and religious-extremist sentiments, has been active between hacking groups in India and

Bangladesh. This newspaper has observed that the major targets for both groups include law enforcement and government agencies along with security forces.

On March 15, a group called New World Hacktivists leaked 84 police login credentials, with 40 of them belonging to just officers-in-charge of different police stations across Dhaka.

Outsiders trying to impede the elections Says Momen

> Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen vesterday said he fears there are efforts on way to impede the election process and asked all to be

cautious about it. "Many are saying it aloud that they will not allow us to hold the election -- they should be questioned," he said at a DCAB Talk organised by the Diplomatic Correspondents Association Bangladesh at the Foreign Service Academy.

He, however, did not specify anyone.

Momen welcomes the high-profile foreign delegations' visits.

The long wait to end this September

Airport-Farmgate stretch of the country's first elevated expressway likely to ease commute for city dwellers

A major part of the Dhaka Elevated Expressway will finally open to traffic in September, more than a decade after the project was initiated to ease the capital's perennial traffic congestion.

Once the 11-kilometre section the Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport to Farmgate -- via Kuril, Banani, Mohakhali and Tejgaon -- opens to traffic, it

will serve as an alternative route to and from the airport road, one of the busiest in the city.

This section has 15 ramps for accessing and exiting the expressway that will help vehicles avoid traffic-choked crossings

Besides, the expressway will be off-limits to three-wheelers and motorcycles, allowing other vehicles to run at 80km per hour, according to sources.

The rest of the 19.73km Expressway and Dhaka-Ashulia to pay tolls to use the expressway, which is also the first project in the transport sector being implemented under the Public-Private Partnership model with foreign investment.

Commenting on the impact it will have on Dhaka's traffic, transport expert Prof Shamsul Hoque said, "The project may not bring about the expected result of easing traffic congestion due to the long delay in its implementation and changes in design in some areas."

DENGUE FEVER Record 820 hospitalised in a day

At least 820 people were hospitalised with dengue and two others died from the disease in the 24 hours preceding 8:00am yesterday, said the health directorate.

This is the highest number of hospitalisation from dengue in a day this year. The total number of hospitalised

patients was 2,502 yesterday, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

As of yesterday, at least 12,118 dengue patients got admitted to different hospitals this year, and of them, 67

During the same period (January 1-June 8) last year, only one patient died from the mosquito-borne disease and 1,376 were hospitalised.

In 2022, the number of deaths from dengue was 281
