# MOSQUITO CONTROL DEPARTMENT Of empty drums and abandoned building

in Old Dhaka's Nestled Dhakeshwari area, a two-storey building stands, evoking an eerie atmosphere.

Many empty drums fill its premises, while doors of most of the 17 rooms inside the building remain tightly shut. Two abandoned cars lie in the parking, with stagnant water on different parts of the vehicles. In front of the building, two dilapidated tin sheds, surrounded by debris, remain as a testament to a haunting stillness.

A signboard at the gate reads "Moshok Nibaroni Daptor," which is a government department dedicated controlling to mosquitoes. Ironically, the very drums, the locked rooms, the abandoned cars and tinsheds that fill the compound create a breeding ground for these diseasecarrying insects.

In a country plagued by annual dengue outbreaks, this irony is cause for concern, according to

As per its website, the Dhaka Mosquito Control Department was established under the health ministry in 1948, shifted to the Local Government Department in 1980, and is currently under the authority of the Dhaka city corporations.

At its inception, the department employed a total of 396 personnel. However, at present, there are 241 personnel working, with 155 positions remaining vacant.

The majority of the current workers are engaged in the field, applying mosquito repellent sprays across various parts of

This indicates that there are no staff members present at the department's office, rendering abandoned, which this correspondent found proof of in a recent visit.

This begs the question: what ourpose does the two-storey building serve, other than creating an ideal breeding ground for mosquitoes?

# Use social media in family planning campaigns

Speakers tell seminar

The Directorate General of Family Planning (DGFP) should adopt a new strategy regarding mass media campaigns, taking into consideration the significant increase of social media users, said speakers at a roundtable yesterday.

They said the current family planning campaign is still relying on approaches from the 80s and 90s, which are no longer suitable considering the changing context. titled

discussion, "Bangladesh Family Planning Program: What Women and Girls Want Matters," was jointly organised by Ipas Bangladesh and The Daily Star to mark World Population Day 2023 at The Daily Star Centre in Dhaka.

Sved Rubayet, country coordinator of Ipas Bangladesh, during his keynote presentation said the DGFP has to change its strategy. He pointed out the higher rates of mobile phone usage, secondary education, and access to electricity as factors that need to be considered.

Rubayet also drew attention to the decline in women's engagement with mass media over the past two

messages through mass media dropped from 46.5 percent in 1993-94 to 26 percent in 2017-18.

## **ANTI-MOSQUITO DRIVE** Four state-run companies fined Tk 20 lakh

A Dhaka North City Corporation mobile court yesterday fined four state-run companies Tk 20 lakh for finding Aedes larvae on their premises.

The drive was conducted in the capital's Karwan Bazar. Bangladesh Oil, Gas and Mineral Corporation (Petrobangla), an under-construction building of Jamuna Oil Company Limited, Trading Corporation of Bangladesh, and Bangladesh Textile Mills Corporation were fined Tk 5 lakh each on the third day of the drive.

"Spotting Aedes larvae at government offices, especially Petrobangla, despite multiple warning and directives, is frustrating and disappointing," said DNCC Mayor Atiqul Islam.

Petrobangla Chairman Zanendra Nath Sarker said, "The construction company was instructed to clean the area. They will be held responsible as the larvae were found while they were carrying out the construction work. Officials from relevant departments also have to share the blame."
