Bangladesh and India yesterday rolled out a landmark cross-border trade settlement mechanism involving the rupee and bypassing

As part of the arrangement, Indian exports and imports, which amount to about \$16 billion, can be invoiced, paid for and settled in

The State Bank of India's Bangladesh operations, Sonali Bank and Eastern Bank have opened special rupee accounts with two Indian banks: SBI's international services branch in Mumbai and ICICI Bank.

Bangladeshi exporters will receive their proceeds in rupee in those accounts and that balance would be used to pay for the imports from India. In short, import bills equivalent to the export proceeds can be settled under the mechanism. The exchange rate used would be

market-determined. The move comes as part of India's push to make the rupee a global currency and a part of the International Monetary Fund's Special Drawing Rights, an international reserve asset created by the Washintgton-based lender to

supplement the official reserves of its member

The value of the SDR is based on a basket of five currencies: dollar, euro, renminbi, yen and pound sterling.

As part of the efforts, the Reserve Bank of India has put in place a mechanism to settle international trade in rupees. The RBI has allowed banks from 18 countries to settle ayments in the rupee, including Sri Lanka, Israel, Russia, Germany, Singapore and the UK. The Bangladesh Bank has now joined the fray.

"Today's event marks the beginning of a new chapter in our economic and commercial partnership," said Pranay Verma, the Indian high commissioner to Bangladesh, at the launch

Successful use of the settlement mechanism will ease pressure on the country's foreign exchange reserves and reduce transaction costs with the neighbouring country, said Bangladesh Bank Governor Abdur Rouf Talukder.

The loss that takes place for trading in dollars thanks to multiple conversions would be minimised, facilitating greater trade competitiveness.

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Dengue deadlier for kids

Experts for quick hospitilisation of kids with symptoms

In a grim trend over the last few days, the number of child dengue patients has shot up in hospitals across the capital.

Bangladesh Shishu Institute, Hospital and the government hospital designated for children, yesterday introduced a separate dengue cell to cope with the pressure of patients.

Abdul Hakim, public relations officer of the hospital, said that till yesterday afternoon it was treating 45 dengue patients the highest number so far this year.

EU delegation enquires about EC preparations

The Election Exploratory Mission of the European Union yesterday enquired about the Election Commission's preparations for the next general polls. The mission sat down with the EC at its Agargaon

office in the capital.

At another meeting with Attorney General AM Amin Uddin at his Supreme Court office, it wanted to learn about Bangladesh's electoral laws.

An EU technical team will sit with a technical team of the EC any day between July 18 and 22 to hold further talks, especially on legal issues.

The EU mission, which arrived in Dhaka on Saturday, held meetings with foreign diplomats and senior officials of the ministries of foreign affairs and Chattogram Hill Tracts affairs, police and Human Rights Commission on Sunday and Monday.

Yesterday, Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Habibul Awal responded to the EU delegation's queries.

Speaking to reporters after the meeting at the EC, EU mission head Riccardo Chelleri said they are in Bangladesh to assess pre-election conditions and prepare an analysis for EU High Representative Josep Borrell who will decide whether or not to deploy an election observation mission for the next parliamentary polls.

Mentioning that they came to Bangladesh at the invitation of the government, Chelleri thanked the authorities for the very warm welcome extended to them.

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'Why is my daughter not getting bail?'

Khadijatul Kubra's mother asks

Since Khadijatul Kubra's arrest 10 months ago, a question has been haunting her mother: what has her daughter done to be denied bail? "Many people arrested for committing severe crimes

are granted bail within a few months. But my innocent daughter could not get it in the last 10 months and I don't know why," a distressed Fatema Khatun told this correspondent on the premises of a Dhaka court yesterday. Khadija, a student of Jagannath University, was

produced before the Cyber Tribunal of Dhaka yesterday for a hearing on the charge framing in two Digital Security Act cases filed against her for hosting a webinar. After the hearing on the defence's petition, Judge AM

Julfiker Hayet of the tribunal set November 30 for the next hearing. Khadija has so far been denied bail as many as six times,

her family members said. Fatema said that every time a hearing comes along, she has high hopes for her daughter to get bail. "But that

never seems to happen." She added, "My husband and I have become sick just thinking about what our daughter might be going through in jail. I haven't been able to sleep since her arrest. Only Allah knows when she will be relieved from

her sufferings." Fatema and her elder daughter, Monira, came to the court premises around 9:00am yesterday to attend the hearing. After Khadija was brought to the tribunal around 10:15am, her mother entered the courtroom but could not bear to face the entire hearing. She opted to sit and wait

outside, where she was seen sobbing.

Call for free, fair polls not

US state dept says about Bangladesh

The US State Department wonders why anyone would object to Washington's calls for free and fair elections in Bangladesh.

"I don't know why anyone would object to us calling for free and fair elections. I will note that the prime minister of Bangladesh has repeatedly stated her own commitment to free and fair elections. It's a desire that we share as a friend and partner of Bangladesh for over 50 years," said the US State Department Matthew Spokesperson Miller at a briefing in Washington DC on Monday.

He made the comment in response to a question on recent criticism from China, Russia and Iran that the statements and letters from the US and European Union politicians were interfering in Bangladesh's internal affairs.

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
