
age of 10.

Interestingly enough, when we think about the pioneers of classical dancing in South Asia, one of the biggest names is of the late Pandit Birju Maharaj, the father of Kathak dance. Neither can we deny the ubiquitous acclaim for male pioneers like Shibli Mohammad in the realm of classical dance in Bangladesh. Yet, classical dance remains conceived as a predominantly female domain with a scarcity of male classical dancers in our country.

In conversation with Shibli Mohammad, he spoke from his own experience while starting out in his journey of dancing, "I had to hear from all my relatives that I was becoming 'like a girl'. The world does not have tender words for someone who sets out to do something different. They called it a woman's dance form and dispensed negativity my way. But I was desperate and practiced like a madman. I had a record number of hours of practice, and you need that fanatical devotion to make it."

Gendering dance is a widespread practice, and classical dance is one of the main victims. While spectators wait to see women dance to soft and graceful moves in the field of dancing,

men need to be rough and tough.

A classical dancer and current Chairperson of the Department of Dance at the University of Dhaka, Monira Parveen explained "I can guarantee that none of my students seem like anything other than their own gender when they dance. Classical dance traditionally involves loud makeup and vibrant dresses. But it does not make one feminine."

The social stigma is not the only reason for the scarcity of males in classical dance. There are limited platforms and festivals for dancers to perform and showcase their talents in our country. In addition, emerging as a professional male classical dancer is hard in the patriarchal setup of our society where a male has to grow up, get a job that pays well, and provide for his family before he can think about his passions.

"I remember when I was in college and attending an annual function when one of my teachers asked if I still dance. He was very concerned as to why I wasn't trying out other sectors like acting, singing, or recitation; dance is a feminine art form, he had said," shared Hridoy Saha, a trained *Bharatnatyam* dancer currently studying at the Department of Islamic History and Culture at the University that have led to the underrepresentation of of Dhaka. He is also the current president of

the Dhaka University Dance Club (DUDC).

Over the years, there has been a steady decline of classical dance, in its stead, fusion dance has taken the spot. Shibli Mohammad commented on the matter saying, "Promoting our culture is not a priority anymore for most TV Channels nowadays. Channel owners are here to do business and make money off popular film heroines dancing to upbeat music while broadcasting profitable ads in between.'

Sayor Sinchon, a Grade-3 dance artist at Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy, urged for more opportunities countrywide. He said, 'More chances should be given to the root-level dancers. There are lots of dancers who can't pursue dance due to the lack of guidelines. Teachers should be trained to impart the proper techniques to students.'

Notwithstanding these circumstances, the future is not all too bleak. Dancing is soon to be incorporated into textbooks of the National curriculum along with other arts until the tenth grade. Many schools are including dancing classes in their curriculum as well. It is crucial to implement these steps to dispel gender norms and cultural assumptions

being unable to accommodate many patients due to a shortage of facilities.

Dr Shatavisa Dhar, medical officer at Bangladesh Shishu Hospital, said they have turned 50-bed medical ward-2, where the 45 dengue patients are now being treated, into a separate "dengue

"We have shifted other patients of the ward to other places.

He added that due to a lack of accommodation, they are only admitting dengue patients who are in critical condition, though noncritical patients are also seeking admission there.

"A single dengue patient needs 10 to 15 days to be cured and so, we can only admit a limited number of patients per day," he said.

With the new deaths, the total number of fatalities rose to 76 this year, while the total number of cases rose to 13,843. Of those, 4,179 are from outside the capital.

According to a DGHS analysis of the first 50 deaths, 62 percent were female and 38 were male. The age group that saw the highest 60.80 percent -- number of deaths was between 19 and 50 years. Of the deaths, 4.30 percent were of children aged between 0 and five and 6.50 percent were of those aged six to 11 years, while nine percent

were of those aged over 50.

So far, 176 patients were admitted to Shishu Hospital, where one of the 76 deaths occurred.

HM Nazmul Ahsan, associate professor of Shaheed Suhrawardy Medical College and Hospital, said the dengue symptoms are slightly different in children compared to

"While for older people, the symptoms begin with sudden fever along with body and eye pain, children first experience nausea and/or coughing.'

A child (newborn to 12) may cry excessively, have fever with nausea and cough and may show disinterest in being breastfed - if such symptoms show up, they may be suspected of suffering from dengue, he said.

Apart from symptoms, dengue also gives less time for children to be cured when at the critical stage.

"It takes 48 hours for the situation to become critical for adults, while children only have 24 hours, which is why we suggest hospitalisation as quickly as possible."

Children are also more prone to developing shock syndrome, which is risky for any dengue patient, he added.

A normal platelet count ranges between 150,000-450,000, which is generally accepted for healthy neonates, infants, children, and adolescents.

Mohammad Sharif, father of 3-year-old patient Jahan and a resident of Adabar, said his daughter's platelet count had come down to 56.000 after admission but improved slightly yesterday morning and rose to 60.000. Mosharraf Hossain, father of 8-vear-old Mohammad Habib, said his son was admitted to Dr MR Khan Shishu Hospital & Institute of Child Health in Mirpur on July 4. "When he was admitted, he was in a critical condition but he has now gotten better.'

A nurse of the 250-bed hospital, seeking anonymity, said the number of patients has been increasing over the last few days and they are currently treating over 30 dengue patients.

"My daughter is innocent," she

On Monday, the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court stayed for four months a February 16 High Court order that had granted Khadija permanent bail.

The state had filed two petitions with the SC, challenging the bail, following which the SC chamber judge stayed the HC order.

Later, Khadija submitted two petitions to the Appellate Division, praying that the chamber judge's stay order be vacated, said her lawyer BM Elias Kachi, adding that the SC chamber judge then sent all the four petitions to the full bench for a hearing.
