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HC rebukes Savar UNO

Asks him to resubmit report on Bangshi river encroachment

The High Court yesterday rebuked and warned the upazila nirbahi officer (UNO) of Savar for not complying with its directive over submitting a report after evicting encroachers from Bangshi river in Banshpatti area to this court.

"You [UNO] have not complied with the order of this court and have not cooperated with the law officers in providing relevant documents properly. You are now a junior officer... if you do irregularities by taking Tk 10-20 what will you do when you become a secretary? If we make any negative observation about your performance and competence, you will face problem in future," the bench of Justice JBM Hassan and Justice Razik-Al-Jalil told UNO Md Mazharul Islam.

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RUBEL MURDER 'Probe report incomplete'

HC asks PBI to submit another by July 25

The High Court yesterday found that the probe report made by the Police Bureau of Investigation on the murder of Md Rubel, a labourer from Manikganj, is not complete.

The HC ordered the PBI's Superintendent of Police Md Kudrat-E-Khuda to submit another report by July 25 before the court, clarifying the exact position of investigation officer Masudur Rahman during his investigation.

Rubel, 22, was killed in a hatchery in Manikganj at 12:10am on September 24 last year.

Manikganj Sadar Police Station's Sub-inspector Masudur had conducted investigation into the murder case and submitted the charge sheet along with 13 recorded statements of witnesses to the lower court concerned.

Tasmin Jahan had a harrowing experience yesterday as her daughter's 30-minute journey to school turned into a two-hour ordeal due to gridlock between Mirpur-10 and Shaheed Bir Uttam Lt Anwar Girls School and College.

Most of the Dhaka dwellers who stepped outside their home during morning and afternoon shared a similar fate.

The cause? Political processions organised by two major parties in the capital, which paralysed traffic flow of the capital yesterday.

"My daughter could not attend school on time," said Tasmin.

Amidst the scorching afternoon heat, our correspondents observed a group of six people resorting to carrying heavy luggage over their heads as they walked through Fakirapool.

To accommodate BNP's procession demanding the current regime's resignation, and Awami League's counter procession to hold election under the present one, traffic was diverted to a single lane in many places, causing chaos and distress for commuters throughout the city.

"We'll have to catch a flight at 7:00pm," explained one of them. They were rushing to Kamalapur with plans to catch a train to go to the airport station.

Talking to The Daily Star near Moghbazar flyover, businessman Sadhu Mia said he had been stranded at that very place for over two and a half hours.

"I have an emergency meeting in Gazipur. I will make a huge loss in business if I fail to reach on time," he said.

One Hamidur Rahman was heading to Tikatuli from Mohammadpur around 11:00am along with his wife and daughter on a motorbike.

"I reached Shabbagh smoothly. As we came near the Matshya Bhaban, we got stuck in a long tailback," he said.

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Doctors suspend countrywide strike

Central Hospital physicians get bail

Doctors of private hospitals, clinics and diagnostic centres yesterday suspended their strike after two of their fellow physicians were granted bail in a case filed over the death of a mother and her newborn during a C-section operation last month.

Mohammed Khurshid Alam, director general of Directorate General of Health Services, confirmed the development following a meeting of 44 organisations of doctors including Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Bangladesh (OGSB) and Society of Surgeons of Bangladesh.

"We have already heard that Dr Shahzadi Mustarshida and Dr Muna Shaha have been granted bail, so we have decided to suspend our movement," Khurshid Alam, also the president of Society of Surgeons of Bangladesh said during a press conference at Dhaka Medical College Hospital in the afternoon.

"All physicians around the country will start their private practices from today [yesterday]," he added.

"We have also decided to file a petition for the safety and security of doctors at their workplaces," Khurshid Alam also said. Earlier, services for outpatients were suspended as doctors at private hospitals, clinics and diagnostic centres began their two-day strike on Monday to demand the release of two physicians.

Outpatients seeking help at the private health facilities had to suffer throughout the day. Meanwhile, a Dhaka court yesterday granted bail to Shahzadi Mustarshida Sultana and Muna Shaha in a case filed over the deaths of Mahbuba Akter Akhi and her newborn at Central Hospital in the capital.

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DHAKA-17 BY-POLLS Lowest turnout in four years

The turnout of 11.50 percent voters on Monday's by-polls to Dhaka-17 was the lowest in any by-election held in the last four years, excluding the ones held amid coronavirus restrictions.

Experts blame the absence of participatory and competitive elections and the erosion of people's trust in the EC the reason behind its failure to hold credible elections.

Election Commission sources said since the last general election, the current EC had held 32 by-polls. Thirteen of those were held amid coronavirus restrictions between March 17, 2020, and August 19, 2021. Five by-polls were held before the restrictions were imposed and 14 after they were lifted.

No voting was needed in four by-elections because only one individual ran for MP in each.

Before Monday's by-polls, the lowest turnout after the relaxation of the Covid-19 ban was 14.55 percent in the Chattogram-8 by-election held on April 27, according to EC data.

Voter turnout was 16.10 percent in Brahmanbaria-2, 22.33 percent in Bogura-6, 23.92 percent in Bogura-4, 29.07 percent in Chapainawabganj-3, 34.78 percent in Chapainawabganj-2 and 46.30 percent in Thakurgaon-3. All these by-elections were held in February.

The voter turnout in the Dhaka-10 by-elections held on March 21, two weeks after the country's first detection of the Covid-19 case, was 5.28 percent, the lowest ever recorded in the nation's electoral history.

There is no contest in the election. Voters feel that there is no need to cast a ballot because they already knew the outcome.
