Coke Studio Bangla, despite all its criticisms, keeps marching along with its own brand of unique renditions. This time, *Ghum Ghum*, a mellifluous homage to one of the country's all-time great musicians in Lucky Akhand, paved way for an exciting young singer to take centre-stage - Fairooz Nazifa.

For those not following the intricacies of the Bangladeshi music scene, Fairooz burst on to the scene in 2016 with simple ukulele covers of songs on YouTube, namely *Vance Joy's Riptide*.

Since coming to the foray, the girl from Chattogram had to face an uphill battle to stay in Dhaka, do music, complete her degree and receive acceptance from her own family for her music.

"I don't know what to say," said a nervous Fairooz over the phone, "When I recorded the demo for *Ghum Ghum*, I was soaking wet. I had just come through a thunderstorm for the recording." 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Fairooz Nazifa, who also dabbles in art, feels like it complements her music. She is also adept at Karate, as she has trained in the martial art form from her teens.

In a few weeks' time, the young singer will fly off to Philadelphia to pursue further studies, but she will not let that hamper her music. "It's all online now, so I will hold on to all my art and music," she said. "It is, however, a bit intimidating to think that a tiny little dreamer from Chittagong will make art across continents," smiled the multi-talented artiste.

Fatal exhaustion

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Islam, 50, a battery-run auto-rickshaw driver, and Amjad Hossain, 52, said police and fire service officials.

Jahangir, a driver at Hajiganj Fire Station, and Salauddin died on the spot. Sirajul died at Dhaka Medical College Hospital around 2:00pm.

AL, BNP look to different

Wildfires kill 34 in Algeria as heatwave sweeps N Africa

The death toll as wildfires sweep across regions of Algeria has risen to 34 people including 10 soldiers yesterday, the interior ministry said, as a heatwave spreads across north Africa and southern Europe.

Some 8,000 firefighters were battling to bring the flames under control, authorities said.

Some 1,500 people were evacuated from the Bejaia, Bouira and Jijel provinces east of the capital Algiers, according to the ministry.

The three provinces in Algeria's Mediterranean coastal region have seen the worst of the fires.

President Abdelmadjid Tebboune on Monday expressed his condolences to the families of the deceased, noting both civilian and military victims.

The interior ministry said that 7,500 firefighters and 350 firetrucks were mobilised to fight the flames, aided by aerial fire-fighting support.

Operations were underway to extinguish fires in six provinces, it added, calling on citizens to "avoid areas affected by the fires" and to report new blazes on toll-free phone numbers.

"Civil protection services remain mobilised until the fires are completely extinguished," the ministry said.

The representative of the birth and death registration office said they also did not know how many people's data were breached.

"We cannot say that data of 5 million people were exposed. The claim that data from 5 million individuals have been exposed cannot be confirmed as true or false at this point, as it has not been determined in the investigation."

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The leaked information has not

been found on the dark web so far and there was no evidence that the data had been hacked, Palak said.

Asked if it will create a culture of impunity as the investigation report did not recommend any punishment, Palak said: "It will not. Emphasis is placed on fulfilling one's own responsibility."

The report will be sent to the prime minister.

Besides, the report's recommendations will be sent to the concerned minister and the ministry's secretary. The Registrar General, Birth & Death Registration is a Bangladeshi government regulatory agency under the ministry of Local Government, Rural Development and

Co-operatives.

The report recommended taking necessary steps to rectify all the errors subject to receipt of the complete Vulnerability Assessment and Penetration Testing (VAPT) report of the web application of the concerned institution.

The software architecture of the existing web application needs to be tested by the Software Quality Testing and Certification Centre of the Bangladesh Computer Council.

The committee also called for increasing the overall technical capacity along with increasing the number of technical team members of the concerned institutions.
