Govt to create a database for returnee migrants

30 'welfare centres' launched

STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The Expatriates' Welfare Minister Imran Ahmad yesterday said the ministry aims to create a comprehensive database for the betterment of returnee migrants.

Around 2,000 returning expatriates would be the beneficiaries of this project titled "Recovery and Advancement of Informal Sector Employment (Raise): Reintegration of Returnee Migrants".

The minister also emphasised the importance of maintaining the integrity of data generated from the project while expressing concerns about potential data breaches, urging officials to ensure proper data protection measures.

"Integrity of the data is most important. We collect data and then if it gets hacked, this will make no sense," the minister said, addressing a programme marking the opening of 30 "welfare centres" as part of the project.

The minister also called upon other implementing partners to protect data of the returnee migrants.

Wage Earners' Welfare Board (WEWB) organised the programme at Bangabandhu Wage Earners' Centre at the capital's Barua.

Addressing the programme as chief guest, the minister said returnee reintegration is a complex issue and that his ministry has taken various initiatives to ensure well being of returnee migrant workers.

PM opens 50 more model mosques

He called for urgent action from policymakers to overcome the challenges.

"Covid-19 has shown our vulnerability in the critical care arrangement. Although the problem cannot be solved overnight, we should have an action plan considering future health emergencies," added Atiqul. Speaking as chief guest, BSMMU Vice Chancellor Prof Sharfuddin Ahmed said, "Due to the shortage of anesthesiologists, surgeons, and gynaecologists in many district-level hospitals [often] cannot perform surgeries." He also said there are many hospitals that have ICUs but do not have proper oxygen supplies. "If so, such hospitals should be shut down," he asserted. He also stressed the need for strengthening the healthcare sector. AL to submit audit report to EC today staff correspondent

Awami League will submit its annual audit report to the Election Commission today.

The ruling party informed this to the media through a press release, signed by AL Office Secretary Biplob Baura, yesterday.

According to Representation of the People Order, which sets the rules and regulations for elections in the country, political parties must submit their audit reports by July 31 for the previous year's transactions and all financial dealings. Mentionable, BNP submitted its annual report to the Election Commission yesterday.

BNP's earnings increase seven-fold Rizvi submits last year's financial report to EC

BNP's income last year increased by seven folds while its expenditures doubled compared to 2021, the party's annual financial report shows.

Ruhul Kabir Rizvi, senior joint general secretary of the party, handed over its annual financial report of 2022 to EC Secretary Jahangir Alam at the latter's office in Agargaon yesterday.

According to the report, BNP earned Tk 5,92,04,632 and spent Tk 3,88,33,803. It has a surplus of Tk 2.03 crore.

Rizvi said the party earned the money from different sources, including fees from its national executive committee members, donation of different persons and through Fixed Deposit Receipt (FDR).

The money was spent on different purposes, including publishing leaflets, posters, advertisements, distribution of reliefs among flood victims, providing financial support to families of deceased party workers, helping injured party activists, and others.

According to the party's 2021 financial statement given to the EC, the party earned Tk 84,12,444 from different sources that year, including monthly fees from members, FDR, nomination form sales and donations, while it spent Tk 1,98,47,171 for different purposes, including paying salaries and bonuses to employees, maintaining office SEE PAGE 4 COL 1
