# Lalkuthi set for a facelift

DSCC's renovation initiative underway

Crumbling ceilings, damp walls, thick dust on the floor, and a deafening silence this is what visitors are welcomed with when they first step into the iconic Northbrook Hall, popularly known as Lalkuthi.

However, the dilapidated heritage site is set to be renovated through an effort led by Dhaka South City Corporation

But this time, the archeological heritage site will be transformed into a modern community centre with amenities fit for the urban population.

The DSCC has initiated a project under the Dhaka City Neighbourhood Upgrading Project (DCNUP), which aims to renovate public spaces and enhance urban services across four neighbourhoods in Dhaka south, benefiting an estimated one million residents.

Funded by the World Bank, DCNUP, with a budget of over US \$100 million, comes as a boon for the architectural

In 1882, a public library was added on the southeast side of the hall. The library, later named Johnson Hall, was inaugurated in 1887 with a collection of 1,000 books, many of which were destroyed during the 1971 Liberation War.

The hall was also used as the telegram office during the 1950s and later as Central Women's College before it was handed over to Dhaka Municipality Corporation. The hall is now under the jurisdiction of DSCC.

While a complete restoration might prove to be challenging, DSCC is determined to infuse modern vitality into this cultural heritage. Their plans include creating contemporary amenities like community centres and libraries for both locals and visitors.

After renovation, Lalkuthi will have a town hall, exhibition gallery, banquet hall, seminar hall, and space for events and photography. The planned Lalkuthi community centre, to be built by the hall, will provide essential facilities, extended semi-outdoor spaces, and a coffee shop.

After the transformation, Lalkuthi will have a public library, digital archive, book cafe, and souvenir booth, with corridors that could be used as exhibition spaces. Outdoor areas will feature civic events,

### Cases keep rising outside Dhaka

Ctg, Laxmipur, Pirojpur top list; 14 more die across country

The rate of dengue infection keeps rising outside the capital with Chattogram standing top in terms of the number of patients hospitalised after being infected by the mosquito-borne disease.

From January till yesterday, 4,616 dengue cases were reported in Chattogram, the highest among all districts except Dhaka, according to the data of the Directorate General of Health Services. Chattogram is followed by Laxmipur and Pirojpur with 2,693 and 2,587 cases registered respectively so far.

Since the last part of July, according to DGHS data, the number of dengue cases outside Dhaka started to outweigh the capital, which is still continuing.

Over 1.38 lakh cases were reported in the country as of yesterday. Of them, 74,749 cases were recorded outside SEE PAGE 4 COL 7

## 3 killed as bus hits stationary truck

Three people were killed and 12 injured when a bus rammed into a stationary truck on the Dhaka-Mawa expressway in Munshiganj early vesterday.

The accident took place in Ramerkhola area of Sirajdikhan upazila around 4:00am.
