Shakib rues lack of runs at the top

While skipper Shakib Al Hasan pointed to the inability of putting on a big opening stand as one of the reasons behind his team's 21run defeat against Sri Lanka in their crucial Super Four encounter, the performance in yesterday's match practically summed up Bangladesh's inconsistent batting performance throughout the Asia Cup.

Poor shot-selection and lack of responsibility shown by the batters was the highlight of the Bangladesh innings once again as the Tigers brought their own downfall despite Mehedi Hasan Miraz and Naim Sheikh getting the team off to a decent start with a 55-run opening stand in chase of 258.

"Chasing 260 (258) runs on that wicket, we needed partnership at the start. Though we got to fifty, we needed an 80-or-100-run partnership. Then we could have chased such a target because there was help for the bowlers, especially the spinners and seamers as well. Our top four didn't get enough runs and we didn't bowl well at the start," Shakib said at the postmatch presentation ceremony.



Bangladesh lost four wickets for 28 runs in nine overs to go from 55 for none to 83 for four before Hridov and Mushfiqur Rahim steadied the ship for a while.

Mushfiqur threw his wicket away after scoring 29 runs off 48 balls and ending a promising 72-run lone battle before being dismissed fifth-wicket stand, Bangladesh's

But once again the experienced hopes of a victory virtually rested on the shoulders of Hridoy.

The young man then fought a for 82 off 97 balls, striking seven fours and a six but it always proved to be a tough ask with a fragile tail.

"He (Towhid Hridoy) batted really well; he played in the LPL (Lanka Premier League) here and he had a good tournament and I think that gave him the confidence. If he could stay there a bit longer... but you know that happens. There are lot of ifs and buts we can talk about. I thought Sri Lanka played better than us and that's why they are the winners," Shakib said.

Bangladesh had done a decent job after electing to bowl first, with the three pacers picking up eight wickets. But according to Shakib, right-hander Sadeera Samarawickrama's blistering 72-balls 93 took the game away from the Tigers.

"I thought it was a good toss to win. At the start we didn't bowl particularly well. I thought there were lot of help for the bowlers but we couldn't get the wicket. Credit should go to Sri Lanka for the way they handled the new ball. But from there on, we came back really strong but the way Sadeera (Samarawickrama) played, he took the game away from us," opined

India, Pakistan rekindle rivalry

Pakistan skipper Babar Azam said Saturday his side will have an edge over India in their Asia Cup Super-Four clash, with a bowling line-up ready to win matches and tournaments.

The arch-rivals meet again in Colombo on Sunday after their group match was abandoned due to rain, which has played havoc with the 50-over tournament that

>> India have the edge over Pakistan after 14 Asia Cup fixtures played in the 50-over format, having won seven times with two matches yielding no result.

>> Overall ODI head-to-head outcomes, however, paints a different picture as Pakistan boast a win percentage of 54 against their archrivals following 133 encounters.

>> The outcome of the first-ever clash between the two sides, played in a 40over contest in 1978, went in India's favour by a mere four-run margin.

>> After three matches in Colombo, India are yet to defeat Pakistan who won the 2004 encounter. Both the first fixture in 1997 and the latest one in the ongoing Asia Cup's group stage did not produce an outcome.

>> The only time India won against Pakistan in Sri Lanka happened in Dambulla in 2010, a last-ball thriller where Harbhaian Singh arrived as the unlikely hero with the bat.





An India-Pakistan clash remains one of the most hotly anticipated matches in world cricket because the two South Asian neighbours only play each other in multi-nation tournaments due to political tensions.

Pakistan won their opening match of the Super Four stage against Bangladesh and a second win will further enhance their chances of making the final on September 17.

But rain in the Sri Lankan capital is expected to play spoilsport again in the match, for which a reserve day has been kept aside.

"You can say we have the edge, as we have played back-to-back cricket here (in Sri Lanka) and in Pakistan," Azam told

"It has been two-and-a-half months in Sri Lanka including the Test series, Lanka

is a precursor to the ODI World Cup in Premier League, Afghanistan series and playing Pakistan regularly made it tough now the Asia Cup. So, you can say it will to gauge the opposition. be advantage (for us)."

> Afridi, Naseem Shah and Haris Rauf have against such attacks often it makes a bit stood out, with 23 wickets between them so far.

Shaheen, a left-arm quick who leads the bowling, rattled India with his opening burst in the group match, taking the key wickets of skipper Rohit Sharma and Virat Kohli.

Azam said the team believes their bowlers can win them titles.

"Proud to have the fast bowlers that we have. One of the best (in the world)," said

"Fast bowlers win you tournaments and matches and I have total belief (in) them. The line-up that we have including Naseem and Faheem (Ashraf) is the best lot that we have."

India opener Shubman Gill said not

"We all know that their bowling attack Pakistan's pace trio of Shaheen Shah is quite good and when you don't play of difference in main tournaments," said

> Gill, who was bowled by Rauf for 10 in Pallekele last week, and the Indian batsmen have been facing a left-arm specialist in their training to counter Shaheen. He said the variation "helps".

India managed to post 266 all out after they slipped to 66-4 against Pakistan last week and Gill said the team has taken confidence from the fightback.

"Openers need to make a good start and need to dominate them from the beginning," he said.

"In the league match, our top order did not click much, still we made a competitive total...so, it was a good sign."

Medvedev determined to deny Djokovic's 24th

Daniil Medvedev expects Novak Djokovic to be in top form at Sunday's US Open final, but the third-seeded Russian adds that he will try to produce his "best-ever version" to beat the record-23-time Grand Slam champion.

Medvedev prevailed 7-6(3), 6-1, 3-6, 6-3 in a fascinating encounter that ended top seed

Carlos Alcaraz's reign as Flushing Meadows champion, with the 27-year-old setting up a rematch of his triumphant 2021 finale against Djokovic.

Djokovic, hunting a fourth U.S. Open title that would see him equal Margaret

Court's record haul of 24 Grand Slams and a good measure of revenge on Medvedev.

"He (Djokovic) is always better than the previous time he plays. For example, I beat him in the U.S. Open final, he beat me in Bercy (Paris Masters) in a great match. Carlos beat him in Wimbledon, he beat him in Cincinnati," Medvedev told reporters.

"Novak is going to be his best version on Sunday, and I have to be the best-ever

version of myself if I want to try to beat him. "Novak, when he loses, he's never the same after... It's just a different mentality...

So, I have to use it knowing that he's going to be 10 times better than he was that day. And I have to be, if I want to still beat him, 10 times better than I was that day."

Djokovic battled past American Ben Shelton in straight sets on Friday to set up a rematch with Russia's Medvedev, who denied him a rare calendar Grand Slam two years ago.



The memory of that bitter defeat was still fresh in his mind, as Djokovic told reporters he was trying not to focus on the significance of a 24th major title that would match Margaret Court's all-time singles record.

"(I don't) think about the history too much in this sense, you

know, because when I did that in the past, like, '21 finals here I was maybe overwhelmed with the occasion and the opportunity and I underperformed," said Djokovic. "So. I don't want this to happen again,

and I'll try to, you know, just focus on what needs to be done and tactically prepare myself for that match."

Djokovic won the Australian Open and hoisted the trophy at Roland Garros already this year. He had a chance to collect his 24th major title in Wimbledon but was denied in the finale by Spain's Carlos Alcaraz.
