Haris, Naseem expected to be fit for WC: Babar

Pakistan captain Babar Azam said Friday that injured quicks Haris Rauf and Naseem Shah remained central to his team's World Cup plans, after their absence saw the team crash out of the Asia Cup.

Azam's men went down to fellow co-hosts Sri Lanka by two wickets Thursday in a last-ball thriller of a rainshortened Super Four knockout game in Colombo.

Both Naseem and Rauf were injured in the Super Four loss to India in the 50-over tournament, a tune-up for the ODI World Cup in India starting next month.

"Haris Rauf is not bad, he has a little bit side strain but

will recover before the World Cup," said Azam. "Naseem Shah has missed a couple of matches but I don't know about his recovery. But in my opinion, he will

be in the World Cup.' The pace duo's absence was felt when Pakistan failed to defend 252 in their 42-over-a-side match against Sri Lanka. Charith Asalanka steered his side home in that game, hitting a four and a double off the last two balls, bowled by debutant Zaman Khan.

"Definitely when you lose your best bowlers, that costs you and your team," Azam said after the match.

"We were not short of effort but didn't finish well."

Azam said the team would learn from their mistakes to put on a better show in India next month, where they will meet the hosts in a hotly anticipated October 14 clash in

"In fielding, we lacked the kind of response that we should have got. In the bowling, there is an issue in the middle overs," said Azam.

"We will try to learn from them and will clear them before going into the World Cup."

Sciver-Brunt scripts 'a masterclass'

England captain Nat Sciver-Brunt made her landmark 100th appearance memorable remarkable smashing a recordbreaking century to see her side thrash Sri Lanka by 161 runs on Thursday.

Deputising

ill captain Heather Knight, Sciver-Brunt hit England's fastest women's ODI century in just 66 balls.

"It was a masterclass, outstanding," is how England quick Lauren Filer, who made her ODI debut in the series and was also adjudged the player of the three-match series that England won 2-0, described the innings that she witnessed firsthand at Grace Road.

After eclipsing the previous best by Charlotte Edwards off 70 balls against New Zealand in 2012, Sciver-Brunt went on to reach 120 from 74 deliveries.

Her record would only have stood for a couple of minutes if Maia Bouchier had hit her 65th ball for six but she was lbw for 95, ending a boundary-laden 193-run stand in 121 deliveries with Sciver-Brunt.

Sciver-Burnt also mentioned that she was happy to have carried on with her form from the Ashes series against Australia last month. "[100th ODI] Usually the commemorative cap games

weren't so good for the player so very happy to bat how I did and carry it on from [the last Ashes series against] Australia," Sciver-Brunt said.

The efforts from Sciver-Brunt and Bouchier underpinned England's score of 273-8 in a contest reduced to 31 overs each because of a rain-delayed start.

Charlie Dean took five wickets as Sri Lanka were dismissed for 112.

Zampa's day to forget

Adam Zampa became part of an unwelcome record yesterday as the Australia leg-spinner equalled the most expensive figures bowled in ODI cricket history.

At the SuperSport Park in Centurion, after being pummelled by South middle-order Africa's batters Heinrich Klaasen and David Miller, Zampa conceded 113 runs from his 10 overs - equalling the figures of compatriot Michael Llewellyn Lewis, who was taken apart by the same opponents in 2006 during that epic game in which South Africa chased down a 435-run target set by Australia.

Zampa, who was struck for eight fours and nine sixes on the day, became one of 16 bowlers to concede more than 100 runs in an ODI. The Proteas amassed a mammoth 416 for five as they attempt to stay alive in the five-match series, which Australia lead 2-1.

> Chasing an elusive Olympic gold medal will be one of Novak Djokovic's main goals for next season even though the 24-times Grand Slam champion knows he will have to be physically and mentally ready to cope with a crammed schedule.

Djokovic won bronze in Beijing 2008 and fell short in London 2012, Rio 2016 and Tokyo two years ago, but the Serbian who will turn 37

before the next Games begin is still fighting to be fit after claiming three Grand Slam titles in 2023. The world number one also made the

Wimbledon final earlier this year, where he was beaten in five sets by Carlos Alcaraz, and he is in no mood to slow down.

"My plan for now is to play the Olympic Games, so I'm hoping that I will be able to play, that I will be ready physically and mentally," Djokovic told reporters in Valencia, where he turned up to play in the Davis Cup just days after his U.S. Open triumph.

"It's going to be a very congested and challenging schedule next year, with Roland Garros on clay, Wimbledon on grass, the Olympics on clay and then the U.S. Open and the tournaments before that on hardcourts.

"It's going to be challenging for players, but my plan is to play the Olympics, because it's one of the most important events in the history of the sport. That's where you also represent the country and the feeling of being part of it is a huge honour."

Djokovic missed Serbia's 3-0 victory over South Korea in the Finals group stage this week as he was travelling, but is likely to feature against a Spain side missing Alcaraz on Friday.

Verstappen hits back at **Mercedes boss**

Max Verstappen hit back at Mercedes Formula One team boss Toto Wolff on Thursday after the Austrian said the Red Bull driver's record run of 10 wins in a row was irrelevant and just for Wikipedia.

Wolff made his comments after this month's Italian Grand Prix, where Mercedes were beaten by both Ferraris as well as the two Red Bulls.

Asked at the Singapore Grand Prix for his reaction, Verstappen said he was not disappointed. "They had a pretty shit race, so probably he

was still pissed off with their performance," the 25-year-old Dutch driver told a news conference ahead of a race that could bring his team a 16th successive victory.

"He almost sounds like he's an employee of our team sometimes, but luckily not." Verstappen, who is 145 points clear of team

mate Sergio Perez in the championship and set for a third title well before the end of the season, suggested Wolff should focus on his own team.

'That's what we did in the past as well, when we were behind them and when they were dominating," he said.

"I think you should be able to appreciate when a team is doing really well. Which I think we've done in the past, because it worked also as a kind of inspiration. To see someone that dominant, it was very impressive at the time."
